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#### MAIN FEATURES

Note: Survey estimates are subject to sampling variability, as explained in paragraph 19 following.

In July 1985 there were 555,100 unemployed persons (excluding those who were stood down), a decrease from 587,400 in July 1984. Of the unemployed persons in July 1985, 473,200 (85.2 per cent) were looking for full-time work and 81,900 (14.8 per cent) were looking for parttime work.

417,600 (88.3 per cent) of the unemployed persons looking for full-time work and 27,600 (33.7 per cent) looking for part-time work were registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service. The majority (89.2 per cent) of persons reported that they contacted prospective employers to find work.

The proportion of unemployed persons whose duration of current period of unemployment was 52 weeks and over increased steadily from 20.3 per cent in July 1982 to 33.6 per cent in July 1984 and was 32.3 per cent in July 1985.

In July 1985, 21.9 per cent (121,300) of unemployed persons reported that their main difficulty in finding work was that there were no vacancies at all and a further 16.9 per cent (94,100) reported that they were considered too young or too old by employers.

Of those unemployed persons who were wage or salary earners in their last full-time job and who finished working in that job in the two years ending July 1985, 40.9 per cent (110,200) had been retrenched or lost their job. This is a decrease from July 1984, when 49.5 per cent (151,500) reported this reason for leaving their last fulltime job.

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

The monthly Population Survey (which is described in The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the July 1985 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

Of the respondents to the labour force survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. This subset of respondents was asked about their job search experience, including their difficulties in finding work, steps taken to find work and whether they had had offers of employment, as well as about their educational attainment and the particulars of their last job, if any.

- 3. The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the labour force survey (described in full in The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0)) except that it was restricted to persons who were unemployed and excluded persons who were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week (including the whole of the survey week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.
- Persons who were stood down (as defined in paragraph 3 above) were excluded from the scope of this supplementary survey as it is inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience.

#### **Definitions**

- Active steps taken to find work comprise writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work; answering a newspaper advertisement for a job; checking factory or Commonwealth Employment Service noticeboards; being registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service; checking or registering with any other employment agency; advertising or tendering for work; and contacting friends or relatives.
- For this survey unemployed persons are those within the scope of the survey who were not employed during the survey week (i.e. the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week, and:
  - (a) were available for work in the survey week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the survey week); or
  - (b) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the survey week and would have started in the survey week if the job had been available then.

- 7. The number of unemployed persons in this supplementary survey differs from that published in *The Labour Force, Australia, July 1985* (6203.0) in that the latter includes persons who were *stood down*. However, persons who were stood down comprised less than 1.9 per cent of all unemployed persons.
- 8. It is impracticable to obtain information relating to the whole of the previous twelve months which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining duration of current period of unemployment (see paragraph 9 following) depend on a detailed set of questions. The items time spent looking for work and number of spells of looking for work in the previous twelve months (see paragraphs 10 and 11 following) are based on a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the term looking for work is used for these items rather than the more rigidly defined term unemployed.
- Duration of current period of unemployment is the period from the time the person began looking for work or was laid off to the end of the survey week. Thus this item measures the current (and continuing) period of unemployment rather than a completed spell. For persons who may have begun looking for work while still employed, the duration of current period of unemployment is defined as the period from the time the person last worked full-time for two weeks or more to the end of the survey week. Periods of unemployment are recorded in complete weeks and this results in a slight understatement of duration. Average (mean) duration is the duration obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been unemployed by the number of persons in that group. Median duration is the duration which divides unemployed persons into two equal groups, one comprising persons whose duration of unemployment is above the median and the other, persons whose duration is below it.
- 10. Time spent looking for work in the previous twelve months is the total number of weeks the person reported having been out of work and looking for a job, including the weeks in the current period.
- 11. The number of spells of looking for work in the previous twelve months is the number of different periods, including the current period, during which the person reported having been out of work and looking for a job.
- 12. A job is any paid employment, full-time or parttime, lasting two weeks or more.
- 13. Further definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).
- 14. Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication are as at the survey week.

#### Results of the survey

15. This publication contains only a summary of the results of the survey. Estimates shown are preliminary and may be revised. A more detailed publication will be released as soon as possible, and further information is available on request.

- 16. Results of similar surveys, the first conducted in May 1976, have been published in catalogue 6222.0.
- 17. It is proposed that this survey will next be conducted in June 1986.
- 18. A further survey was conducted in July 1982 (see *Methods of Obtaining Jobs, Australia* (6245.0)), which collected data on persons who had started a job in the six months to July 1982.

#### Reliability of the estimates

- 19. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:
  - (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they are subject to sampling variability; that is they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error. More information about this topic will be found in The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0). A table of estimated standard errors for this survey follows these notes. Estimates with a standard error of more than about 25 per cent have not been shown in this publication, as the degree of sampling variability would seriously detract from their value for most reasonable uses. Although figures for these small components can, in some cases, be derived by subtraction they should not be regarded as reliable.
  - (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
