## BY COUNTRY

- Australia's trade position for the quarter worsened with seven of its eight major trading partners, the exception being the UK.
- The surplus with Japan decreased by $\$ 498 \mathrm{~m}(27 \%)$ to $\$ 1,365 \mathrm{~m}$.

This issue contains a feature article, Australia's Exporters and Importers, 2001-02, which analyses the characteristics and international trading activities of Australia's exporters and importers, based on the Australian Business Number (ABN). It updates the information provided in the June quarter 2002 issue of this publication.

Since the last issue of this publication, minor revisions have been made to the data for the June and September quarters 2002 due to amendments to the source records lodged with the Australian Customs Service.

The ABS has reviewed its publication strategy for international merchandise trade data and it has been decided to discontinue this publication. The March quarter 2003 issue to be released on 23 May 2003 will be the final issue.
The monthly publication International Trade in Goods and Services, Australia (cat. no. 5368.0) will be expanded to include the following main tables that are contained in this publication:

- International Merchandise Exports by Commodity (similar to table 11 in 5422.0)
- International Merchandise Imports by Commodity (similar to table 11 in 5422.0)
- International Merchandise Trade by Selected Country and Country Groups (similar to table 7 in 5422.0)
- International Merchandise Exports and Imports by State (similar to tables 25 and 26 in 5422.0).
The February 2003 issue of International Trade in Goods and Services, Australia (cat. no. 5368.0) will be released as normal in its current format, and will also be available on the ABS web site in the new format in early April 2003. The March 2003 issue (to be released on 2 May 2003) of International Trade in Goods and Services, Australia (cat. no. 5368.0) will be released in the new format.

All of the data in the discontinued publication (cat. no. 5422.0) will be available monthly on AusStats, a 24 hour internet access service to all ABS statistics. ## QUARTERLY ANALYSISAND COMMENTS

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

In the December quarter 2002, merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by $\$ 4,773 \mathrm{~m}$, or $15 \%$ of the value of exports. This is the highest quarterly deficit ever recorded. The deficit had increased $\$ 1,551 \mathrm{~m}(48 \%)$ from the deficit recorded in the September quarter 2002. The previous highest quarterly deficit was $\$ 4,122 \mathrm{~m}$, recorded in the September quarter 1999.

There were a number of factors contributing to the large deficit. These included a number of high value imports in the quarter, notably aircraft, a strengthening of the Australian dollar against the US dollar in which most Australian trade is conducted, relatively weak international demand, and a decline in some agricultural exports affected by the drought.

Australia's trading position worsened with all but one of its major trading partners:

- Japan, the surplus decreased $\$ 498 \mathrm{~m}(27 \%)$, to $\$ 1,365 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Republic of Korea, the surplus decreased $\$ 452 \mathrm{~m}$ (30\%), to $\$ 1,051 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Singapore, the surplus decreased $\$ 272 \mathrm{~m}(93 \%)$, to $\$ 21 \mathrm{~m}$;
- USA, the deficit increased $\$ 213 \mathrm{~m}(7 \%)$, to $\$ 3,302 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Taiwan, the surplus decreased $\$ 87 \mathrm{~m}(25 \%)$, to $\$ 267 \mathrm{~m}$;
- China, the deficit increased $\$ 75 \mathrm{~m}(5 \%)$, to $\$ 1,480 \mathrm{~m}$; and,
- New Zealand, the surplus decreased $\$ 16 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$, to $\$ 765 \mathrm{~m}$.

The only major trading partner with which Australia improved its trading position was the United Kingdom. The trading position moved from a deficit of $\$ 313 \mathrm{~m}$ to a surplus of \$156m.

## QUARTERLY ANALYSISAND COMMENTS

Merchandise exports for the December quarter 2002 were $\$ 30,855 \mathrm{~m}$, up $\$ 549 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $1.8 \%$ ) from the September quarter 2002. Merchandise exports were slightly down $\$ 250 \mathrm{~m}(1 \%)$ compared with the December quarter 2001 when exports were $\$ 31,105 \mathrm{~m}$.

The increase in merchandise exports in the quarter was partly the result of a small increase in average prices received for exports. The Export Price Index rose $0.4 \%$ in the December quarter 2002. The main contributors to the increase were wool, wheat and petroleum products, offset by falls for a range of products, notably alumina and frozen beef. MERCHANDISE EXPORTS


Most export commodity groups recorded increases during the December quarter 2002. The most significant increases occurred in:

- Machinery and transport equipment, up $\$ 512 \mathrm{~m}(15 \%)$ to $\$ 3,982 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to a large increase in Passenger vehicles (SITC 781), up $\$ 468 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $83 \%$ ) to $\$ 1,029 \mathrm{~m}$.
- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, up $\$ 238 \mathrm{~m}(4 \%)$ to $\$ 5,783 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to a large increase in Wool and other animal hair (SITC 268), up $\$ 306 \mathrm{~m}$ (37\%). This was partially offset by decreases in Ores of uranium or thorium (SITC 286), down $\$ 70 \mathrm{~m}$ (49\%) and Oil seeds etc (SITC 222), down \$63m (52\%).
- Food and live animals, up $\$ 98 \mathrm{~m}(2 \%)$ to $\$ 4,986 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to increases in Seafood excluding fish, not prepared (SITC 036), up $\$ 107 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $65 \%$ ) and Beef (SITC 011), up $\$ 106 \mathrm{~m}(10 \%)$. These increases were partially offset by decreases in Fresh fish (SITC 034), down $\$ 268 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $85 \%$ ) and Wheat (SITC 041), down $\$ 196 \mathrm{~m}$ (20\%), due to a decrease in tonnes exported (32\%). The confidentiality restriction on Barley in June to October 2002 has contributed to the size of the increase from September quarter 2002 to December quarter 2002.

The export commodity group which recorded the largest decrease during the December quarter 2002 was Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, down $\$ 303 \mathrm{~m}(5 \%)$ to $\$ 6,163 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to a large decrease in Crude petroleum (SITC 333), down $\$ 321 \mathrm{~m}(18 \%)$ to $\$ 1,492 \mathrm{~m}$.

## MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the December quarter 2002 were $\$ 35,628 \mathrm{~m}$, up $\$ 2,100 \mathrm{~m}$ (6.3\%) from the September quarter 2002. This is the highest quarterly import result ever recorded. Merchandise imports were considerably higher than in the December quarter 2001, up $\$ 4,489 \mathrm{~m}(14 \%)$.

The average price paid for imports did not change significantly in the September quarter 2002 as measured by the Import Price Index which rose $0.2 \%$. The main contributors to price increases were crude petroleum and other petroleum products, offset partially by small decreases for several products, including computing equipment and inorganic chemicals. ## MERCHANDISE IMPORTS



Most import commodity groups recorded increases during the December quarter 2002. The most significant increases were in:

- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$785m (5\%), to \$16,510m, due mainly to increases in Aircraft (SITC 792), up $\$ 728 \mathrm{~m}$ (56\%), Telecommunications equipment (SITC 764), up $\$ 249 \mathrm{~m}(26 \%)$ and Heating and cooling equipment (SITC 741), up $\$ 196 \mathrm{~m}(57 \%)$. These were offset partially by large decreases in Ships (SITC 793), down $\$ 271 \mathrm{~m}$ (64\%) and Passenger vehicles (SITC 781), down $\$ 247 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $9 \%$ ).
- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up $\$ 635 \mathrm{~m}(29 \%)$, to $\$ 2,837 \mathrm{~m}$ due mainly to increases in Crude petroleum (SITC 333), up $\$ 389 \mathrm{~m}$ (23\%) and Refined petroleum (SITC 334), up $\$ 136 \mathrm{~m}$ (30\%).
- Commodities and transaction n.e.c. in the SITC, up $\$ 360 \mathrm{~m}(52 \%)$ to $\$ 1,053 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to an increase in Non-monetary gold (SITC 971), up $\$ 319 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $63 \%$ ).
- Miscellaneous manufactured articles, up $\$ 226 \mathrm{~m}$ (5\%) to $\$ 5,212 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to an increase in Arms and ammunition (SITC 891), up \$126m (249\%).

The import commodity group that recorded the largest decrease was Chemical and related products, n.e.c., down $\$ 178 \mathrm{~m}(5 \%)$, to $\$ 3,564 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to decreases in Medicaments (SITC 542), down $\$ 129 \mathrm{~m}$ (11\%).

## ANNUALANALYSISAND COMMENTS

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

For the calendar year 2002, merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by $\$ 8,159 \mathrm{~m}$, or $7 \%$ of the value of exports. This is a $\$ 12,943 \mathrm{~m}$ turnaround from the surplus of $\$ 4,784 \mathrm{~m}$ recorded for 2001 .

Australia's trading position worsened with most of its major trading partners.

- USA, the deficit increased by $\$ 2,142 \mathrm{~m}(23 \%)$ to $\$ 11,627 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Japan, the surplus decreased by $\$ 2,041 \mathrm{~m}$ (24\%) to $\$ 6,423 \mathrm{~m}$;
- China, the deficit increased by $\$ 1,757 \mathrm{~m}(64 \%)$ to $\$ 4,487 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Taiwan, the surplus decreased by $\$ 949 \mathrm{~m}(40 \%)$ to $\$ 1,402 \mathrm{~m}$; and
- Singapore, the surplus decreased by $\$ 715 \mathrm{~m}$ (52\%) to $\$ 671 \mathrm{~m}$

Australia had an improved trading position with:

- United Kingdom, the deficit decreased by $\$ 837 \mathrm{~m}(77 \%)$ to $\$ 248 \mathrm{~m}$;
- New Zealand, the surplus increased by $\$ 592$ (24\%) to $\$ 3,034 \mathrm{~m}$; and,
- Republic of Korea, the surplus increased by $\$ 306 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $6 \%$ ) to $\$ 5,202 \mathrm{~m}$.

AUSTRALIA'S ANNUAL TRADE WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES, Excess of exports (+) or imports (-)


Merchandise exports for the calendar year 2002 were $\$ 119,483 \mathrm{~m}$, down $\$ 3,047 \mathrm{~m}$ (2.5\%) from 2001. Most commodity groups recorded decreases with the largest being:

- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, down $\$ 1,746 \mathrm{~m}$ (7\%) to $\$ 22,026 \mathrm{~m}$ due mainly to Cotton (SITC 263), down $\$ 742 \mathrm{~m}$ (37\%) and Alumina (SITC 285), down \$635m (15\%).
- Food and live animals, down $\$ 1,230 \mathrm{~m}(6 \%)$ to $\$ 20,760 \mathrm{~m}$ due mainly to decreases in Beef (SITC 011), down $\$ 371 \mathrm{~m}$ (8\%), Barley (SITC 043), down $\$ 275 \mathrm{~m}$ (28\%) and Rice (SITC 042), down $\$ 199 \mathrm{~m}(56 \%)$. The decrease in barley was partially the result of confidentiality restrictions for the period July to October 2002.
- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related products, down $\$ 749 \mathrm{~m}$ (3\%) to $\$ 24,680 \mathrm{~m}$ due mainly to decreases in Crude petroleum (SITC 333), down $\$ 391 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $6 \%$ ) and Refined petroleum (SITC 334), down $\$ 219 \mathrm{~m}$ (8\%).
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, down $\$ 463 \mathrm{~m}$ (3\%) to $\$ 13,456 \mathrm{~m}$ due mainly to decreases in Aluminium (SITC 684), down $\$ 446 \mathrm{~m}$ (9\%) and Copper (SITC 682), down $\$ 248$ m (15\%).

Two export commodity groups recorded increases. These were:

- Commodities and transactions n.e.c. in the SITC, up $\$ 839 \mathrm{~m}$ (8\%) to $\$ 11,936 \mathrm{~m}$; and,
- Machinery and transport equipment, up $\$ 370 \mathrm{~m}(3 \%)$ to $\$ 14,214 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to increases in Aircraft (SITC 792), up $\$ 1,000 \mathrm{~m}$ (129\%), Ships (SITC 793), up $\$ 199 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $47 \%$ ) and Motor vehicle parts (SITC 784 ), up $\$ 156 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $17 \%$ ). These were partially offset by decreases in Telecommunications equipment (SITC 764), down $\$ 605 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $47 \%$ ) and Computer parts and accessories (SITC 759), down $\$ 175 \mathrm{~m}$ (14\%).

Australia's major export destinations for the calendar year 2002 were:

- Japan, down $\$ 1,559 \mathrm{~m}(7 \%)$ to $\$ 22,165 \mathrm{~m}$;
- USA, down $\$ 391 \mathrm{~m}(3 \%)$ to $\$ 11,523 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Republic of Korea, up $\$ 436 \mathrm{~m}(5 \%)$ to $\$ 9,967 \mathrm{~m}$;
- China, up $\$ 779 \mathrm{~m}(10 \%)$ to $\$ 8,361 \mathrm{~m}$;
- New Zealand, up $\$ 726 \mathrm{~m}(10 \%)$ to $\$ 7,909 \mathrm{~m}$;
- United Kingdom, up $\$ 401 \mathrm{~m}(8 \%)$ to $\$ 5,598 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Singapore, down $\$ 412 \mathrm{~m}(8 \%)$ to $\$ 4,940 \mathrm{~m}$; and,
- Taiwan, down $\$ 633 \mathrm{~m}(12 \%)$ to $\$ 4,744 \mathrm{~m}$.

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the calendar year 2002 were $\$ 127,642$, an increase of $\$ 9,896 \mathrm{~m}$ (8.4\%) from 2001. All import commodity groups recorded increases except Mineral fuels, lubricants and related products, which recorded a decrease of $\$ 663 \mathrm{~m}$ (7\%) due mainly to a large fall in imports of Crude petroleum (SITC 333), down $\$ 800 \mathrm{~m}(10 \%)$. The import commodity groups that recorded the largest increases were:

- Machinery and transport equipment, up $\$ 6,247 \mathrm{~m}(12 \%)$ to $\$ 58,466 \mathrm{~m}$, due mainly to increases in Aircraft (SITC 792), up $\$ 2,819 \mathrm{~m}(116 \%)$, Passenger vehicles (SITC 781), up $\$ 962 \mathrm{~m}$ (11\%), Goods vehicles (SITC 782), up $\$ 549 \mathrm{~m}(25 \%)$, Engineering plant and equipment (SITC 723), up $\$ 353 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $33 \%$ ), Ships (SITC 793), up $\$ 315 \mathrm{~m}$ (78\%), Sound and television recorders or reproducers (SITC 763), up \$310m (43\%) and Televisions (SITC 761), up $\$ 300 \mathrm{~m}(40 \%)$. These increases were partially offset by a decrease in Telecommunications equipment (SITC 764), down $\$ 904 \mathrm{~m}(18 \%)$.
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up $\$ 1,417 \mathrm{~m}(10 \%)$ to $\$ 15,603 \mathrm{~m}$, due to increases in most commodities in this category, with the largest being Paper and paperboard (SITC 641), up $\$ 282 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $16 \%$ ).
- Miscellaneous manufactured articles, up $\$ 1,352 \mathrm{~m}(8 \%)$ to $\$ 18,394 \mathrm{~m}$ due mainly to increases in Baby carriages, toys, games and sporting goods (SITC 894), up $\$ 389 \mathrm{~m}$ (28\%), Furniture and bedding etc (SITC 821), up $\$ 254 \mathrm{~m}$ (22\%) and Arms and ammunition (SITC 891), up $\$ 170 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $76 \%$ ).

- USA, up $\$ 1,750 \mathrm{~m}(8 \%)$ to $\$ 23,149 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Japan, up $\$ 482 \mathrm{~m}$ (3\%) to $\$ 15,742 \mathrm{~m}$;
- China, up $\$ 2,536 \mathrm{~m}(25 \%)$ to $\$ 12,848 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Germany, up $\$ 674 \mathrm{~m}(10 \%)$ to $\$ 7,337 \mathrm{~m}$;
- United Kingdom, down $\$ 436 \mathrm{~m}(7 \%)$ to $\$ 5,846 \mathrm{~m}$;
- Republic of Korea, up $\$ 130 \mathrm{~m}(3 \%)$ to $\$ 4,765 \mathrm{~m}$;
- New Zealand, up $\$ 134 \mathrm{~m}$ (3\%) to $\$ 4,875 \mathrm{~m}$; and,
- Singapore, up $\$ 304 \mathrm{~m}$ ( $8 \%$ ) to $\$ 4,269 \mathrm{~m}$.

## COUNTRY COMPOSITION OF IMPORTS



This article presents experimental statistics on Australia's exporters and importers for the 2001-02 financial year. It builds on an article, 'Experimental Statistics on Australia's Exporters and Importers', published in the June quarter 2002 issue of International Merchandise Trade, Australia (cat. no. 5422.0). That article contained estimates of Australia's exporters and importers for the six month period, July to December 2001. It also outlined the concepts and methodology used to compile the estimates.

The concepts and methodology outlined in the June quarter 2002 article have remained substantially unchanged for compiling the experimental estimates for the 2001-02 financial year in this article. There has however been some expansion of the analysis to enhance the information available about Australia's exporters and importers.

Estimates for exporters and importers of merchandise (businesses that trade in goods) are compiled from data sourced from the Australian Customs Service (Customs) and from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) Australian Business Register. Where appropriate, estimates for exporters and importers of offshore services, compiled from the ABS Survey of International Trade in Services (SITS), are also included.

The statistics on goods exporters and importers included in this article are considered experimental because they are subject to limitations in terms of the data available and methodology applied.

Some of the key limitations with the estimate of the number of exporters are:
a. businesses which exported goods totalling less than $\$ 10,000$ in the year are excluded from the counts;
b. the businesses included in the counts of exporters of services are those which provide services from their Australian base to services consumers offshore, i.e. supply modes 1 and 4 in the classification used by the World Trade Organisation (WTO). However, smaller and / or occasional exporters will not come to ABS notice and are therefore excluded from the counts. The number of these excluded businesses may be significant, but the value of their exports is not thought to be appreciable in the totality of services exports. The ABS continues to try to identify these businesses and incorporate them into surveys;
c. the counts of services exporters exclude businesses that supply goods or services to foreign tourists or students in Australia only (supply mode 2), such as hotels, restaurants, retail, tourist facilities, transport, theatres, educational institutions, etc, - possibly hundreds of thousands of businesses in Australia;
d. Australian-owned businesses located overseas supplying goods or services in the country in which they are located (usually called foreign affiliates trade - supply mode 3) are excluded from these estimates because their trade does not directly contribute to Australia's exports of goods / services, though the conditions under which they might be established and operate are subject to WTO negotiations;
e. Australian businesses which supply goods or services to other businesses which undertake the exporting function are excluded. These businesses may be supplying goods or services which are subsequently exported. For example, many agricultural products are exported from Australia by wholesalers (such as commodity marketing boards) rather than by the producer; or some consultancy services which are exported may be composed of the work of a number of sub-consultants providing services to the principal consultant, who then exports the combined service.
Equivalent limitations apply to the counts of importers.

## EXPORTERS

NUMBER The number of businesses exporting goods and services in the 2001-02 financial year (subject to the above limitations), was estimated to be 31,450 , as shown in Table F1. The number of businesses exporting goods was estimated to be 30,240 , while there were approximately 2,250 exporters of services.

The number of goods exporters has increased by 7,659 compared with the estimate for the first six months of the financial year $(22,581)$. About two-thirds of the increase in the number of goods exporters came from businesses that did not export goods in the first half of the financial year. About one-third of the increase in goods exporters came from those that had less than $\$ 10,000$ of exports in the first six months, but whose exports for the full year attained the minimum threshold of $\$ 10,000$. The ABS was able to identify a net addition of 50 services exporters.

More than $45 \%(1,040)$ of businesses that engaged in services exports were also exporters of goods. By eliminating the double counting, the total number of businesses that exported goods and services was derived at 31,450 ( 30,240 plus 2,250 less 1,040 ).

The number of both goods and services exporters is subject to sampling and non-sampling error because of the methodology used.

As shown in table F1, Australia's goods exports were dominated by a relatively small number of exporters. There were 209 businesses with goods exports of $\$ 100 \mathrm{~m}$ or more, accounting for almost $70 \%$ of the value of goods exports during the 2001-02 financial year. In total, about 4,400 businesses had exports valued at $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}$ or more, accounting for $95 \%$ of the total value of goods exports. There were a further 9,202 exporters with goods exports worth between $\$ 100,000$ and $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}$ in the reference period ( $2.5 \%$ of the value of all goods exports).

Over half of the goods exporters ( 16,642 ), had exports valued between $\$ 10,000$ and $\$ 100,000$. These businesses represented just $0.5 \%$ of the value of goods exports and averaged six Customs entries each during the financial year.

Table F2 shows the export patterns of Australia's goods exporters. About $20 \%(6,442)$ of Australia's goods exporters above the $\$ 10,000$ threshold only exported once or twice in the 2001-02 financial year. The majority $(5,620)$ of these businesses had exports worth less than $\$ 100,000$, and about 800 of these businesses had exports valued at $\$ 100,000$ or more in the period studied. Conversely, about 2,400 (12\%) of the estimated 19,575 businesses with goods exports valued at less than $\$ 10,000$, exported goods three or more times during 2001-02, indicating they may be small scale but regular exporters.

INDUSTRY Industry estimates relate to the owner of the good the time of export or import, not the producer of the good. The most significant exporting industries (of the owning business) were manufacturing ( $38 \%$ of the value of goods exports), mining (31\%) and wholesale trade ( $21 \%$ ), as shown in Table F3. These three industries accounted for $\$ 108.6 \mathrm{~b}$ (90\%) of goods exported from Australia in 2001-02. The next most significant industries were finance and insurance ( $\$ 3.3 \mathrm{~b}$ ), and agriculture, forestry and fishing (\$3.1b). This low value for agriculture, forestry and fishing reflects that most exports of agricultural commodities are made by commodity marketing authorities, which are classified as wholesalers.

Using sampling techniques, it has been possible to estimate the broad industry of businesses that did not report an ABN on their export Customs entries. As shown in Graph F1, the industries with the highest number of goods exporters in 2001-02 were wholesale trade $(9,670)$, manufacturing $(8,850)$, retail trade $(3,030)$ and property and business services $(2,615)$. The average value of exports per business in these industries were, respectively $\$ 2.6 \mathrm{~m}, \$ 5.2 \mathrm{~m}, \$ 363,000$ and $\$ 663,000$ in the financial year. The industry with the highest average exports per business was the mining industry. Its 495 exporters averaged $\$ 75 \mathrm{~m}$ worth of exports each in 2001-02.

Table F4 compares the industry of the exporter with the industry of origin of the commodity. This shows that mining commodities had the highest proportion of exports (87\%) by the industry that generally produced them i.e. the mining industry. By comparison, only $13 \%$ of Australia's $\$ 13.4$ b of agricultural, forestry and fishing commodity exports were exported directly by the agriculture, forestry and fishing industries. Most were exported by wholesalers (78\%).

Exports of manufactured goods were $\$ 72.1$ b, of which $\$ 42.5$ b ( $59 \%$ ) were exported by the manufacturing industry, $\$ 12.9$ b ( $18 \%$ ) by the wholesale trade industry, and $\$ 8.6 \mathrm{~b}$ (12\%) by the mining industry. In regard to mining, users should note that semi-processed materials (e.g. alumina) are considered manufactures.

SIZE OF BUSINESS Two different size measures are used for goods exporters in this article. They are the value of exports (see Table F1) and size of the business (Table F5). Traditionally, the ABS has only used employment to determine the size of a business because this has been the only sizing variable generally available. Many significant exporters were found not to have large employment. For the purpose of this experimental analysis, the size of a business has been defined in terms of three variables - employment, estimated annual turnover (both from the Australian Taxation Office business registers) and value of exports (from Customs):

- small businesses - having fewer than 20 employees and estimated annual turnover less than $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}$ and exports of less than $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}$ during 2001-02;
- large businesses - having 200 or more employees or estimated annual turnover of $\$ 20 \mathrm{~m}$ or more or exports of $\$ 20 \mathrm{~m}$ or more during 2001-02; and
- medium businesses - all businesses other than those defined as small or large.

There were 4,229 large businesses identified as goods exporters in this study, accounting for $\$ 109.9 \mathrm{~b}$ ( $91 \%$ ) of merchandise exports during the reference period. Approximately 600 of these exported goods valued at $\$ 20 \mathrm{~m}$ or more in the financial year. Mining industry exports were the most dominated by large business, accounting for over $99 \%$ of mining industry exports and constituting almost half the number of exporting businesses in that industry. Property and business services had the lowest proportion of exports of goods by large businesses (58\%).

The 13,942 medium sized exporters identified in the study accounted for $\$ 10.1 \mathrm{~b}(8 \%)$ of goods exports. They were most prevalent in the manufacturing and wholesale industries, accounting for almost $55 \%$ of exporters in each of these industries.

In 2001-02, $40 \%(12,069)$ of Australia's goods exporters were small businesses. They contributed $\$ 1.1 \mathrm{~b}(1 \%)$ to Australia's total goods exports.

STATE OF ORIGIN It is not currently possible to compile data about exporters based on their state of operation. Instead, it is possible to estimate the number of businesses that exported goods produced in a given state. Many businesses exported goods produced in more than one state. In 2001-02, half of all Australia's exporters exported some goods produced in New South Wales, and $40 \%$ exported some goods produced in Victoria.

The number of businesses that exported goods in 2001-02, by their state of production, were in descending order, New South Wales $(15,140)$, Victoria $(12,250)$, Queensland $(7,700)$, Western Australia $(3,830)$, South Australia $(2,970)$, Tasmania (575) and Northern Territory (400). The manufacturing and wholesale trade industries contributed the highest number of businesses exporting goods from each state and the Northern Territory. It is known that some businesses have difficulty in identifying the state of production of some of their exports. This may disproportionately impact on the smaller states.

Almost half $(14,580)$ of Australia's exporters re-exported goods in 2001-02, with a total value of $\$ 7.6 \mathrm{~b}$. Of these, it is estimated that approximately 1,200 businesses only re-exported goods. Re-exports are goods that are imported and then exported in the same condition or after undergoing repair or minor alterations which leave them essentially unchanged. Minor alterations include blending, packaging and cleaning.

One-quarter of Australia's goods exports came from Western Australia, followed by Queensland with almost 20\%. These two States accounted for $74 \%$ ( $\$ 27.7 \mathrm{~b}$ ) of exports by the mining industry. New South Wales and Victoria each accounted for $18 \%$ (about $\$ 22.0 \mathrm{~b}$ ) of Australia's exports, most of which were by the manufacturing industry.

## IMPORTERS

> NUMBER In 2001-02, there were estimated to be 55,355 businesses that imported goods or services into Australia, excluding those with imports worth less than $\$ 10,000$ and other key limitations referred to on page 10. The number of businesses importing goods was estimated to be 54,385 , while there were approximately 2,300 importers of services. Almost $60 \%(1,330)$ of businesses that engaged in service imports were also importers of goods. By eliminating the double counting, the total number of businesses that imported goods and services was derived at $55,355(54,385$ plus 2,300 less 1,330$)$. Analysis of the SITS population indicated there were approximately 1,760 businesses that undertake both the export and import of services, and 540 that only import services.
> The estimate of the number of services importers for 2001-02 is lower than that published in the experimental article for the period July to December 2001. This is due to a refinement of the methodology used to derive the number of importers. The estimate is subject to both sampling and non-sampling error. It also does not include the large number of businesses overseas that provide services to Australians travelling abroad.
> The 163 largest goods importers, each with imports worth $\$ 100 \mathrm{~m}$ or more, accounted for $\$ 56.3 \mathrm{~b}$ ( $47 \%$ ) of Australia's goods imports in $2001-02$. There were 8,192 businesses that imported goods worth $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}$ or more, together accounting for $\$ 112.6 \mathrm{~b}$ ( $94 \%$ ) of goods imports. Another 16,864 businesses imported goods valued between $\$ 100,000$ and $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}$, accounting for $\$ 5.8 \mathrm{~b}$ ( $5 \%$ ) of goods imports in $2001-02$.
> Just over half ( 29,329 ) of Australia's goods importers had imports valued between $\$ 10,000$ and $\$ 100,000$ during $2001-02$, accounting for less than $1 \%$ of goods imports in that period.

INDUSTRY Most goods imports were by the wholesale trade ( $46 \%$ by value) and manufacturing (36\%) industries. Together these accounted for $\$ 98.3 \mathrm{~b}$ ( $82 \%$ ) of Australia's $\$ 119.6 \mathrm{~b}$ goods imports during 2001-02. The next most significant industry was retail trade with \$6.9b (6\%) of goods imports.

Imports by machinery and equipment manufacturers, and machinery and motor vehicle wholesalers, were significant, together accounting for $\$ 46.2 \mathrm{~b}$ (39\%) of Australia's goods imports.

Table F9 compares the industry of the importer with the industry of origin of the commodities imported. This shows that in 2001-02, $93 \%$ of Australia's imports were manufactured commodities of which $36 \%$ ( $\$ 40.4 \mathrm{~b}$ ) were imported by the manufacturing industry, and $47 \%$ ( $\$ 52.1$ b) by the wholesale trade industry. The high value of imports of manufactured goods by the manufacturing industry is largely because many Australian businesses manufacture some of their commodities in Australia and import others in their product line from overseas. An example is the motor vehicle industry.

OVERLAP BETWEEN IMPORTERS AND EXPORTERS

Of the 30,240 businesses with goods exports worth $\$ 10,000$ or more in 2001-02, 13,608 $(45 \%)$ also imported goods valued at $\$ 10,000$ or more. Over $40 \%(1,789)$ of those with goods exports worth $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}$ or more, also imported goods valued at $\$ 1 \mathrm{~m}$ or more in 2001-02. Businesses with exports valued between $\$ 10,000$ and $\$ 100,000$ were the least likely to have also imported goods with about 6,000 (36\%) of these also having imported goods worth $\$ 10,000$ or more in 2001-02.

## EXPLANATORYNOTES

| INTRODUCTION | 1 This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups. <br> 2 The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The paragraphs below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation. More detailed information on methods used in compiling data can be found in International Merchandise Trade, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods (cat. no. 5489.0). | RELATIONSHIP TO BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATISTICS | 3 The basic source of balance of payments data on goods exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only) valuation adjustments are necessary before international trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 6 of Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods (cat. no. 5331.0). |
| SOURCE OF DATA | 4 International merchandise trade statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (Customs). |
| SCOPE | 5 Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) the stock of material resources in Australia. <br> Excluded are: <br> - direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only; <br> - ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and <br> - non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (e.g. mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects). |

## EXPLANATORYNOTES

6 The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries-the customs record-will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:

- migrants' and passengers' effects exported or imported; and
- parcel post exports for values not exceeding $\$ 2,000$ and parcel post imports for values not exceeding $\$ 1,000$.

For exports only:

- fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- export consignments where the value of goods is less than $\$ 2,000$.

For imports only:

- bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft; and
- From July 1998 individual transaction lines (within a formally entered import consignment) where the value of goods is less than $\$ 250$ are not processed by ABS and are excluded from import statistics.
In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information.

7 The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into bonded warehouses.

8 Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.

9 Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged. Information on re-exports is shown in table 25.

10 Exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia.

11 Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are finalised by the Customs. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by Customs. Currently, approximately $90 \%$ of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately $5 \%$ reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining $5 \%$ by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.

12 Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. In rare circumstances, and only when the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

## EXPLANATORYNOTES

13 The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment, and enter an approximate value, must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.

14 The value of imports is the Australian Customs Value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.

15 For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with Customs provisions.

16 For exports, 'country' refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. Tables 7 and 33 which show exports by country also include the item "Ship and aircraft stores". "Ship and aircraft stores" comprise fuel, food and other goods loaded onto foreign owned vessels and aircraft to be consumed during international journeys.

17 For imports, 'country' refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of import and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'. Goods reported with country of origin 'Australia' (i.e. goods of Australian origin exported and subsequently re-imported) are shown as country 'Australia (Re-imports)' and are included in the Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation country group.

18 Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).

19 However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.

BROAD ECONOMIC CATEGORIES

CONFIDENTIALITY

20 The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:

Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);
Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);
Developing Countries (DCs);
European Union (EU).
21 A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in APEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.

22 More details on the composition of countries identified in these statistics are available from the Classification Manager on Canberra 0262525409.

23 Commodity export and import statistics in tables 9 to 24 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' Standard International Trade Classification (SITC Rev3) which came into effect in January 1988. The ABS has added dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.

24 State information for exports presented in table 25 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.

25 State information for imports presented in table 26 refers to the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under Customs control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by Customs.

26 Export and import statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in tables 27 and 28. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the primary activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), 1993 Edition (cat. no. 1292.0).

27 Merchandise trade in tables 29 and 30 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' Classification By Broad Economic Categories (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

28 Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. For information on the confidentiality restrictions and their impact upon the statistics in this publication, analysts should refer to the feature article on Data Confidentiality in the December 1999 issue.

## EXPLANATORY NOTES

30 Statistics for recent periods should be considered preliminary. Revisions to previously published data frequently occur due to continuing data quality checks.
