



SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Participation in the labour force

An estimated 9,058,600 persons aged between 15 and 69 years participated in the labour force at some time during the twelve months ending March 1990 (Table 3). The proportion of persons participating in the labour force has increased from 73 per cent in 1984 to 77 per cent in 1990. Over this period, participation by males in the labour force has remained steady at around 86 per cent. Female participation increased from 59 per cent in 1984 to 67 per cent in 1990 (Table 1, Diagram 1).

Males aged between 20 and 54 years recorded participation rates over 90 per cent from 1984 onwards. For

females, the 20-24 year age group has recorded the highest participation rate, in each of the past seven surveys. The participation rate for married females has grown steadily since 1984, with the proportion of married females participating in the labour force increasing from 54 per cent in 1984 to 65 per cent in 1990 (Table 2).

For all age groups, the participation rate for married males was higher than the participation rate for males not married. Married females aged between 35 and 44 recorded the largest participation rate increase, rising from 66 per cent in 1984 to 80 per cent in 1990 (Table 2).

DIAGRAM 2. PARTICIPATION IN THE LABOUR FORCE, AGE AND GENDER, MARCH 1990




Persons who participated in the labour force can be assigned to three groups: those who worked at some time during the year, those who looked for work at some time during the year, and those who had been not in the labour force at some time during the year. These groups are not mutually exclusive as it is possible for an individual to be in more than one of the groups over the course of a twelve month period. Diagram 3 shows the extent to which this happened.


For instance, 523,000 persons or 4 per cent of all persons at March 1990, had worked at some time, and also looked for work at some time but at no time during the year had they been not in the labour force. Similarly 5,788,000 persons (49%) had worked for the whole year. A further example: 535,000 persons (5%) worked at some time, looked for work at some time, and were not in the labour force at some time during the year ending March 1990.

Persons who worked at some time during the year An estimated 8,656,600 persons worked at some time during the year ending March 1990 (Table 3). The proportion of persons who worked at some time during the year has risen by 6 percentage points since 1984. The proportion of females working at some time during the year has risen 10 percentage points since 1984, while the proportion of males has remained steady (Table 1, Diagram 4).

Of the 8,656,600 persons who had worked at some time during the year ending March 1990—

- 5,788,000 persons (67%) had worked for the full 52 weeks
- 73 per cent of male workers had worked for 52 weeks compared to 58 per cent of female workers
- 87 per cent of male workers had worked all their weeks on a full-time basis compared to 53 per cent for female workers
- 36 per cent of female workers had worked all their weeks on a part-time basis compared to 7 per cent for male workers (Table 5).

Persons who looked for work at some time during the year


During the year ending March 1990, 1,459,900 persons looked for work at some time. Of these, 160,800 persons (11%) looked for work for the whole 52 weeks (Table 6). The proportion of males who looked for work at some time during the year decreased from 17 per cent in 1984 to 13 per cent in 1990. The proportion of females in this category has been recorded as 12 or 13 per cent over the period 1984 to 1990 (Table 1).

Of the 1,459,900 persons who looked for work during 1990, 78 per cent had only one spell of looking for work — on average, this spell lasted 17 weeks (Table 6).

Persons not in the labour force at some time

The number of persons not in the labour force at some time during the year was 5,335,300, with 2,748,600 persons (52%) not in the labour force for the whole year. Females made up 65 per cent of persons not in the labour force at some time during the year. Of those women who were out of the labour force at some time during the year 62 per cent reported their main activity as "home duties/child care" (Table 7).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Note: The scope of this survey was restricted to persons aged 15-69 years. See paragraphs 3 and 13.

Introduction

The monthly population survey (which is described in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the March 1990 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

2. Those respondents to the labour force survey who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. They were asked the length of time they worked, looked for work or were not in the labour force, the number of spells during which they looked for work and other aspects of labour force experience for the 52 weeks up to the end of the week before the interview.

Scope

- 3. The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the labour force survey (described in full in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0)) except that it was restricted to persons aged 15 to 69. Visitors to private dwellings, students who were boarding at school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoriums and inmates of reformatories, gaols, etc. have also been excluded.
- 4. In the tables, 'All Persons' refers to all persons within the scope of the survey.

Coverage

5. In the population survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. See *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0) for more details.

Definitions

- 6. Definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0).
- 7. Labour force experience characteristics relate to the 52 weeks up to the end of the week before the interview. Unless otherwise stated, all other characteristics referenced in this publication relate to the week before the interview.

Results of the survey

- 8. The estimates relate to persons covered by the survey in March 1990. Because of emigration, deaths, etc., not all persons with labour force experience during the period were covered. Labour force experience may relate to experience outside Australia.
- 9. Results of similar surveys, conducted in February 1969, 1973, 1975, 1976, 1977 and annually since February 1979, have been given in previous issues of this publication.

10. It is proposed that this survey will be conducted next in March 1991.

Unpublished statistics

11. As well as the statistics included in this and related publications, the ABS may have other relevant unpublished data available. Inquiries should be made to the contact in the Phone Inquiries box at the front of this publication.

Comparability of series

12. It is impracticable to obtain information relating to a whole year which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining the labour force status of persons in the monthly survey depend on a detailed set of questions asked about a person's labour force activity during the reference week. For the survey of labour force experience, a person is assigned to a labour force category on the basis of a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the terms worked and looked for work are used in this survey rather than the rigidly defined terms employed and unemployed used in the monthly labour force survey.

Discontinuities in the series

- 13. All surveys prior to March 1990 were run in February. The estimates for this survey are not strictly comparable with those obtained from previous surveys. The scope of surveys run prior to March 1990 included persons aged 15 and over. In March 1990 the survey was restricted to exclude all persons aged 70 and over (see paragraph 3). Historical estimates contained in this publication have been revised to enable comparisons of estimates from this survey with those from surveys conducted prior to March 1990.
- 14. March 1990 and February 1989 data have been weighted to conform to population estimates based on the 1986 Census of Population and Housing. Data from the February 1984 to 1988 surveys were based on estimates from the 1981 population census.

Survey sample redesign

15. The labour force survey sample has been redesigned and reselected using information collected in the 1986 Population Census. As a result, the standard errors in this Supplementary Survey differ from those for surveys of the same topic run prior to September 1987. For details, see Information Paper — Labour Force Survey — Sample Design (6269.0).

Sample size

16. In previous years this supplementary survey has been conducted on either 50 per cent or 75 per cent of the dwellings selected in the Labour Force Survey. For March 1990 this has been expanded to the full sample size. As a result the standard errors for this survey differ from those applicable to previous surveys.

Estimation procedure

17. The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age, gender and labour force status, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

Reliability of the estimates

18. Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. For more information refer to the Technical Note, Page 13.

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
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TECHNICAL NOTE

Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

- 2. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these numbers will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.
- 3. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 3 shows the estimated number of married females who worked at some time during the year ending March 1990 was 2,288,100. Since this estimate is between 2,000,000 and 5,000,000, the standard error for Australia will be between 14,300 and 19,700 in the standard error table and can be approximated as 14,800 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 2,273,300 to 2,302,900 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 2,258,500 and 2,317,700. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



- 4. As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In this publication, only estimates with relative standard errors less than 25 per cent are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates with larger relative standard errors have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution.
- 5. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE (x)]^2 - [RSE (y)]^2}$$

- 6. Considering the example from paragraph 3 above, these females as a proportion of all married females (3,691,100) is 62 per cent. The standard error for 3,691,100 is approximately 17,300 so the relative standard error is 0.5 per cent. The relative standard error for 2,288,100 is 0.6 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is $\sqrt{(0.6)^2 (0.5)^2}$ or 0.3 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (62 per cent) of 0.2 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of married females who worked at some time during the year is between 61.8 per cent and 62.2 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty that the proportion is within the range 61.6 per cent to 62.4 per cent.
- 7. Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE
$$(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

8. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this

kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sam-

pling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

GLOSSARY

Average duration of time spent looking for work: obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been looking for work by the number of persons in that group.

In the labour force: persons who were reported as having either worked or looked for work.

Looked for work: persons who were reported as being out of work and looking for a job.

Median duration of time spent looking for work: the duration which divides persons who looked for work into two equal groups, one comprising persons whose time spent looking for work during the year is above the median, and the other, persons whose time spent looking for work is below it.

Number of spells of looking for work during the year: the number of different periods, including the current period, during which persons were reported as having been out of work and looking for a job.

Time in the labour force during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as having either worked or looked for work.

Time spent looking for work during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as being out of work and looking for a job

Time worked during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as having either worked or been on paid leave. Periods of one week or more on strike or time off without pay are not classified as work.

Time worked full-time during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as having either worked full-time or been on paid leave.

Time worked part-time during the year: the total number of weeks persons were reported as having either worked part-time or been on paid leave.

Reference period: the 52 weeks up to the end of the week prior to interview. See also paragraph 13 of the Explanatory Notes, Page 11.

Worked: persons who were reported as having either worked or been on paid leave.
