

Overview.

The CPI increased by 0.7% between the June and September quarters and by 6.0% since September quarter last year. Both the quarterly and annual rates of increase (0.7% and 6.0%) are down significantly on the results recorded in June quarter (1.6% and 7.7%).




The more moderate September quarter outcome was the result of offsetting influences (see table 3). Petrol prices showed the most significant increase (up 5.3%). Significant offsets included fresh vegetable prices (down 22.2%) and motor vehicle prices (down 1.7%).

The considerably lower rate of increase in housing costs of 0.6% this quarter, (compared with 1.6% in the June quarter) had a further moderating influence on the CPI. The small increase this quarter was due to a fall in mortgage interest charges (down 0.3%).

Main contributions to change.

The four groups which had the most significant influence on the change in the all groups index were: Transportation (+42.7%), Tobacco and Alcohol (+20.9%) Household equipment and operations (+19.8%) and Food (-17.0%)- see chart below.



Transportation: +1.9%

The transportation group is the largest contributor to change in the all groups index, accounting for 42.7% of the change this quarter, or 0.67 index points (see table 3). This was mainly the result of petrol and vehicle insurance price increases. Motor vehicle prices fell, largely offsetting other price increases within the group.

There was substantial variation in petrol prices over the quarter. Petrol prices fell in July followed by significant increases in August and September. Overall, petrol prices in the September quarter increased by 5.3%.

Motor vehicle prices fell by 1.7%. The falls were broadly consistent in all cities except Darwin which showed an increase of 0.7%.

Food: -0.7%

The fall in the food group index helped moderate the increase in the all groups index this quarter. It resulted in a 17% negative contribution.

Fresh vegetable prices fell back sharply (down 22.2%) from the prices recorded in the June quarter. All cities recorded decreases. The largest falls were in Brisbane (-32.3%), Sydney (-30.4%) and Canberra (-23.6%) and the smallest was in Adelaide (-5.5%). Further falls were recorded in fresh fruit, poultry, and fresh potatoes.

Housing: +0.6%

In contrast to the situation 12 months ago, housing costs are now exerting a moderating influence on the CPI. Although dwelling rents increased by 1.4%, mortgage interest charges fell by 0.3% (compared with an increase of 1.4% in June quarter).

The fall in mortgage interest charges reflects further moderation in the rate of increase in the value of debt outstanding (+2.2% this quarter compared with +2.4% in June quarter) and a fall in interest rates of 2.6% (following a fall of 1.0% in June quarter).

Household equipment and operation: +0.9%.

The increase this quarter represents a significant reduction on the rate of 1.7% recorded in June quarter. The low rate of increase this quarter is mainly due to a one off reduction in electricity charges resulting from a \$75 rebate paid to customers of the Sydney County Council. The effect of this rebate will be reversed in the December quarter.

Consumer credit charges increased by 2.0% this quarter, compared with 2.9% last quarter, comprising 1.6% from increase in the value of debt outstanding and 0.4% from increases in interest rates.



Changes over recent years.

An improved approach to the treatment of mortgage interest charges in the CPI was introduced in March quarter 1989. CPI series which included mortgage interest charges (eg Housing group and All groups) were affected by the change. In order to provide the correct basis of comparison for the analysis of changes in prices, the ABS has compiled index number series using the new debt profile approach from the time that mortgage interest charges were first included in the CPI (March quarter 1987). These series together with an explanation of the change in treatment of mortgage interest charges were published in the December quarter 1989 issue of this publication, copies of which are available on request. They also form the basis of the graphs on the following page and the estimates shown in Table 5 of this publication. These series are recommended for the analysis of price change (as distinct from statutory indexation and contract escalation purposes).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Brief description of the CPI

1. The CPI measures quarterly changes in the price of a *basket* of goods and services which account for a high proportion of expenditure by the CPI population group (ie metropolitan wage and salary earner households). This *basket* covers a wide range of goods and services, arranged in the following eight groups: food; clothing; housing; household equipment and operation; transportation; tobacco and alcohol; health and personal care; and recreation and education. Pensioners and other social welfare recipients are not included in the CPI population group and the index does not reflect concessional prices paid by these people such as subsidised government dwelling rents, public transport fares and the like.

2. The capital city indexes measure price movements over time in each city individually. They do not measure differences in retail price levels between cities.

3. Further information about the CPI is contained in a booklet entitled A Guide to the Consumer Price Index (6440.0) which is available from the ABS on request. A more detailed account is contained in The Australian Consumer Price Index, Concepts, Sources and Methods (6461.0).

Prices

4. Prices of goods and services included in the CPI are generally collected quarterly. However, some important items are priced monthly or more frequently (e.g. bread, fresh meat and fish, fresh fruit and vegetables, petrol, alcohol and tobacco) and a small number annually (e.g. seasonal clothing, local government rates and charges).

5. In order to facilitate a more even spread of field collection workload the bulk of the items for which prices are collected quarterly are priced in the first two months of each quarter (ie July/August, October/November, January/February, April/May). With a few exceptions items priced in the third month are those subject to price changes at discrete points of time (e.g. electricity and postal charges, milk); in these cases information about any changes in price during the quarter is obtained so that an average price for the whole quarter can be calculated.

Weighting pattern

6. There are 107 expenditure classes (that is, groupings of like items) in the eleventh series CPI and each expenditure class has its own weight, or measure of relative importance. In calculating the index, price changes for the various expenditure classes are combined using these weights.

7. Changes in the weighting pattern have been made at approximately five-yearly intervals to take account of changes in household spending patterns. The CPI now comprises eleven series of price indexes which have been linked to form a continuous series.

Analysis of CPI changes

8. Movements in indexes from one period to another can be expressed either as changes in *index points* or as percentage changes. The following example illustrates the method of calculating index points changes and percentage changes between any two periods:

All Groups CPI: Weighted average of eight capital cities

Index numbers:

204.1 9. In this publication, percentage changes are calculated to illustrate 3 different kinds of movements in index

- movements between consecutive financial years (where the index numbers for financial years are simple averages of the quarterly index numbers),
- movements between corresponding quarters of consecutive years, and
- movements between consecutive quarters.

10. Table 7 provides a detailed analysis, for the weighted average of eight capital cities, of movements in the CPI since the previous quarter, including information on movements for subgroups and for selected expenditure classes. It also shows the contribution which each group and subgroup makes to the total CPI. For instance, the dairy products subgroup contributed 2.91 index points to the total All Groups index number of 197.0 for September quarter 1989. The final column shows contributions to the change in All Groups index points by each group and subgroup.

11. Table 8 provides summary information about a range of Special series in a similar format to that provided in Table 7.

12. Information on the impact of changes in Selected State and local government charges on the CPI is included in Tables 3 and 8. Table 3 shows the contribution made by changes in these charges to the CPI for each capital city, while Table 8 shows index numbers for two special series Selected State and local government charges and All Groups excluding selected State and local government charges. An explanation of the derivation and limitations of these figures was published in the Appendix to the December quarter 1982 issue of this publication.
