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#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### Introduction

Over the two weeks commencing on Monday 7 September 1981, a survey supplementary to the population survey (conducted throughout Australia each month) sought information from persons not in the labour force aged 15 to 64 years. In particular, such persons were asked whether they would like a job and, if so, their reasons for not actively looking for work.

2. Interviewers, carefully chosen and specially trained, obtained information from the occupants of dwellings selected via a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 30,000 houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.) covering about two thirds of one percent of the population of Australia.

3. Results of similar surveys, the first conducted in November 1975, have been published in previous issues of this publication.

#### Scope

4. The survey includes all persons not in the labour force aged 15 to 64 years except:

- (a) certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
- (b) overseas visitors holidaying in Australia;
- (c) members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants) stationed in Australia.
- (d) persons who had actively looked for work but were unable to start a job in survey week for reasons other than their own temporary illness or injury; and
- (e) boarding school students, persons permanently unable to work, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria and inmates of reformatories, jails, etc.

Table 1 illustrates the portion of the civilian population covered by this survey.

#### Definitions

5. The labour force category to which a person is assigned depends on his *actual activity* (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.) during a specified week known as *the survey week*, which is the week immediately preceding that in which the interview takes place. Definitions of the principal labour force categories appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

6. Persons who want a job are those who:

(a) in the four weeks before the interview week had not looked for work but in the survey answer 'yes' or 'maybe' to the question 'Even though you have not been looking for work would you like a full-time or part-time job now?', or (b) although claiming to have looked for work in the four weeks before the interview week, had not taken active steps to find work.

7. Active steps to find work include checking or registering with the Commonwealth Employment Service or other employment agencies, writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer, answering a newspaper advertisement for a job, advertising or tendering for work, contacting friends or relatives and looking on factory or employment service notice boards.

8. Discouraged. Comprises persons who want a job but are not actively looking for work because they believe any of the following: considered by employers to be too young or too old; language or racial difficulties; insufficient training, skills or experience; no jobs in locality or line of work. See paragraph 14 regarding discontinuities in the series of estimates of discouraged.

9. Highest ranked reason. Reasons for not actively looking for work have been ranked in the order of priority shown in Table 9; where more than one reason was given, only the higher or highest ranked has been included in the estimates in Tables 9 to 12. Table 13 includes estimates of the highest ranked reason and the second highest ranked reason (if any).

10. A *regular job* is defined for this survey as paid employment, full-time or part-time, for two weeks or more in any job or business.

11. *Marital status*. Persons are classified as *married* or *not married*, the latter category includes persons who, at the time of the survey, had never married, or were widowed, or divorced.

12. State capital cities refers to the 1976 Population Census State Metropolitan Statistical Divisions. Other areas therefore include the Northern Territory, the Australian Capital Territory and the non metropolitan State Statistical Divisions.

13. *Main English-speaking countries* comprise the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, the United States of America, South Africa and New Zealand.

#### Discontinuities in the series

14. Estimates for March 1979 and earlier periods are not strictly comparable with those obtained from later surveys because, commencing with the September 1979 survey, the definition of *Persons who want a job* was widened to include those persons referred to in paragraph 6(b), i.e. persons who, although claiming to have looked for work in the four weeks before the interview week, had not taken active steps (as defined above) to find employment. Estimates of the number of such persons for earlier surveys, including those defined as *discouraged* are shown in previous issues of this publication. 15. The scope exclusions for this survey, as listed in paragraph 4, were extended for the September 1980 survey of Persons Not in the Labour Force to exclude 24,900 persons who had a job but had been away from work without pay for four weeks or more up to the end of the survey week. For all other surveys of Persons Not in the Labour Force, such persons were included in the scope of the survey and asked appropriate questions.

#### **Reliability of the estimates**

16. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:

- (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. More information on this topic is given in the Technical note.
- (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.



19. Because figures have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals.

Of the Australian civilian population over 15 years of age, about 58.2 per cent are employed, 3.5 per cent are unemployed, and 38.3 per cent are not in the labour force. The majority of the estimated 2,886,900 persons aged 15 to 64 who are not in the labour force do not want a full-time or part-time job. There is, however, a significant number (619,000) who want a job but are not actively looking for work for various reasons: 73,300 of these people have been classified as discouraged job seekers because of the reasons they gave for not actively looking for work.

The majority of persons not in the labour force are females, particularly in the 15-64 age group. Although the absolute number of females who want a job (492,700) is much larger than for males (126,300), the proportion of all persons aged 15 to 64 and not in the labour force who want a job is approximately the same for both males and females (19 to 22 per cent).

As shown in Diagram 2, the proportion of persons aged 15 to 64 and not in the labour force who want a job has remained virtually constant at about 21 per cent since 1977. In fact, the absolute number of persons aged 15 to 64 and not in the labour force has also varied little during this period. Rises in the civilian population aged 15 to 64 during this time have been reflected in rises in the labour force rather than in the persons not in the labour force.






DIAGRAM 2. PROPORTION OF PERSONS NOT IN THE LABOUR FORCE WHO WANT A JOB, 1977 TO 1981

The majority of persons not in the labour force who want a job intend to look for work in the next twelve months; they are mostly available to start work but they have usually had no recent labour force experience.

The reasons given for not actively looking for work by those persons who want a job are not the same for males and females. Diagram 3 shows that there is a higher proportion (relative to the other reasons) of males who give personal considerations (particularly attending educational institution) as their reason for not looking for work. These males are predominantly in the 15 to 19 year age group and could be expected to enter the labour force in the near future. This expectation is supported by the relatively high proportion (66 per cent) of persons in this category who intend looking for work in the next twelve months. On the other hand only about 57 per cent of those (mainly females) who give family considerations as their reasons for not actively seeking a job intend to look for work. Such persons with family commitments are likely to be less able to enter the labour force especially at short notice, than are other persons not in the labour force who want a job.


Not intending to look for work in the next twelve months

The reasons given for not taking active steps to find work and the likelihood of acceptance by a potential employer may be influenced by a person's labour force experience. Diagram 4 shows that the majority of persons who want a job have neither worked nor looked for work in the previous twelve months although generally they have had a job at some time.

Of the 254,000 persons who have been in the labour force in the previous twelve months, 98,500 persons (about 2 in 5) have had a job but have not looked for work since their last job. A further 49,400 persons (about 1 in 5) have had a job in the previous 12 months and have looked for work since their last job. The remaining 106,100 persons, though having looked for work, did not work in the previous twelve months.


Of the 155,500 persons who have looked for work, only 18,700 have a job to go to while the remaining 136,800 were unsuccessful in their job search. This group includes 43,300 persons who took non-active steps to find work in the four weeks before interview week (see Table 1).

A significant majority of persons not in the labour force who want a job would prefer to work part time. Diagram 5 indicates that a little over 50 per cent of males prefer to work full time whereas females are much more likely to prefer part-time work. In addition, 60 per cent of persons who wanted a job could have started work within the four weeks following the survey week. Females are more likely than males to be available to start work. This can be explained by the fact that the majority of these females would prefer to work part time and are therefore less restricted by personal or family considerations.

#### Estimation procedure


The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

#### **Reliability of the estimates**

Since the estimates in this publication are based on 2 information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability: that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is otained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

An example of the caluculation and the use of 4. standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 19 on the previous page shows the estimated number of females in Australia who are not in the labour force and who would like a job but are responsible for children is 120,500. Since this estimate is between 100,000 and 200,000 the standard error for Australia will be between 3,900 and 5,100 in the standard error table and can be approximated as 4,100 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 116,400 to 124,600 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 112,300 to 128,700. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



5. As can be seen from the standard error table, *the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error.* Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the standard error table have not been published. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

6. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denomiator. The formula for the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE 
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

7. Considering the example from paragraph 4 above, of the 120,500 females who want a job only 16,100 or 13.4 per cent want full-time work. The standard error of 16,100 is approximately 1,800 so the relative standard error for 120,500 is 3.4 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(11.2)^2 - (3.4)^2}$  or 10.7 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (13.4 per cent) of 1.4 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of females responsible for children but wanting a full-time job is between 12.0 per cent and 14.8 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion is within the range 10.6 per cent to 16.2 per cent.

8. Published figures may also be used to estimate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such a figure is itself an estimate and is therefore subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE (x-y) =  $\sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$ 

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample.
