This publication provides information on a wide range of economic indicators which are the latest available at the time of publication. In a number of cases, figures appearing in this summary are preliminary and are subject to revision in subsequent issues.						
Please note that changes in the scope of the Survey of Tourist Accommodation mean data presented in tables 14, 15, graph 16 and referred to in the overview and main features of this publication will not be strictly comparable with previously published data. This data presents the first information collected in the revised survey. Information in respect of 1997 has been re-tabulated on the basis of the new survey.						
Data relating to the Sydney Tourism Region excludes Gosford, Wyong and Blue Mountains Statistical Local Areas (SLAs). Data was previously published for the Sydney Statistical Division which includes these SLAs.						
Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from a series so that the effects of other variations on that series can be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present. This means that movements of seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour. Smoothing seasonally adjusted series produces a measure of the underlying trend by reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. This smoothing technique does result in revisions to the most recent estimates as additional observations become available. For an explanation of seasonal adjustment derivation, refer to the publication <i>Seasonally Adjusted Indicators</i> (Cat. no. 1308.0).						
One measure of the variability which occurs as a result of surveying only samples of the total business population is the standard error. There are about two chances in three that a survey estimate is within one standard error of the figure that would have been obtained if all businesses had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that it is within two standard errors. The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate and this is known as the relative standard error (RSE). For detailed explanatory notes and definitions for the items shown in this publication, readers are referred to the specific ABS publications.

NSW OVERVIEW

EMPLOYMENT	
	The number of employed persons in NSW was 2,864,600 in seasonally adjusted terms in June 1998, a rise of 1.0% since May. National employment rose marginally in June.
UNEMPLOYMENT	
	Unemployment in NSW rose by 1.0% in June 1998 to a seasonally adjusted figure of 234,300. The unemployment rate remained at 7.6% in June in NSW while the national rate rose slightly to 8.2%.
BUILDING APPROVALS	
	The seasonally adjusted number of new dwelling units approved for NSW in May 1998 decreased by 17.9% from the previous month to 4,127.
RETAIL	
	In seasonally adjusted terms, total retail sales for NSW in May 1998 was \$3,985.2 million, an increase of 0.7% compared to the previous month.
NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRA	TIONS
	In seasonally adjusted terms, new motor vehicle registrations for NSW in May 1998 fell by 3.8% from the previous month to 21,923.
FINANCE	
	The value of housing finance commitments for owner occupation in NSW in May 1998 was \$1,858.7 million. This represented a 2.2% decrease from April 1998 and a 4.2% decrease from May 1997.
TOURIST ACCOMMODATION	
	Room nights occupied in licensed hotels, motels and guest houses and serviced apartments with 15 or more rooms or units in NSW decreased by 2.1% in the March quarter 1998 compared with the December quarter 1997 and also decreased by 0.4% compared with the March quarter 1997.

MAIN FEATURES

NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

In seasonally adjusted terms, the number of new motor vehicle registrations for NSW in May 1998 was 21,923, a decrease of 3.8% on the previous month but 11.3% up on May 1997. The national figure showed identical movements for the same periods.

The seasonally adjusted figure for passenger vehicles for NSW in May 1998 was 18,640, a decline of 3.6% on the previous month but an increase of 10.1% on the previous year. The national figure was 54,372, showing similar movements over the same periods.

The figure for new registrations of other vehicles (excluding motor cycles) for NSW in May 1998 was 3,282. This represented a decrease of 4.9% on the previous month but 18.5% up on May 1997. Nationally, there was decrease of 8.2% and an increase of 14.5% respectively over the same periods.

TOURISM

In NSW, room occupancy rates for licensed hotels, motels and guest houses and serviced apartments with 15 or more rooms or units, decreased by 1.6% in the March quarter 1998 compared with the December quarter 1997 and decreased by 4.8% compared with the March quarter 1997. At the national level, the room occupancy rate fell by 3.0% from the December quarter 1997 and by 3.8% compared with the March quarter 1997.

In the Sydney Tourism Region, the room occupancy rate fell from 79.1% for the March quarter 1997 to 71.9% for the March quarter 1998.

The number of licensed hotels, motels and guest houses and serviced apartments in NSW increased by 2.5% from 1,232 in the March quarter 1997 to 1,263 in the March quarter 1998.

For the Sydney Tourism Region, the number of establishments increased by 9.1% from 230 in the March quarter 1997 to 251 in the March quarter 1998 and capacity, in terms of guest rooms, also increased by 9.1%.

In NSW for the March quarter 1998, rooms and units available in licensed hotels, motels and guest houses and serviced apartments increased by 4.6% from the capacity for the March quarter 1997. Capacity in serviced apartments increased by 10.9% for the same period. This accommodation type has been identified separately for the first time this quarter and data have been recompiled to provide comparisons.

Takings from accommodation for licensed hotels, motels and guest houses and serviced apartments in NSW for the March quarter 1998 fell slightly from the December quarter 1997, while there was a 2.6% increase from the March quarter 1997.

Average takings from accommodation per room night in NSW for the March quarter 1998 increased over the March quarter 1997 for licensed hotels from \$147 to \$152, for motels from \$79 to \$80 and for serviced apartments from \$120 to \$132.


