NOTES

This publication provides information on a wide range of economic indicators which are the latest available at the time of publication. In a number of cases, figures appearing in this summary are preliminary and are subject to revision in subsequent issues.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT AND TREND ESTIMATION Seasonal adjustment is a means of removing the estimated effects of normal seasonal variation from a series so that the effects of other variations on that series can be more clearly recognised. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present. This means that movements of seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour. Smoothing seasonally adjusted series produces a measure of the underlying trend by reducing the impact of the irregular component of the series. This smoothing technique does result in revisions to the most recent estimates as additional observations become available. For an explanation of seasonal adjustment derivation, refer to the publication *Seasonally Adjusted Indicators* (Cat. no. 1308.0).

STANDARD ERRORS OF ESTIMATES

One measure of the variability which occurs as a result of surveying only samples of the total business population is the standard error. There are about two chances in three that a survey estimate is within one standard error of the figure that would have been obtained if all businesses had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that it is within two standard errors. The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate and this is known as the relative standard error (RSE).

For detailed explanatory notes and definitions for the items shown in this publication, readers are referred to the specific ABS publications.

NSW OVERVIEW

EMPLOYMENT

The seasonally adjusted number of employed persons in NSW rose by 0.9% in March 1998 to 2,830,300. Nationally, employment fell marginally to 8,513,900.

UNEMPLOYMENT

The seasonally adjusted number of unemployed persons in NSW fell by 1.6% in March 1998 to 230,700 and the unemployment rate fell to 7.5%. Twelve months earlier, the rate was 7.9%. The national unemployment rate was 8.2% in March 1998, about the same as for the previous three months.

JOB VACANCIES

There were 23,500 job vacancies in NSW in February 1998, a rise of 2.9% over the quarter. National job vacancies rose by 10.9% over the same period.

BUILDING APPROVALS

The seasonally adjusted number of new dwelling units approved for NSW in February 1998 declined by 9.9% from the previous month to 3,920.

RETAIL

In seasonally adjusted terms, total retail sales for NSW in February 1998 decreased by 1.7% on January 1998 to \$3,973.9 million.

NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

In seasonally adjusted terms, new motor vehicle registrations for NSW in February 1998 fell by 1.5% from the previous month to 21,760.

FINANCE

The value of housing finance commitments for owner occupation in NSW in February 1998 was \$1,748.4 million. This represented a 24.5% increase from January 1998 and a 12.4% increase on February 1997.

BUILDING APPROVALS

The seasonally adjusted number of new houses approved for NSW in February 1998 fell by 8.1% from the previous month to 2,429. However, there was an increase of 16.3% compared to February 1997. New houses comprised 62.0% of total new dwelling unit approvals. At the national level, new houses approved totalled 9,043, a slight decrease on the previous month but 19.9% up on the previous year. After seven months of growth, the trend figure for new dwelling units approved in NSW fell by 1.5% in February 1998.

In seasonally adjusted terms, the value of new residential building approved for NSW in February 1998 was \$436.8 million, a slight increase on the previous month but 8.9% down on February 1997. Nationally, the figure was \$1,308.4 million, a decrease of 8.2% and an increase of 7.5% respectively over the same periods. Both at the State and national levels, the value of alterations and additions to residential buildings showed strong growth (31.6% and 17.1% respectively) compared to the figures a year ago.

In original terms, the value of all building approved for NSW in February 1998 fell by 4.1% over the previous month to \$943.8 million, but was significantly higher (28.5%) than February 1997. At the national level, the figure was \$2,584.1 million, showing increases of 5.2% and 14.3% respectively over the same periods. For NSW, the value of non-residential building approved was \$461.8 million, nearly double (91.2%) the value a year ago. The national figure showed an increase of 21.4% over the same period.

NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS

In seasonally adjusted terms, new motor vehicle registrations for NSW in February 1998 were 21,760, a decrease of 1.5% on the previous month but 9.8% up on February 1997. The national figure showed identical movements for the same periods.

The seasonally adjusted figure for passenger vehicles for NSW in February was 18,501, a decline of 3.2% on the previous month but an increase of 9.3% on the previous year. The national figure was 52,813, and showed similar movements over the same periods.

The figure for new registrations of other vehicles (excluding motor cycles) for NSW in February 1998 was 3,259. This represented an increase of 9.8% on the previous month and 12.6% up on February 1997. Nationally, the increases were 10.4% and 13.6% respectively over the same periods.

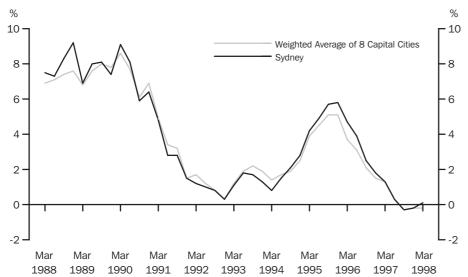
