

SALES OF AUSTRALIAN WINE AND BRANDY BY WINEMAKERS, JANUARY 1994

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

DOMESTIC WINE SALES



Total sales of Australian wine (domestic plus exports) for 1993 were 444.4 million litres, 11.8 per cent higher than for 1992. Domestic wine sales, which accounted for 72 per cent of all wines sales in 1993, rose by 3.3 per cent in 1993, while export sales of Australian wine were up by 42 per cent.

Domestic sales

In seasonally adjusted terms, total domestic sales of Australian wine for January 1994 were 20.4 million litres, a decrease of 20.2 per cent on December 1993 and 22.2 per cent down on sales in January 1993. This is the lowest monthly seasonally adjusted estimate of domestic wine sales since January 1981.

As a result of the large fall in seasonally adjusted wine sales in January 1994, the trend in domestic wine sales fell for the seventh consecutive month. The trend decline, which had shown signs of easing in the last couple of months is now strengthening. The wine sales trend fell by 3.7 per cent in January following falls of 3.5 per cent, 2.9 per cent and 2.1 per cent in the last three months. Readers

are reminded that recent trend estimates are provisional and could change when data for future months become available.

Using original data, there were 13.5 million litres of Australian wine sold domestically in January 1994, down 63.6 per cent from the traditional high sales in December and down 22.5 per cent on sales in January 1993. This is the lowest original estimate of domestic sales in a month since February 1978.

Exports

A total of 8.3 million litres of wine valued at \$23.0 million was exported from Australia in December 1993. This is a similiar result to November 1993 but up on December 1992 by 63.0 per cent in terms of volume, and 76.3 per cent in terms of value.

In 1993 Australia exported 124.8 million litres of wine, 42 per cent higher than for 1992. The value of 1993 exports was \$357.1 million, 36.5 per cent up on 1992. Table wines made up 92.6 per cent of all exports in 1993, while fortified wine contributed 2.2 per cent, sparkling wine, 4.4 per cent and other wine, 0.8 per cent.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS (continued)

Imports

Australia imported 0.8 million litres of wine at a cost of \$5.7 million in December 1993. Total imports for 1993 were 8.3 million litres, 3.5 per cent higher by volume on 1992, and 7.0 per cent higher in terms of value.

A comparison of domestic wine sales (original data) for the seven months ended January 1993 and 1994 follows.

For the seven months ended January 1994, domestic sales of Australian wine have increased by 2.1 per cent over the corresponding period in 1993. In this period, sales of table wine and sparkling wine increased by 3.3 and 3.5 per cent respectively, while sales of fortified and other wine types decreased by 7.7 and 6.5 per cent.

Table wines make up nearly 80 per cent of total domestic wine sales. The following highlight movements within this category;

- White wine sales increased 2.8 per cent, with increases in sales of both bottled wine (8.4%) and wine sold in other containers (1.0%).
- Red wine sales increased by 5.5 per cent, also with increases in sales of both bottled wine (7.2%) and red wine in other containers of 4.0 per cent.
- Rose wine sales decreased 2.9 per cent, with falls in sales of both bottled wine (8.3%) and rose in other containers (2.1%).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

The information shown in this publication for wine sales is obtained directly from winemakers by means of a mail collection. The brandy sales figures shown represent quantities on which excise duty was paid, i.e. the quantity of brandy released for sale. Statistics relating to exports and import clearances are based on information provided to the Australian Customs Service by importers, exporters and their agents.

Scope and coverage

- 2. The information on wine is obtained from winemaking enterprises with wine sales of 250,000 litres or more in the previous financial year. These account for approximately 97 per cent of total wine sales.
- 3. Tables 1-3 include all sales by winemakers (within the scope of the collection) with the exception of exports, sales for ships' stores, sales of imported wine and brandy and inter-winery sales, the last exclusion being necessary to avoid duplication in the published figures. Figures relating to foreign trade in wine and brandy are presented in Table 4 to provide a basis for assessing the overall Australian wine market.
- 4. Imports cleared for home consumption comprise those goods entered for home consumption, together with goods cleared from Customs warehouses. Exports of Australian produce are defined as exports of goods, materials or articles which have been produced, manufactured or partly manufactured in Australia.
- 5. Commencing with April 1992, the timing basis for the compilation of merchandise exports statistics has been changed. The change involves compiling exports statistics on the basis of goods shipped in any period rather than the basis of the documentation of goods shipped in that or carlier periods. In the past only about half of shipments were recorded in the month of shipment, the remainder recorded in subsequent months. The effect of the change is significant on monthly data but marginal on annual data. For more information about the changed basis of compilation refer to publication Foreign Trade Australia: Merchandise Exports, April 1992. (5432.0)
- 6. All sales data are collected on an Australia-wide basis only and State figures are therefore not available.
- 7. The wine content of products consisting of a mixture of wine and fruit juice, commonly known as 'coolers', is included in the appropriate category of wine from which it is made, which is generally table wine. Where a wine is categorised by container type (i.e. table wine) the wine content of 'coolers' is included in the 'bulk' figure.

Seasonally adjusted and trend estimates

- 8. Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from the series so that the effects of other influences can be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment does not remove from the series the effect of irregular influences (e.g. abnormal weather and industrial disputes).
- 9. The smoothing of seasonally adjusted series to create trend estimates is a means of reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. The trend estimates of wine sales have been derived by applying a 13-term Henderson weighted moving average to the seasonally adjusted series.

- 10. While this smoothing technique enables estimates of trend to be produced for the latest month, it does result in revisions to the estimates for the most recent months as data for subsequent months become available. Generally subsequent revisions become smaller and after 3 months have a negligible impact on the series. There will also be revisions as a result of revisions to the original series and periodic reviews of seasonal factors. The latest review, in September 1993, revised seasonally adjusted and trend monthly series back to July 1975.
