

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
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### SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

# WHO RECEIVED TRAINING?

More employees received training in Australia in 1993 than in 1989, when the previous survey of this type was conducted.

Wage or salary earners in the last 12 months (Table 1.1 to Table 1.4)

In the 12 months prior to the survey being undertaken in April and May 1993, an estimated 86 per cent of those who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months undertook some form of training, compared to 79 per cent during the 1989 reference period. The largest component of this increase related to on-the-job training, which rose from 72 per cent to 82 per cent. The percentage receiving more formal training (i.e. undertaking study or training courses) has remained the same as in 1989 (47%). However, there has been a small change from in-house training courses (which fell by 4%) to external training courses and study for an educational qualification (which each rose by 2%) (see Diagram 1).

In the 12 month reference period, more wage or salary earners born in Australia or in the main English-speaking countries received training than did those born in other countries. An estimated 50 per cent of both the Australian born, and those born in the main English-speaking countries, undertook study or training courses, compared to 35 per cent of those born in other countries. This disparity was less noticeable for on-the-job training, where 75 per cent of those born in other countries received on-the-job training, compared to 83 per cent of those born in Australia or in the main English-speaking countries. The pattern was similar in 1989.

A divergence was also found between wage or salary earners with and without post-school qualifications. An estimated 56 per cent of wage or salary earners with post-school qualifications reported undertaking study or training courses in the 12 month period, compared to 39 per cent of those without post-school qualifications. The comparable percentages for 1989 were 56 per cent and 40 per cent respectively.

In 1993, as for 1989, a significantly greater proportion of wage or salary earners from the Australian Capital Territory (63%) undertook training than in any of the other States or Territories (between 43% and 49%).

Almost half of both male and female wage or salary earners (46% and 48% respectively) stated that they had undertaken study or training courses. Unlike the 1989 survey, there were greater percentages of females in all categories of training than males, except for employer supported external training.


Although more 15-19 and 20-24 year old wage or salary earners reported undertaking study or training courses in 1993 (63% and 54% respectively) than in 1989, study comprised the greatest part, with 'Study in 1992' reported by 57 per cent of those aged 15-19 and 35 per cent of those aged 20-24.

Fewer older workers, aged 55 to 64, received training than did younger workers. An estimated 62 per cent of these older workers received some form of training, but only 27 per cent undertook study or training courses. In 1989, just under half (49%) of those aged 55 to 64 undertook any training at all with only 24 per cent who undertook study or training courses.

While there was little difference in the overall incidence of training undertaken by full-time and part-time wage or salary earners (87% and 82% respectively), the types of training undertaken varied considerably. An estimated 36 per cent of full-time wage or salary earners undertook in-house training courses, compared with 20 per cent of those who worked part time. In contrast, 17 per cent of full-time wage or salary earners studied in 1992 compared with 24 per cent of those who worked part time.


More permanent wage or salary earners undertook employer supported external courses than did casual wage or salary earners (9% and 2% respectively). However, the percentage of casual wage or salary earners who did some form of training has increased from 73 per cent in 1989 to 82 per cent in 1993.

In 1993, wage or salary earners working in the Mining; Electricity, gas and water; Public administration and defence; and Community services industries reported the highest incidence of training. Around 90 per cent in each of these industries reported undertaking some form of training and around 60 per cent reported undertaking study or training courses. In comparison, those wage or salary earners working in Agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting reported the least training. Some 80 per cent in this industry received some form of training and 27 per cent undertook study or training courses (see Diagram 2).


The greatest proportion of wage or salary earners by occupation who undertook training in 1993 were Professionals. An estimated 96 per cent of Professionals received some form of training in the 12 month period and 70 per cent undertook study or training courses. Plant and machine operators, and drivers had the lowest proportion receiving some form of training (72%). While the amount of training undertaken by wage or salary earners in each of the ASCO Major Occupation Groups has increased since 1989, the relativities between these groups remain unchanged (see Diagram 3).

More wage or salary earners working in the public sector undertook study or training courses (61%) than those working in the private sector (42%). These proportions are largely unchanged from 1989 (62% and 42% respectively).

As the size of the main period employer increased, so did the incidence of training. Some 36 per cent of wage or salary earners working at locations with fewer than 10 employees undertook study or training courses compared to 55 per cent of those working at locations with 100 or more employees. 'Main period employer' refers to the employer for whom the wage or salary earner worked for the longest. A full explanation is found in the Glossary (page 56).


However, employer size made little difference to the amount of on-the-job training received. An estimated 79 per cent of wage or salary earners working at locations with fewer than 10 employees received on-the-job training compared with 83 per cent of those working at locations with more than 100 employees.

The incidence of training also tended to increase as usual weekly earnings increased. Approximately 42 per cent of those wage or salary earners who earned less than \$200 per week undertook study or training courses compared with 81 per cent of those who earned between \$1000 and \$1040 per week.

However, those with lower earnings were more likely to have studied in 1992 than those with higher earnings (around 30% of those who earned less than \$200 compared with 17% of those who earned between \$1000 and \$1040).

Persons who were employed, unemployed or marginally attached to the labour force at the time of the survey (Table 1.5)

Of the estimated 9,241,900 persons in this group at the time of the survey:

- Almost 50 per cent of employees had undertaken study or training courses compared with 23 per cent of employers and 15 per cent of self-employed persons (see Diagram 4).
- Almost twice as many unemployed persons as marginally attached persons undertook study or training courses (36% compared with 21%).
   'Marginally attached' is used to describe those persons who were neither employed nor unemployed but who wanted to work. A full explanation is found in the Glossary (page 56).
- Amongst the unemployed, 40 per cent of females undertook study or training courses in the 12 month period compared to 33 per cent of males.


## WHAT TRAINING WAS UNDERTAKEN?

In 1993, there were more than 3 times as many attendances at in-house training courses in the 12 month period than at external courses (5,687,300 compared to 1,839,500).

Of the estimated 5,687,300 attendances at in-house courses, some 98 per cent of attendances were by participants who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months (Table 2.1 and Table 2.3). Of these 5,581,900 attendances:

- Just over half were by those who were private sector employees.
- Some 80 per cent were by those working for employers who had more than 100 employees throughout Australia.
- Around 90 per cent were by those who had been with their main period employer for more than a year.
- There were more attendances by participants who were Professionals and Clerks (27% and 18% respectively) than for other occupations.
- Management and professional courses accounted for almost one third of attendances, followed by Technical and para-professional courses (14%) (see Diagram 5).
- Some 47 per cent of attendances at Management and professional courses and 57 per cent of attendances at Technical and para-professional courses were by those working in the Community Services industry.
- Most attendances (82%) were by participants who were full-time, permanent employees.
- Those who were casual employees had more attendances in the Sales and personal service field (28%) than in any other field.

Of the estimated 1,839,500 attendances at external courses (Table 2.6) in the 12 month reference period:

- An estimated 11 per cent were by those who were either unemployed or marginally attached to the labour force at the time of the survey.
- Those who were employed at the time of the survey attended more Management and professional courses than any other type (36% of attendances). In contrast, those who were not employed attended more General computing skills courses than any other type (19% of attendances).

Of the attendances at external courses, some 1,394,700 attendances were by those who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months (Table 22 and Table 2.4). Of this group:

- Almost two thirds were by those who were private sector employees.
- Some 20 per cent of attendances were by participants who were part-time employees.
- Management and professional courses accounted for just over one third of attendances (see Diagram 6).
- There were more attendances by participants who were Professionals (35% of attendances) and Salespersons and personal service workers (14% of attendances) than by other occupations.

Of the estimated 9,241,900 persons in, or marginally attached to, the labour force at the time of the survey, approximately 1,513,600 (16%) studied for an educational qualification in 1992 (Table 2.8). Of those who had studied:

- Almost three quarters were employees at the time of the survey, 20 per cent were either unemployed or marginally attached to the labour force, and the remaining 6 per cent worked in their own business.
- Nearly all (95%) reported studying for that qualification for vocational reasons.
- More reported studying for a bachelor degree (22%) than any other type of qualification.

An estimated 1,316,100 persons who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months had also studied in 1992. Of these persons, more had studied for a qualification in Business and administration (18%) than in any other field. However, amongst males, Engineering was the most popular field of study (20%) followed by Business and administration (17%). For females, 19 per cent studied Business and administration, and a further 17 per cent reported Society and culture as their main field of study (Table 2.5).

# WHAT SUPPORT WAS RECEIVED FOR TRAINING?


An estimated 3,514,500 persons who were wage or salary earners in the last 12 months either attended a training course in the reference period or studied for an educational qualification in either 1992 or 1993 (Table 3.1). Of these:

- 75 per cent received employer support for some of that training or study. Almost 35 per cent did some training or study without employer support.
- Around 35 per cent of casual employees attending training courses or studying did so with employer support, with 73.8 per cent doing some training or study without employer support.

Of the estimated 1,937,900 persons who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months and who required an educational qualification to obtain that job, an estimated 731,700 (38%) received employer support to study for that qualification (Table 32). Of these:

- Most (60%) had received that support from an employer other than their main period employer.
- Some 44 per cent had studied for skilled vocational qualifications.
- 'Paid study leave' and 'Paid for materials or fees' were the two most commonly reported forms of employer support.

Of the estimated 752,000 persons who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months and had attended external courses, just over two thirds (67%) received some support from their main period employer for the external courses they attended (Table 3.8).

Another way to measure the level of employer support for training, apart from monetary support, is to examine the amount of time spent undertaking training while employed.

- Of the 5,581,900 attendances at in-house courses by those who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months, some 35 per cent lasted 40 hours or more. Male participants had more attendances at these longer courses than did female participants (42% compared with 27%) (Table 3.4).
- Of the 1,281,500 attendances by wage or salary earners at external courses while working, 29 per cent of attendances were at courses lasting 40 hours or more. However, the disparity in the proportion of male and female attendances at these longer courses was less marked than for in-house courses. Almost one third of attendances by males lasted 40 hours or more, compared with 26 per cent of attendances by females (Table 3.5).

Apart from employers, support for training can be provided from other sources (*Table 3.9*). For the 1,054,700 persons in, or marginally attached to, the labour force who had also attended an external training course:

- Some 726,400 (69%) reported drawing upon some form of non-employer support, with 598,000 (57%) providing their own support.
- Many more of the 143,000 who were not employed received government support (53%) than did those who were employed (6%).

# WHAT TRAINING WAS REQUIRED TO OBTAIN JOBS?

Of the estimated 7,078,700 persons who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months, 3,381,100 (48%) held a post-school qualification, very similar to the 1989 estimate of 47 per cent (Table 4.1).

Some 29 per cent of males and 26 per cent of females in the 1993 survey reported that a qualification was required to obtain their job with their main period employer (Table 4.1).

Of the 3,381,100 persons who held a post-school qualification (Table 4.3):

- More people working in the Community services industry required a qualification to obtain their job (79%) than those working in other ASIC Industry Divisions.
- Employees working for larger businesses were required to have qualifications more often than employees working for smaller businesses, 64% of those working for businesses with 100 or more employees throughout Australia, compared with 41% of those working for businesses with less than 10 employees throughout Australia.
- Almost three quarters of public sector employees required a qualification, compared with just under half of private sector employees.
- The level of qualification most required by the main period employer was a bachelor degree or higher, comprising almost one third of the required qualifications.

### HOW WAS TRAINING PROVIDED?

Wage or salary earners in the last 12 months
Persons who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months
comprised 98 per cent of those who had attended an
in-house training course in the 12 month reference period
(Table 5.1). Of these 2,214,200 persons:

- Most (94%) reported that their main course was conducted with an instructor, with very little variation from this percentage amongst the different fields. Of those courses with instructors, about 85 per cent also had structured notes or a manual, and relatively few (14%) were 'self-paced' courses.
- Overall, some 79 per cent of all main courses were conducted totally in work time, although more wage or salary earners whose main course was in the field of Sales and personal service or Trade or craft stated that their course was conducted totally out of work time (18% and 17% respectively).
- About one third of wage or salary earners had their main course assessed, although almost three quarters of those whose main course was in the field of Transport and machinery operation reported that it had been assessed.
- Of the main courses that had been assessed, the most common forms of assessment were 'practical demonstration' (55%) and 'written tests or exams' (47%) (note that these are multi-response categories).
- Some 42 per cent stated that their main course was part of a larger training program.

An estimated 78 per cent of persons who attended an external course had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months (Table 52). Of these 835,600 persons:


 As with in-house courses, nearly all (96%) reported that their main course was conducted with an instructor, again with very little variation amongst the different fields. Of those courses with instructors, about 86 per cent also had structured notes or a manual, and relatively few (16%) were self-paced courses.

- Overall, Educational institutions and Training consultants each conducted about 20 per cent of the main courses. However, Professional and industrial associations conducted 42 per cent of the main courses in the Management and professional field while Equipment suppliers or manufacturers provided 37 per cent of the main courses in the Sales and personal service field.
- Some 35 per cent of main courses were assessed, although only 24 per cent of the main courses in the Management and professional field were assessed, compared with 57 per cent in the General health and safety field.
- Almost one quarter of wage or salary earners in the last 12 months reported that their main course was part of a larger training program.

Persons who were employed, unemployed or marginally attached to the labour force at the time of the survey Of the estimated 7,584,600 persons who were employed at the time of the survey, 2,199,600 (29%) had attended training courses in work time (Table 5.4). Of these:


- Most (92%) were employees, with employers and the self-employed each comprising 4 per cent.
- Employees had the least difficulty in attending courses, with 68 per cent of employees reporting 'No difficulties', compared to 56 per cent of the self-employed and 39 per cent of employers.
- Of those who reported difficulties, finding time to attend courses presented the greatest problem, with 76 per cent of employers and 61 per cent of the self-employed giving either 'No time' or 'Scheduling work and training' as their main difficulty. Some 69 per cent of employees gave these reasons, although 'Location of training' posed the greatest problem for a further 14 per cent.

For one third of the 5,385,000 employed persons who did not attend a training course in work time, the perception that there was 'No need or little difference to work prospects' was their main reason for not attending, although 22 per cent gave 'No time' or 'Scheduling work and training'. A further 20 per cent gave 'No courses available' as their main reason (Table 5.4).

Only 1,058,400 employed persons (14%) had attended a course in their own time, of whom 383,700 (36%) had all costs paid for by their employer. The remaining 674,700 either worked in their own business or had either some costs or no costs paid for by their employer (Table 5.3).

Of the 6,526,200 employed persons who did not attend a course in their own time, the main reasons for not attending were similar to those reported by persons who did not attend courses in work time. One third reported 'No need, little difference to work prospects' as their main reason and a further 29 per cent gave 'No time' or 'Scheduling of work and training' as their main reason (Table 5.3).

Of the estimated 9,241,900 persons in, or marginally attached to, the labour force at the time of the survey, 1,054,700 (11%) had attended at least one external training course (Table 5.6). Of this group:

- Almost all (96%) had their main course conducted with an instructor.
- For just over one third of persons who were unemployed or marginally attached, the external courses that they attended were provided by Community or adult education centres, with a further one third attending external courses that were provided by Educational institutions.
- In contrast, some 258,100 employed persons (28%) attended external courses that were provided by Professional or industrial associations, while a further 179,800 (20%) attended external courses that were provided by Training consultants (see Diagram 7).

Of the estimated 9,241,900 persons in, or marginally attached to, the labour force at the time of the survey, 1,513,600 (16%) had studied for an educational qualification in 1992 (Table 5.7). Of this group:

- Just over two thirds of those students who were unemployed or marginally attached studied full time, compared with one third of those who were employed,
- Of the 599,100 full-time students, 45 per cent were enrolled at universities, with a further 24 per cent enrolled at secondary schools. In contrast, some 61 per cent of part-time students were enrolled at TAFE colleges, with a further 22 per cent enrolled at universities.
- More students were enrolled at TAFE colleges (39%) than at universities (34%). Marginally attached persons were more likely to be enrolled at a university than a TAFE college (42% and 27% respectively).

An estimated 1,251,500 persons who were working as wage or salary earners at the time of the survey (21%) were involved in the provision of some form of vocational training. Just over half of those who provided training were involved in conducting training, although most (85%) spent only 25 per cent or less of their working time on conducting training (Table 5.5).

# WHY WAS TRAINING UNDERTAKEN AND WITH WHAT OUTCOMES?

Persons who were wage or salary earners in the 12 month reference period undertook their main in-house course and main external course while they had a job for different reasons and with differing outcomes (Table 6.1 and Table 6.2):

- More (17%) did their main in-house course to help obtain a promotion than those who reported that the main external course they attended while working was undertaken to help them obtain a promotion (12%).
- Similarly, 21 per cent believed that their main in-house course was necessary for them to obtain a promotion, compared with 9 per cent who believed it of the main external course they attended while working.
- A smaller proportion (40%) did their main in-house course for retraining than did so in respect of the main external course they attended while working (46%).
- Most (85%) considered that skills gained from their main in-house course could be transferred to another employer, while 91 per cent considered that skills gained from the main external course they attended while working were transferable.
- A similar proportion of those who believed that their main in-house course had resulted in improved job performance (see Diagram 8), believed that the main external course they attended while working resulted in improved job performance (84% and 81% respectively).

Of the 5,708,200 employees working with their main period employer at the time of the survey (Table 6.3 and Table 6.4):

 Almost three quarters believed that, since they began working for that employer, they had received adequate job training. An additional 12 per cent did not believe that they had any need for training.


- More older employees than younger employees claimed that they had no need for training, 32 per cent of those aged 60 to 64 compared with 5 per cent of those aged 15 to 19.
- Some 23 per cent of those born in Australia and whose first language was not English did not consider that they had received adequate job training, as did 24 per cent of persons of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin.
- An estimated 22 per cent of employees working for businesses with fewer than 10 employees believed that they had no need for training, compared with just 8 per cent of those working for businesses with 100 or more employees (see Diagram 9).

Of the estimated 9,241,900 persons who were in, or marginally attached to, the labour force at the time of the survey (Table 6.5):

- Some 42 per cent of employees had some word processing skills, compared with 29 per cent of employers, 23 per cent of the self-employed, one third of the unemployed and 28 per cent of those marginally attached to the labour force.
- For each area of computer usage, except specific specialist packages, a greater percentage of persons who were either unemployed or marginally attached to the labour force reported having at least basic knowledge than did self-employed persons.
- More females than males had some word processing skills (44% and 31% respectively) and similarly for data entry skills (39% and 33% respectively), although males were more likely to have some programming or systems development skills than females (14% compared to 8%).
- At least some skills with spreadsheet software was reported by 27 per cent of employees, 19 per cent of employers, 13 per cent of the self-employed, 19 per cent of the unemployed and 16 per cent of the marginally attached.

### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

This publication presents results from the Survey of Training and Education, conducted throughout Australia during April and May 1993. The survey obtained information on training and education undertaken by persons during the preceding 12 months.

- 2. Information collected includes socio-demographic characteristics (such as sex, age, earnings and educational attainment), work history details (such as occupation, industry and job tenure), recent study for educational qualifications, and details of training courses attended (such as time spent on, and employer support for, training courses).
- 3. A full list of data items relating to the survey is included (starting at page 61), while a summary of topics is given in paragraph 17 below.

### Scope

### Geographical Areas

4. The survey was conducted in both rural and urban areas in all States and Territories.

### **Dwellings**

5. The survey covered both private and 'special' dwellings. Private dwellings are houses, flats, home units, and any other structures used as private places of residence at the time of the survey. Special dwellings are hotels, motels, hostels, hospitals, caravan parks, etc.

#### Persons

- 6. The survey included all persons aged 15 to 64 years who had worked as wage or salary earners ('employees') in the last 12 months as well as those who, at the time of the survey, were employers, self-employed, unemployed or marginally attached to the labour force, except:
  - members of the permanent defence forces;
  - certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
  - overseas residents in Australia;
  - members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependents) stationed in Australia;
  - · persons who were permanently unable to work;
  - boarding school pupils not resident in households, some patients in hospitals and sanatoriums and inmates of gaols, reformatories, etc.;
  - persons aged 15 to 20 years still at school; and
  - persons working as unpaid family helpers or solely for payment in kind unless they had also held a wage or salary job in the last 12 months. Note that persons who work as unpaid family helpers or for payment in kind are included in estimates of employed persons in The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0).

- 7. In The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0), persons who work in their own limited liability company, (either with or without other staff) are classified as employees. For this survey, persons who work in their own limited liability company are classified as either employers or self-employed, depending on whether or not they employ other staff apart from themselves.
- 8. In addition, estimates of employees in this publication include some who are excluded from estimates of employees in *The Labour Force*, Australia (6203.0). These are wage or salary earners who were away from work:
  - on worker's compensation and were not returning (or were unsure about returning) to their employer;
  - · for 4 weeks or more without pay; or
  - because they were stood down without pay for less than 4 weeks (for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown).
- 9. In *The Labour Force*, Australia (6203.0) these persons would be classified as unemployed or not in the labour force, according to their activity in the reference week.
- 10. Therefore, the estimates of employed persons, employers, self-employed persons, employees and unemployed persons published in this survey will differ from those published in *The Labour Force*, Australia (6203.0).

### Coverage

11. Coverage rules were applied which aimed to ensure that each person eligible on scope was associated with only one dwelling and hence had only one chance of selection.

### Data collection methodology

- 12. Households were selected at random using a sample similar to that of the monthly population survey. The monthly population survey, which is described in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0), comprises the monthly labour force and supplementary topics and is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 31,000 houses, flats, etc.) and a list sample of special dwelling units
- 13. The Survey of Training and Education was conducted over six weeks, during April and May 1993, with an initial sample of around 18,600 dwellings. After allowing for sample loss (eg. household selected in the sample had no residents in scope for the survey, derelict buildings, buildings under construction, etc.), the effective sample was some 12,600 dwellings, yielding approximately 24,500 completed interviews for the survey.
- 14. Data was collected in personal interviews with trained interviewers. The target populations were identified early in the interview and were then asked

detailed questions about their training and education experience.

#### **Definitions**

- 15. Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication relate to the week before the interview.
- 16. Definitions of the main field of study for post-school qualifications appearing in this publication are given in the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ), 1993 (1262.0).

## Survey data

- 17. The main topics covered in the 1993 Survey of Training and Education were:
  - socio-demographic characteristics (including income and educational attainment);
  - labour force characteristics at the time of the survey;
  - · work history;
  - · recent study for educational qualifications;
  - whether qualifications were required to obtain job with main period employer;
  - · in-house training courses;
  - · external training courses;
  - · computer usage and proficiency;
  - · training requirements;
  - · barriers to training; and
  - · training provision.

### Results of the survey

- 18. It should be noted that due to differences in scope, sample size, definitions and estimation methodology, there will be differences between estimates in this publication and estimates given in *The Labour Force*, *Australia* (6203.0) and publications from surveys conducted as supplements to the monthly labour force survey.
- 19. Also, note that while the Employer Training Expenditure (6353.0) survey and the Survey of Training and Education ask conceptually similar questions, differences in scope (businesses vs. individuals) and methodology (company records vs. personal interview) mean that comparisons between the two will require qualification.
- 20. Results of the previous survey were published in How Workers Get Their Training, Australia, 1989 (6278.0).

### Unpublished tables

21. As well as the statistics included in this and related publications, the ABS may have other relevant unpublished data available. Inquiries should be made to the contact officer named at the front of this publication.

# Comparability with the 1989 survey

- 22. The 1993 Survey of Training and Education expands on the 1989 *How Workers Get Their Training* survey in terms of both scope and content. The main areas of change are:
  - the scope was expanded to include those who, at the time of the survey, were employers, self-employed, unemployed or marginally attached to the labour force;
  - · more details on computer training and usage; and
  - additional ethnicity indicators, including non-English speaking background and Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander origin,
- 23. Data was collected for the first time on:
  - · second highest qualification obtained;
  - · highest overseas qualification obtained;
  - · training requirements;
  - · barriers to training; and
  - training provision.
- 24. As the 1989 survey only included persons aged 15 to 64 years who had worked as wage or salary earners in the preceding 12 months, care should be taken with any comparisons between the 1989 and 1993 surveys.

## Discontinuities in the series

- 25. The Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications, (ABSCQ), 1993, was developed to be used as the standard classification for statistics on post-school qualifications across all ABS collections. It is used here for the first time, after adaptation for its use in household surveys.
- 26. The ABSCQ, as used in this survey, differs from the classification used in the 1989 survey in that it:
  - collects seven levels of attainment based on the following criteria: the minimum entry requirements, the duration and the theoretical orientation of the course; and
  - collects broad field of study, as a separate unique entity from level of attainment.
- 27. In the 1989 survey, five levels of attainment were collected, with field of study collected as an integral part of the level.
- 28. In the 1989 survey, all persons in scope for the survey were asked about qualifications required to obtain their main period job (if any). In the 1993 survey, only those persons with post-school qualifications (as defined in the glossary) were asked about qualifications required to obtain their main period job.
- 29. In the 1989 survey, all who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months were asked about in-house training. However, those who worked both in their own business and as wage or salary earners were treated differently in the 1993 survey. For self-employed persons,

no questions were asked about in-house training courses. This group comprises 0.7% of those who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months. For employers, questions relevant to their wage or salary job were not asked. This group comprises 0.5% of persons who attended an in-house training course and were also wage or salary earners in the last 12 months.

### Survey sample redesign

30. The sample used for this survey was designed and selected using information collected in the 1991 Population Census. The sample for the 1989 survey was based on information collected in the 1986 Population Census. As a result, the standard errors used in this survey differ from those used in the 1989 survey.

# Estimation procedure

31. The estimates were derived by use of a ratio estimation procedure. This ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution (based on the average of the months of April and May) of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

## Reliability of the estimates

32. Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. For further information refer to the Technical Notes, page 52.

### **TECHNICAL NOTES**

Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

- 2. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. Tables of standard errors for general application are given on the following pages. These numbers will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude. Use Table A for person estimates, Table B for 'number of in-house training courses' estimates and Table C for 'number of external training courses' estimates.
- 3. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. A similar procedure applies for the calculation of standard errors for training course estimates. Table 1.5 of the publication shows the estimated number of employed persons who had undertaken study or training courses to be 3,226,500. Since this estimate is between 2,000,000 and 5,000,000, the standard error for Australia will be between 21,600 and 29,700 and can be approximated as 24,900 (using Table A and rounding to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the

value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 3,201,600 to 3,251,400 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 3,176,700 to 3,276,300. This example is illustrated in the preceding diagram.

- 4. As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with relative standard errors of 25 per cent or less are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates with larger relative standard errors have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. \*3.4) to indicate they are subject to high standard errors and should be used with caution.
- 5. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE 
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE (x)]^2 - [RSE (y)]^2}$$

- 6. Considering the example from paragraph 3 above, of the 3,226,500 employed persons who had undertaken some training or study, 2,525,500 or 78.3 per cent were born in Australia. The standard error of 2,525,500 is approximately 23,000 so the relative standard error is 0.9 per cent. The relative standard error for 3,226,500 is 0.8 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is  $\sqrt{(0.9)^2 (0.8)^2}$  or 0.4 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (78.3 per cent) of 0.3 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of employed persons who had undertaken study or training courses and who were born in Australia was between 78.0 per cent and 78.6 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty that the proportion was within the range 77.7 per cent to 78.9 per cent.
- 7. Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE 
$$(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

- 8. While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or sub-populations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.
- 9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused

with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents, and errors made in coding and processing data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

### **GLOSSARY**

Actively looking for work: comprises any of the following steps:

- writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work;
- · answering a newspaper advertisement for a job;
- checking factory or Commonwealth Employment Service noticeboards;
- being registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service;
- checking or registering with any other employment agency;
- · advertising or tendering for work; and
- · contacting friends or relatives.

Associate diploma: the entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 12 or the completion of Year 10 and a prerequisite certificate course. The duration of study ranges from 1 to 2 years full-time study or equivalent. Courses provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary to give support to professionals, and for positions in advanced trade, technical or associate professional occupations. Examples are an Associate Diploma in Business Administration, an Associate Diploma of Engineering in Civil Engineering, an Advanced Certificate in Panelbeating, a Certificate of Technology in Architectural Drafting and a Technician Certificate in Foundry Practice.

Bachelor degree: the entry requirement is the satisfactory completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study ranges from 3 to 6 years full-time study or equivalent. Courses are designed to provide students with a systematic and coherent introduction to a broad body of knowledge. The emphasis is on the underlying principles and concepts of that body of knowledge. Examples are a Bachelor of Architecture, a Bachelor of Education in Early Childhood Teaching and a Bachelor of Science in Mathematics or Statistics (Honours).

Basic vocational qualifications: often require Year 10 completion, however many courses have no formal entry requirements. The duration of study ranges from 1 semester to 1 year of full-time study or equivalent. Courses provide individuals with the practical skills and background knowledge necessary for employment at the operative level in many different fields. Examples are a Pre-apprenticeship in Plumbing, a Certificate in Shorthand and Keyboarding, a Traineeship Certificate in Advertising, a Pre-vocational Certificate in Automotive Mechanics and a Certificate of Applied Science in Textile Technology.

Casual employees: employees who were entitled to neither paid holiday leave nor paid sick leave with their main period employer.

Conducting training courses: multi-response categories comprising 'Developing courses', 'Delivering courses' and 'Evaluating courses'.

Course: represents a planned series of learning experiences in a particular range of subject matter or skills, offered by a sponsoring agency and undertaken by 1 or more students. See entries for Training courses, Principal courses, In-house training courses and External training courses.

Duration of continuous employment with main period employer: the total amount of time as a wage or salary earner with the main period employer. Periods of leave without pay, on strike, etc. are included. Where a person ceased working for their main period employer and was subsequently re-hired, only the most recent period of employment was recorded. Full years of employment were recorded where the cumulative period of employment was more than a year.

Educational institution: any institution whose primary role is education. Included are schools, universities, colleges of technical and further education, public and private colleges, etc. Excluded are institutions whose primary role is not education (e.g. hospitals).

Educational qualification: a course of study for which an award is conferred upon completion. Secondary school certificates and certificates which require the equivalent of less than 1 semester full-time study to complete are included. Note that these educational qualifications are not considered to be post-school qualifications.

Employed persons: persons aged 15 to 64 who, during the reference week:

- worked for 1 hour or more for pay, profit or commission in a job, business, or farm (comprising employees, employers and self-employed persons); or
- who had a job but were not at work.

This definition differs from that given in *The Labour Force Australia* (6203.0). See paragraphs 6-10 of the Explanatory Notes for details.

Employee: an employed person who, during the reference week, worked for an employer for wages or salary. This definition differs from that given in *The Labour Force Australia* (6203.0). See paragraphs 6-10 of the Explanatory Notes for details.

Employer: an employed person who, during the reference week, worked in his or her own business (including limited liability companies) with 1 or more employees. This definition differs from that given in *The Labour Force Australia* (6203.0). See paragraphs 6-10 of the Explanatory Notes for details.

Employer support: multi-response categories comprising 'Paid for study materials or fees', 'Provided paid study leave', 'Paid for accommodation or travel expenses' or 'Other support'.

Employment status: classified according to the person's activity during the reference week. See entries for Employed, Employer, Self-employed, Employee, Unemployed, and Marginally attached to the labour force.

External training courses: training which is organised and conducted by training or educational establishments, agencies or consultants other than the respondent's employer/business. It excludes study for an educational qualification. Details were collected on up to 4 courses attended in the last 12 months.

External (training), employer supported: persons who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months were asked whether any of up to 4 external training courses undertaken in that time had been supported by an employer. Support comprises 'Paid for study materials or fees', 'Provided paid study leave', 'Paid for accommodation or travel expenses' or 'Other support'.

Field of training: classified according to the main content of the course or program undertaken to provide or upgrade skills. The 17 fields of training collected are:

- Management and professional;
- · Technical and para-professional;
- · Trade:
- Craft;
- · Clerical or office;
- · Sales and personal service;
- · Transport and machinery operation;
- · Labouring and related;
- Induction (i.e. for new employees);
- · General supervision;
- General computing;
- · General health and safety;
- English language;
- · Literacy;
- Numeracy;
- Music and arts; and
- · Other.

Full-time employee with main period employer: persons who usually worked 35 hours or more per week in their job with their main period employer.

Full-time students: persons who consider themselves to be attending full-time, or are classified as full-time by the institution which they are attending.

Higher degree: includes doctorates and masters degrees. The minimum entry requirements are usually a masters degree or first class honours for a doctorate and first class honours for a masters degree. The duration of study is a minimum of 2 to 4 years for a doctorate and 2 years full-time or equivalent for a masters degree. This level of qualification is designed to recognise significant contributions to original research or the application of knowledge within a given field of study. Examples are a Doctor of Veterinary Studies, a Doctor of Education in Curriculum (EdD), a Master of Counselling, a Master of Arts in Sociology and a Fellowship of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians (FRACP).

Highest level of secondary school available: the highest level of secondary schooling (or equivalent) offered by the education system at the time the person left school.

Industry: classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC), 1983. For those who have worked as a wage or salary earner in the last 12 months, it is the industry of their main period employer. For those who have only worked in their own business, it is the industry of that business. Unpublished industry data are available at the Group (3 digit) level.

In-house training courses: training organised by a person's employer or business primarily for their own staff and using the employers' or business' staff or training consultants. Details were collected on up to 4 courses attended in the last 12 months.

Labour force: persons who, during the reference week, were employed or unemployed, as defined.

Last 12 months: the 12 months prior to being interviewed. Interviews were conducted in April and May 1993.

Level of computing proficiency: a respondent's self-assessment of his/her level of proficiency in 7 categories of computing skills (excluding computer games), viz. word processing, data entry, database retrieval, spreadsheets, specialist packages programming, systems development and other, according to the following scale:

- nil have not used computers in this area;
- basic knowledge of the subject limited to specific fields of work;
- intermediate good overall knowledge of 1 or more areas of application of these skills; and
- advanced able to take initiative in expanding the application of these skills.

Level of educational attainment: measures the highest post-school qualification attained by the respondent. For the purposes of the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ), 1993, level of attainment is the recognition, by an accredited authority, that a person possesses knowledge and practical ability of a certain quality and quantity. The 7 categories for level of attainment are:

- · Higher degree;
- Postgraduate diploma;
- · Bachelor degree;
- Undergraduate diploma;
- · Associate diploma;
- · Skilled vocational qualifications; and
- · Basic vocational qualifications.

Note: persons who could not categorise their postschool qualification to one of these levels were classified to 'Other'. Persons who reported attaining a certificate qualification that required the equivalent of less than 1 semester full-time study to complete, or who reported having returned to complete a secondary school certificate, are not considered to have attained a post-school qualification.

Level of educational qualification required to obtain job with main period employer: for persons with post-school qualifications, the minimum educational qualification required to obtain their job with their main period employer.

Main English-speaking countries: comprises United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, USA and New Zealand.

Main external training course attended in the last 12 months: the external training course on which the respondent spent the most time over the last 12 months.

Main external training course attended in the last 12 months while working: of the external training courses attended while employed, the one on which most time was spent."

Main field of study: persons who had obtained, or were studying for, a post-school qualification (as defined according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics Classification of Qualifications (ABSCQ), 1993) indicated the main field of study for that qualification.

Main in-house training course: the in-house training course on which the respondent spent the most time over the last 12 months.

Main period employer: the employer for whom the respondent worked the most weeks for wages or salary during the last 12 months. The main period employer need not be their current employer.

Marginally attached to the labour force: persons aged 15 to 64 who were not in the labour force in the reference week, who wanted to work and who were either:

- actively looking for work but did not meet the criteria to be classified as unemployed; or
- not actively looking for work but were available to start work within 4 weeks if childcare was available (for any children aged under 12 years).

Multi-response categories: respondents were asked to nominate as many of the listed categories as were applicable to them. Note that sub-totals relate to the number of persons giving responses, not the number of responses given. Consequently, the sum of individual multi-response categories will be greater than the sub-total.

No training undertaken: see entry for Some training undertaken.

Number of employers in the last 12 months: the number of employers worked for during the last 12 months for wages or salary.

Occupation: classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO), 1986. For those who have worked as a wage or salary earner in the last 12 months, it is the occupation in the job with their main period employer. For those who have only worked in their own business, it is their occupation in that business. Unpublished data are available at the Unit Group (4 digit) level.

On-the-job training: respondents were asked to indicate whether any of the following activities were undertaken to improve their job skills while employed in any job over the last 12 months:

- · being shown how to do the job;
- watching others work (including examining other workers' product);
- · asking questions of co-workers; and
- · teaching self.

It excludes training that occurred as part of an in-house or external training course or study for an educational qualification.

Other educational institution: includes religious colleges; teaching hospitals; and overseas institutions.

Other training activities: multi-response categories comprising:

- · assessment of training needs;
- development of training plans;
- · administrative support of training programs;
- · marketing training programs; and
- · other training activities.

Part-time employee with main period employer: persons who usually worked less than 35 hours a week in their job with their main period employer.

Part-time students: persons who consider themselves to be attending part-time, or are classified as part-time by the institution which they are attending.

Permanent employees: employees who were entitled to either paid holiday or paid sick leave with their main period employer.

Persons in, or marginally attached to, the labour force: persons aged 15 to 64 who were either employed, unemployed or marginally attached to the labour force (as defined) during the reference week.

Persons who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months: those who stated they had worked in a job for wages or salary in the 12 months prior to being interviewed.

Postgraduate diploma: includes Graduate Certificates. The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of a bachelor degree or an undergraduate diploma. The duration of study ranges from 6 months (for a Graduate Certificate) to 1 year full-time study or equivalent. Courses usually build on undergraduate studies, and are designed to broaden or develop professional knowledge and skills in a related or new area of study. Examples are a Graduate Diploma in Teacher Librarianship, a Graduate Diploma of Business in Hospitality, a Diploma in Clinical Pathology, a Diploma of Education in Special Education and a Graduate Certificate in Business.

Principal courses: refers to the course(s) on which the respondent spent the most time in the last 12 months. Details were collected on up to 4 in-house and/or up to 4 external courses. See entries for Training courses, In-house training courses and External training courses.

Recreational study: study or training undertaken primarily for social and personal pursuits, e.g. hobby, personal development, do-it-yourself home or car improvement or maintenance courses.

Reference week: the week before the interview.

Retraining: training done with the specific purpose of enabling the respondent to do a kind of work different to that performed in the job held at the time of training. Multi-response categories were collected from persons who had a wage or salary job in the last 12 months.

Sector of employer: relates to an employee's job with his or her main period employer. Public sector includes all local government authorities and government departments, agencies and authorities created by, or reporting to, the Commonwealth or State Parliaments. All remaining employees are classified as private sector, except where the main period employer was overseas or could not be classified. These were coded to 'Overseas' and 'Not known' respectively.

Self-employed: an employed person who, during the reference week, worked in his or her own business (including limited liability companies) with no employees. This definition differs from that given in *The Labour Force Australia* (6203.0). See paragraphs 6-10 of the Explanatory Notes for details.

Self-paced course: a monitored course where the attendee sets the rate of progress, e.g. an interactive computer course. The course may also have an instructor or a manual.

Size of business: the number of persons employed by a respondent's employer/own business throughout Australia.

Size of location: the number of persons employed at the location of the respondent's job with his or her employer/own business.

Skilled vocational qualifications: the entry requirement is usually the completion of Year 10 or its equivalent. In addition, some courses may require a student to be concurrently employed in that specific field. The duration of study is 2 to 4 years, and typically involves some on-the-job training. Courses provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary to work in a specific vocation, recognised trade or craft that requires a high degree of skill in a range of related activities. Examples are a Trade Certificate in Vehicle Building, a Certificate in Landscape Design and an Apprenticeship in Electrical Fitting.

Some training undertaken: refers only to whether a respondent has undertaken at least 1 of the following types of training:

- study in 1992;
- in-house training course(s);
- · external training course(s); or
- on-the-job training.

If none of these were undertaken, then the respondent was classified to 'No training undertaken'. There were an estimated 51,000 persons (or 0.5% of those in, or marginally attached to, the labour force) whose only form of training was 'Study in 1993' who were not classified to 'Some training undertaken'.

Studied for an educational qualification: study done with the intention of it leading to a higher degree, postgraduate diploma, bachelor degree, undergraduate diploma, associate diploma, skilled vocational qualifications, basic vocational qualifications or any other qualification. It is not necessary to have completed the course or to have been awarded the qualification. Details were collected on the first qualification studied for in 1992 and the most recent course of study in 1993.

TAFE college: college of technical and further education.

Time spent on in-house/external training courses: the average number of hours spent on a training course per day (as stated by the respondent), multiplied by the number of days spent on that course.

Total time spent on external training courses attended in the last 12 months: the sum of time spent on a maximum of 4 external training courses attended in the last 12 months. Total time spent on external training courses attended in the last 12 months while working: the sum of time spent on a maximum of 4 external training courses attended in the last 12 months while employed.

Total time spent on in-house training courses attended in the last 12 months: the sum of time spent on a maximum of 4 in-house training courses attended in the last 12 months.

Training courses: training activities which are designed and/or undertaken to maintain, develop or learn skills related to job performance and/or competency. They consist of periods of instruction or a combination of instruction and monitored practical work. The instruction can include workshops, lectures, tutorials, training seminars, audio-visual presentations, demonstration sessions or monitored self-paced training packages.

Details were collected on up to 4 in-house and up to 4 external training courses attended in the last 12 months. This means that the tables in this publication relating to 'Number of training courses' underestimate the training courses undertaken by persons who attended more than 4 in-house and/or more than 4 external training courses. See entries for *Principal courses*, *In-house training courses* and *External training courses*.

Training course required to obtain last occupation held with main period employer: training undertaken by employees specifically to obtain the last occupation held with their main period employer. The training need not have been completed before commencing with that employer.

Training program: comprises 1 or more integrated courses which are linked to provide increased knowledge and understanding of a specific topic or field, e.g. supervisory development program. In respect of external courses, if the respondent indicated that this larger training program consisted of an indefinite number of courses, then the program was coded as an 'on-going program'. Otherwise, the number of courses available in that program was coded.

Under graduate diploma: the entry requirement is usually the successful completion of Year 12 or its equivalent. The duration of study is 3 years full-time study or equivalent. Courses are designed to provide individuals with the knowledge and skills necessary for practice in a

professional or associate professional occupation. Examples are a Certificate in Psychiatric Nursing, a Diploma of Applied Arts in Graphic Design and a Diploma of Teaching (Primary).

Unemployed: persons aged 15 to 64 who were not employed during the reference week, had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the 4 weeks up to the end of the reference week, and:

- were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than 4 weeks to the end of the reference week); or
- were waiting to start a new job within 4 weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then.

This definition differs from that given in *The Labour Force Australia* (6203.0). See paragraphs 6-10 of the Explanatory Notes for details.

University: also includes Institutes of Technology and other colleges or institutes that award Bachelor degrees or higher (or their equivalent).

Usual occupation: the occupation in which the respondent has worked the longest time.

Usual weekly earnings: the amount of usual weekly pay for wage or salary earners working with their main period employer, before taxation or other deductions were made.

Vocational study: study or training related to the respondent's career or occupation, to either gain qualifications or to improve job/career opportunities.

Wage or salary earner: see entry for Employee.

Working with main period employer: those working as a wage or salary earner with their main period employer during the reference week.

Works in own business: either an employer or a self-employed person, as defined.

# DATA ITEMS AND HOW TO ORDER SPECIAL TABLES FROM THIS SURVEY

The ABS offers a range of unpublished data from this survey upon request. This section specifies the data items, categories and populations which relate to this survey and includes an order form for special tables (page 96). More detailed breakdowns of some data items are available on request.

The ABS also has State data readily available. A package which contains each of the tables in this publication cross-classified by 'State of usual residence' can be obtained by completing the 'State tables' order form (page 95).

Refer to the Glossary (page 56) for definitions of data items.

### NOTES:

- (i) Those data items with 'course counts' included in the population column relate to individual training courses and should not be cross-classified with training data items which are not 'course counts'.
- (ii) 'Level of qualification' and 'Field of study' data items that are broadly comparable with the classifications in the 1989 How Workers Get Their Training publication are available if required.

# Special Table Requests

Each table contains six components, described below:

### Population:

The population describes the characteristics of persons (or courses) that are applicable to a data item. The population of a table controls the contents of the table, the maximum population being the full scope of the survey (see page 62 for a list of populations).

### Heading:

The heading contains the data item that defines the columns of a table. It may involve a number of categories, each of which forms a separate heading element.

#### Stab.

The stub contains the data item that defines the rows of a table. It may involve a number of categories, each of which forms a separate stub element.

#### Wafer:

Headings and stubs define a two dimensional array which is called a wafer. An additional data item may be allocated to a wafer to create 'pages' of data. Each category in the additional data item constitutes a new wafer. Wafers may be displayed on the same page (if enough room) or on different pages.

### Cell:

The cell contains the data resulting from the intersection of each wafer, stub and heading element.

### Table Title:

The table title can be supplied by you and appears on each page (if required). If no title is specified, a default title consisting of the population and the titles of the requested data items is used.

You can specify special table requests by filling in the order form (page 96) or by telephoning the contact officer listed on the order form.

When ordering special tables from this survey, please ensure you identify the population(s) and the data item number(s) that you require.

For each table requested, the population and at least two data items (i.e. a heading and a stub) need to be identified. Some tables may be subject to high standard errors, though this does not prevent the table(s) being produced.

There are charges involved in the generation of special tables which are listed on the order form (page 96). Special tables can be provided in printed form or on floppy disk.

The ABS aims for a prompt turn-round tabulation service. For a large number of tables or for complex tables, the time needed for table generation may be longer. A time estimate will be given when the table request is accepted.


