

TREND ESTIMATES

The provisional trend estimate of the balance on goods and services was a deficit of \$1,373m in June 2007, an increase of \$59m on the revised deficit in May, mainly as a result of an increase in goods and services debits.

SEASONALLY ADJUSTED ESTIMATES

- In seasonally adjusted terms, the balance on goods and services was a deficit of \$1,751m in June, an increase of \$781m on the revised deficit in May.
- Goods and services credits fell \$632m (3%) to \$17,962m. Non–rural and other goods fell \$577m (5%) and rural goods fell \$82m (4%). Services credits rose \$26m (1%).
- Goods and services debits rose \$149m (1%) to \$19,713m. Intermediate and other goods rose \$342m (5%) while capital goods fell \$186m (5%) and consumption goods fell \$18m. Services debits rose \$10m.

ORIGINAL ESTIMATES

■ In original terms, the June 2007 balance on goods and services was a deficit of \$1,703m, an increase of \$925m on the revised deficit in May. Goods and services credits fell \$858m (5%) and goods and services debits rose \$67m.

2006-07 SITUATION

- For 2006–07, the balance on goods and services was a deficit of \$12.0b. This is a decrease of \$2.5b on the 2005–06 deficit resulting from a \$19.6b (10%) increase in exports offset by a \$17.1b (8%) increase in imports of goods and services.
- Exports of non-rural and other goods were up \$15.4b (12%) while rural goods were down \$0.2b (1%) compared to 2005–06.

REVISIONS

Revisions were made to incorporate the latest available data relating to merchandise trade, the quarterly survey of international trade in services and other administrative data. In original terms, these revisions have:

- increased the deficit on goods and services for May 2007 by \$124m
- increased the deficit on goods and services for the 11 months to May 2007 by \$371m, of which, \$156m is due to the Change to this Issue detailed below.

CHANGE TO THIS ISSUE

Commencing with this issue, goods debits (imports) on a balance of payments basis will use the Customs values (CV) from the merchandise trade data rather than Free on Board values (f.o.b.). The CV is similar to the f.o.b. value except that it includes the revaluation of some goods imports by Customs to more closely reflect their market value. Market value measures are the standard required for both Balance of Payments and the System of National Accounts. To align with the National Accounts revisions policy, revisions to the balance of payments goods debits data have only been made back to July 2006. These are all upward revisions and range in total from \$13m to \$19m per month across a number of commodity groups. These revisions will also be applied to data released in the June quarter 2007 issue of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0) to be released on 30 August 2007.

ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

BALANCE ON GOODS AND SERVICES

The trend estimate of the balance on goods and services in June 2007 was a deficit of \$1,373m, an increase of \$59m on the deficit in May.

In seasonally adjusted terms, the balance on goods and services in June 2007 was a deficit of \$1,751m, an increase of \$781m on the deficit in May.

The sum of the seasonally adjusted balances for the three months to June 2007 was a deficit of \$3,771m, an increase of \$378m on the deficit of \$3,393m for the three months to March 2007. However, if the seasonal factors used in compiling quarterly Balance of Payments are applied, the June quarter 2007 deficit was \$3,798m, an increase of \$264m on the revised March quarter 2007 deficit of \$3,534m.


EXPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

The trend estimate of goods and services credits fell \$5m between May and June to \$18,219m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services credits fell \$632m (3%) to \$17,962m. Non-rural goods fell \$655m (6%) and rural goods fell \$82m (4%) while other goods rose \$79m (7%). Services credits rose \$26m (1%).

Exports of goods

GOODS CREDITS

RURAL GOODS

The trend estimate of rural goods exports fell \$29m (1%) to \$1,912m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of rural goods fell \$82m (4%) to \$1,870m.

All components contributed to the fall in the seasonally adjusted series with:

- cereal grains and cereal preparations, down \$39m (14%)
- meat and meat preparations, down \$26m (5%)
- other rural, down \$16m (2%)
- wool and sheepskins, down \$3m (1%).

In original terms, exports of rural goods fell $159m\ (8\%)$ to 1,926m.

NON-RURAL GOODS

The trend estimate of non-rural goods exports fell \$31m to \$11,087m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of non-rural goods fell \$655m (6%) to \$10,778m.

The main components contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted series were:

- metals (excluding non–monetary gold), down \$339m (25%)
- metal ores and minerals, down \$179m (6%)
- coal, coke and briquettes, down \$80m (4%)

NON-RURAL GOODS continued

- transport equipment, down \$50m (12%)
- other manufactures, down \$20m (1%).

Partly offsetting these effects was the other mineral fuels component, up \$19m (1%).

In original terms, exports of non-rural goods fell \$673m (6%) to \$10,904m.

Movements in the original series contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted series are detailed below. The severe weather conditions affecting the east coast of Australia in June hampered the export volumes of some of these commodities. In addition, a number of regular exporters did not report exports during June while movements in some other commodities are not unusual as they tend to be intermittent exports.

Metals (excluding non-monetary gold), down \$347m (24%), of which:

- aluminium, down \$170m (28%), with volumes down 27% and prices down 2%
- nickel, down \$94m (45%), with volumes down 41% and prices down 6%
- zinc, down \$31m (24%), with volumes down 27% and prices up 4%.

Metal ores and minerals, down \$257m (8%), of which:

- nickel ore, down \$184m (73%) on decreased volumes
- alumina, down \$115m (21%), with volumes down 13% and prices down 10%
- non-agglomerated iron ore, down \$84m (6%), with both volumes and prices down 3%;

partly offset by:

- \blacksquare copper ore, up \$50m (22%), with volumes up 7% and prices up 14%
- zinc ore, up \$48m (22%), with volumes up 16% and prices up 5%.

Coal, coke and briquettes, down \$65m (4%) with non-metallurgical coal, down \$80m (14%), on decreased volumes, partly offset by metallurgical coal, up \$18m (2%) with volumes down 6% and prices up 7%.

OTHER GOODS

The trend estimate of other goods exports rose \$39m (3%) to \$1,212m.


In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of other goods rose \$79m (7%) to \$1,294m.

The main component contributing to the rise in the seasonally adjusted series was non-monetary gold, up \$87m (8%), partly offset by goods for processing, down \$12m (22%).

In original terms, exports of other goods rose \$82m (7%) to \$1,298m.

Exports of services

SERVICES CREDITS



In trend terms, services credits rose \$16m to \$4,008m.

Seasonally adjusted, services credits rose \$26m (1%) to \$4,020m.

The components that contributed to the rise in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- travel services, up \$26m (1%)
- transportation services, up \$3m.

Partly offsetting these effects was the other services component, down \$2m.

Seasonally adjusted, tourism related services credits rose \$29m (1%) to \$2,600m. This series is seasonally adjusted independently to the series that comprise services credits.

IMPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES


The trend estimate of goods and services debits rose \$53m between May and June to \$19,592m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services debits rose \$149m (1%) to \$19,713m. Other goods rose \$301m (55%) and intermediate and other merchandise goods rose \$41m (1%) while capital goods fell \$186m (5%) and consumption goods fell \$18m. Services debits rose \$10m.

Preliminary analysis shows that goods imports volumes, in seasonally adjusted terms, rose about 0.5% during the June quarter 2007. The Chain Laspeyres price index rose about 0.2% and the implicit price deflator rose about 0.2%. The final volume and price outcomes will be published in the June quarter 2007 issue of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0).

CONSUMPTION GOODS

The trend estimate of imports of consumption goods fell \$34m (1%) to \$4,608m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of consumption goods fell \$18m to \$4,569m.

The main components contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- food and beverages, mainly for consumption, down \$26m (4%)
- non-industrial transport equipment, down \$16m (1%).

Partly offsetting these effects were:

- textiles, clothing and footwear, up \$15m (3%)
- household electrical items, up \$11m (3%).

In original terms, imports of consumption goods fell \$74m (2%) to \$4,343m.

CAPITAL GOODS

The trend estimate of imports of capital goods was unchanged at \$3,541m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of capital goods fell \$186m (5%) to \$3,535m.

The components contributing to the fall in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- civil aircraft, down \$152m
- industrial transport equipment n.e.s., down \$32m (5%)
- ADP equipment, down \$18m (3%).

Partly offsetting these effects was the telecommunications equipment component, up \$12m (3%).

In original terms, imports of capital goods fell \$75m (2%) to \$3,742m.

INTERMEDIATE AND OTHER MERCHANDISE GOODS

The trend estimate of imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods rose \$47m (1%) to \$6,936m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods rose 41m (1%) to 6,933m.

The main components contributing to the rise in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- other merchandise goods, up \$76m (71%)
- primary industrial supplies n.e.s., up \$41m (46%)
- iron and steel, up \$30m (10%)
- parts for transport equipment, up \$29m (4%).

Partly offsetting these effects were:

- fuels and lubricants, down \$66m (3%), with volumes of crude oil imports down 10% and prices up 3%
- other parts for capital goods, down \$34m (3%).

In original terms, intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$317m (4%) to \$6,730m.

OTHER GOODS


The trend estimate of imports of other goods rose \$31m (5%) to \$685m.

In both original and seasonally adjusted terms, other goods debits rose \$301m (55%) to \$849m.

The main component contributing to the rise in these estimates was non–monetary gold, up 302m (72%).

Imports of services

SERVICES DEBITS



In trend terms, services debits rose \$10m to \$3,822m.

Seasonally adjusted, services debits rose \$10m to \$3,826m.

The components that contributed to the rise in the seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- travel services, up \$11m (1%)
- other services, up \$9m (1%).

Partly offsetting these effects was the transportation services component, down \$10m (1%).

Seasonally adjusted, tourism related services debits rose 40m (2%) to 20m. This series is seasonally adjusted independently to the series that comprise services debits.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication presents preliminary estimates of Australia's international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis and merchandise import and export statistics on a recorded trade basis.
- **2** Merchandise trade statistics on a recorded trade basis are compiled from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (ACS). Adjustments for coverage, timing and valuation are made to recorded trade data to convert them to a balance of payments basis. The main source for services data is the quarterly Survey of International Trade in Services.
- **3** More comprehensive quarterly estimates of Australia's trade in goods and services, together with comprehensive details of Australia's balance of payments are included in the quarterly publication, *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position*, *Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0). Detailed monthly statistics on merchandise trade are available on Time Series Spreadsheets or by subscription to tailored services.

CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND METHODS

- **4** The conceptual framework used in compiling Australia's merchandise trade statistics can be found in *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia: Concepts*, *Sources and Methods*, *2001* (cat. no. 5489.0).
- 5 The conceptual framework used in compiling Australia's balance of payments statistics is based on the Fifth Edition of the International Monetary Fund's *Balance of Payments Manual* (BPM5,1993). Descriptions of the underlying concepts and structure of the balance of payments and the sources, methods and terms used in compiling the estimates are presented in *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998* (cat. no. 5331.0). To bring merchandise trade statistics on a recorded trade basis to a balance of payments basis, timing adjustments are made to ensure that the transaction is recorded in the period in which ownership changed, rather than in the period in which the transaction was recorded by ACS. Adjustments are also made to imports to take account of distortions which arise when significant changes occur in the volume of import entries lodged but not yet processed by ACS in a given month. Chapter 6 of cat. no. 5331.0 provides more detail on the relationship between statistics on international merchandise trade on a recorded trade basis and on a balance of payments basis.
- **6** Both of the Concepts, Sources and Methods publications are available to download for free from the ABS website. Select *Methods, Classifications, Concepts & Standards*, then choose *ABS concepts, classifications and statistical standards* and then the catalogue numbers as above.
- 7 Monthly original estimates are volatile, being subject to calendar-related and large irregular influences. Seasonally adjusted estimates are derived by estimating and removing systematic calendar related effects, such as seasonal and trading day influences, from the original series. Trading day effects are removed from the original estimates prior to the seasonal adjustment process. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove
- the irregular or non-seasonal influences which may be present in any particular month. These irregular influences may reflect both random economic events and difficulties of statistical recording. The estimates of international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis are seasonally adjusted. The merchandise exports and imports statistics on a recorded trade basis are not.
- **8** The seasonally adjusted statistics in this publication use the concurrent seasonal adjustment technique to estimate factors for the current and previous months. Under this method, the estimates of seasonal factors are fine tuned as new original estimates become available each period. The seasonally adjusted estimates are subject to revisions at each reference month as the estimates of seasonal factors are improved.

SEASONAL ADJUSTMENT

EXPLANATORY NOTES continued

TREND ESTIMATES

9 The month-to-month movements of the seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of trend behaviour because they include irregular or non-seasonal movements. Trend estimates are derived by applying a 13-term Henderson moving average to the seasonally adjusted series. The use of a 13-term Henderson average can result in revisions to the estimates for the most recent six months as additional observations become available. Revisions can also occur because of changes in the original data and as a result of the re-estimation of the seasonal factors.

SIGN CONVENTION

10 In keeping with balance of payments conventions, where statistics are on a balance of payments basis, credit entries (exports) are shown without sign and debit items (imports) are shown as negative entries. For statistics on a recorded trade basis, both imports and exports are shown without sign. The calculation of percentage changes on balance of payments debit items are made without regard to sign. References to balance of payments debit items in Key Figures, Key Points, and Analysis and Comments are also made without regard to sign.

COMMODITY BREAKDOWNS
OF GOODS

- **11** For details of the classification used for goods exports on a balance of payments basis (credits), see table 6.6 in *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998* (cat. no. 5331.0).
- **12** Details of the classification of goods imports on a balance of payments basis (debits) are provided in table 6.7 in cat. no. 5331.0. Goods debits sub groups at a more detailed level than shown in Table 4 are available from the Time series spreadsheets.
- **13** The recorded trade statistics shown in tables 12 and 13 are classified by the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC). The first section of tables 12 and 13 show the most significant commodities (by value) at the SITC 3 digit level.

COMMODITY BREAKDOWNS
OF SERVICES

- **14** The quarterly detailed services data published in table 11 are consistent with the monthly aggregates shown in table 9.
- quarterly are not available. In particular, the Freight and Other transportation components of Total services credits are not available for publication on a monthly basis. The estimates for these items shown in table 9 are therefore derived by dividing the quarterly estimate by three. Where quarterly survey data are not available, freight debits are derived directly from imports data for the reference month as a difference between total merchandise cost, insurance and freight (CIFE) and free on board (FOB), adjusted to reflect timing and processing adjustments. For freight credits and other transportation credits and debits, estimates are derived by extrapolating the last month's data by an average of movements for the same month over the three previous years.

TOURISM RELATED SERVICES

- **16** The tourism related services memorandum items provide timely indicators of the movements in tourism related activities, not an absolute measure of the level of these activities. These series are not complied on a balance of payments conceptual basis. However, they do provide a reasonable approximation of world tourism related activities.
- **17** The memorandum items have been derived by re-aggregating relevant components of the international trade in services series of the balance of payments accounts. The tourism related indicator has been derived by combining total travel services (business, education-related and other personal travel), passenger fares, and the air transport component of other transportation services which relates to agency fees and commission receipts.

SERVICES BY STATE AND BY PARTNER COUNTRY

18 Annual services data by state and by partner country are released twice yearly. Calendar year data are usually released with the March issue of this publication and financial year data are released with the September issue. Refer to Time Series Data for details.

EXPLANATORY NOTES continued

SERVICES BY STATE AND BY PARTNER COUNTRY continued

- **19** Services credits are classified by the state of provision, while services debits are classified by the state of consumption. The state allocations for transportation, travel and communication services are based on a number of indicators including merchandise trade statistics by state, overseas passenger arrivals and departures by state of clearance and data provided by the Department of Education, Science and Training. The allocation for other services (about 25% of all trade in services) is primarily based on the location of the business reporting the information, which serves as a proxy for the state of provision/consumption of that service. The data should be used with care but are considered suitable for analysis over time.
- **20** A comprehensive explanation of the data sources used and the methodology applied in the compilation of partner country statistics is provided in Chapter 17 of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia Concepts, Sources and Methods* (cat. no. 5331.0). Approximately 7% of total services credits and 5% of total services debits for 2005–06 are either confidential, or unable to be allocated to individual countries.

25 The tables in this publication are presented on two bases. Tables 1–11 contain estimates of Australia's international trade in goods and services which have been adjusted for coverage, valuation and timing to a balance of payments basis. Tables 12–15 contain estimates of merchandise exports and imports based on Australian Customs Service records. Paragraph 5 of the Explanatory Notes provides an explanation of the difference between these bases.

26 Where figures have been rounded, discrepancies may occur between sums of the component items and totals. Percentage movements are calculated from data at the level of precision presented in this publication (i.e. \$m) except for international merchandise trade tables.
