



- The surplus with Japan increased by \$746 million (62%) to \$1,959 million.
- The deficit with USA increased by \$579 million (12%) to \$3,072 million.
- There was a deficit of \$322 million with the United Kingdom, after a surplus of \$239 million in the June quarter 2002.

CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE

On 1 July 2002, the threshold for reporting an export entry was raised to \$2,000 per consignment, from the previous \$500 per line entry. For more details of these changes and their statistical impacts see the feature article The effect of Customs changes on export statistics, in the June quarter 2002 issue of this publication.

This issue includes a feature article *Trade through Australia's ports*. The article (pages 10 to 17) examines the value and volume of international merchandise trade through Australia's main seaports and airports over the period 1998-99 to 2001-02.

REVISIONS

Since the last issue of this publication, minor revisions have been made to data for the March and June quarters 2002 due to amendments to the source records lodged with the Australian Customs Service.

QUARTERLY ANALYSIS AND COMMENTS

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

In the September quarter 2002, merchandise imports exceeded exports by \$3,041 million, or 10.0% of the value of exports. This followed a deficit of \$284 million in the June quarter.

Despite the substantially increased deficit, Australia's trade position improved with some of its major trading partners:


- Japan, the surplus increased by \$746 million (62%), to \$1,959 million;
- Republic of Korea, the surplus increased by \$175 million (13%) to \$1,498 million; and
- Singapore, the surplus increased by \$97 million (61%) to \$253 million.

Australia's trade position worsened with:

- China, the deficit increased by \$708 million (102%) to \$1,405 million
- USA, the deficit increased by \$580 million (23%) to \$3,072 million; and,
- United Kingdom moved back into deficit (\$322 million), after the June quarter surplus of \$239 million.

Australia's overall trade position with its other trading partners worsened.

AUSTRALIA'S QUARTERLY TRADE WITH MAJOR COUNTRIES, Excess of exports (+) or imports (-)




MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the September quarter 2002 were \$30,462 million, up \$830 million (2.8%) from the June quarter 2002. The increase this quarter was close to the average of the past six June to September quarterly movements (2.5%).

The increase in merchandise exports occurred despite a slight decrease in the average prices received for exports. The Export Price Index fell 0.2% in the September quarter. Price falls for a wide range of products, most notably beef and wool, were partially offset by price rises for several other products, with petroleum gases and oils being the largest positive contributors. Estimates of chain volume measures for exports and seasonally adjusted data will be published in the September quarter 2002 issue of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia* (Cat. no. 5302.0) to be released on 29 November 2002.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS



Most export commodity groups recorded increases during the September quarter 2002. The most significant increases occurred in:

- Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials, up \$559 million (9%) to \$6,517 million, due mainly to increases in Crude petroleum (SITC 333), up \$300 million (20%) to \$1,769 million and Natural gas (SITC 343), up \$261 million (52%) to \$766 million;
- Commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere in the SITC, up \$469 million (16%) to \$3,459 million; and,
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$151 million (5%) to \$3,424 million.


These increases were partially offset by a decrease in *Food and live animals*, down \$357 million (7%) to \$4,861 million.

MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Mechandise imports for the September quarter 2002 were \$33,503 million, up \$3,588 million (12.0%) on the June quarter 2002. The increase this quarter was the largest June to September quarter movement since 1999 and considerably higher than the average of the past six June to September quarters (6.8%)

The increase in merchandise imports was only marginally due to a slight increase (0.2%) in average prices paid for imports, as measured by the Import Price Index. Price increases for many products, most notably petroleum oils, goods vehicles and alcoholic beverages, were partially offset by price decreases for other products, with inorganic chemicals and computing equipment being the largest negative contributors. MERCHANDISE IMPORTS



The import commodities recording the most significant increases on the previous quarter were:

- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$1,906 million (14%) to \$15,698 million, due mainly to increases in Ships (SITC 793), up \$343 million to \$426 million, Aircraft (SITC 792), up \$387 million (44%) to \$1,264 million, and Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781), up \$294 million (12%) to \$2,716 million;
- Miscellaneous manufactured articles, up \$911 million (22%) to \$4,991 million;
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$341 million (9%) to \$4,057 million.

The only decrease occurred in *Commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere in the SITC*, down \$41 million (6%) to \$693 million.

EXCESS OF MERCHANDISE EXPORTS OR IMPORTS

For the year ended September 2002, merchandise imports exceeded merchandise exports by \$3,221 million, or 2.7% of the value of exports. This is a \$7,905 million turnaround from the surplus of \$4,684 million recorded for the year ended September 2001.

Australia's trading position improved with:


- Republic of Korea, the surplus increased by \$718 million (16%) to \$5,341 million;
- United Kingdom, the deficit decreased by \$685 million (43%) to \$893 million; and,
- New Zealand, the surplus increased by \$498 million (20%) to \$2,964 million.

Australia's trading position worsened with:

- Japan, the surplus decreased by \$1,897 million (21%) to \$6,933 million;
- Singapore, the surplus decreased by \$1,260 million (62%) to \$769 million;
- China, the deficit increased by \$1,210 million (44%) to \$3,976 million;
- USA, the deficit increased by \$1,142 million (12%) to \$10,750 million; and,
- Taiwan, the surplus decreased by \$980 million (38%) to \$1,575 million.

Australia's overall deficit with other countries increased by \$3,326 million (178%) to \$5,184 million.

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS

Merchandise exports for the year ended September 2002 were \$119,909 million, a decrease of \$2,792 million (2.3%) from the year ended September 2001. The export commodity groups recording significant increases over this period were:


- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$866 million (6%) to \$14,279 million.
 There was a large increase in Aircraft (SITC 792), up \$962 million (150%), and a rise in Motor vehicle parts (SITC 784), up \$150 million (17%)
- Commodities and transactions not classified elsewhere in the SITC, up \$861 million (8%) to \$11,852 million; and,
- Beverages and tobacco, up \$369 million (18%) to \$2,457 million. This was largely due to an increase in Alcoholic beverages (SITC 112), up \$356 million (18%).

MERCHANDISE EXPORTS continued

The most significant decreases were recorded for the following commodity groups:

- Crude materials, inedible, except fuels, down \$2,108 million (9%) to \$21,963 million due mainly to decreases in Cotton (SITC 263), down \$764 million (37%) and Aluminium ores (SITC 285), down \$631 million (14%);
- *Mineral fuels, lubricants and related materials*, down \$1,169 million (5%) to \$24,808 million; and,
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, down \$861 million (6%) to \$13,424 million.


COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF EXPORTS



Australia's major export destinations for the year ended September 2002 were:

- Japan, down \$1,500 million (6%) to \$22,496 million;
- USA, down \$510 million (4%) to \$11,583 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$771 million (8%) to \$10,074 million;
- China, up \$519 million (7%) to \$7,921 million;
- New Zealand, up \$669 million (9%) to \$7,777 million;
- United Kingdom, up \$119 million (2%) to \$5,083 million;
- Singapore, down \$1,037 million (18%) to \$4,881 million; and,
- Taiwan, down \$914 million (16%) to \$4,800 million.

COUNTRY COMPOSITION OF EXPORTS




MERCHANDISE IMPORTS

Merchandise imports for the year ended September 2002 were \$123,130 million, an increase of \$5,112 million (4.3%) over imports for the year ended September 2001. The import commodities which recorded the largest increases were:

- Machinery and transport equipment, up \$3,309 million (6%) to \$56,060 million. There were large increases in Aircraft (SITC 792), up \$1,008 million (37%), Passenger motor vehicles (SITC 781), up \$855 million (10%), and Goods motor vehicles (SITC 782), up \$486 million (22%); and,
- Manufactured goods classified chiefly by material, up \$1,142 million (8%) to \$15,191 million.

The only commodity group to record a decrease was *Mineral fuel, lubricants and related materials*, down \$1,841 million (17%) to \$8,705 million. This was due mainly to Crude petroleum (SITC 333), down \$1,903 million (23%).

COMMODITY COMPOSITION (SITC SECTION) OF IMPORTS




Australia's major import sources for the year ended September 2002 were:

- USA, up \$631 million (3%) to \$22,333 million;
- Japan, up \$397 million (3%) to \$15,563 million;
- China, up \$1,729 million (17%) to \$11,897 million;
- Germany, up \$749 million (12%) to \$7,152 million;
- United Kingdom, down \$566 million (9%) to \$5,976 million;
- New Zealand, up \$171 million (4%) to \$4,813 million;
- Republic of Korea, up \$53 million (1%) to \$4,733 million; and,
- Singapore, up \$223 million (6%) to \$4,112 million.

INTRODUCTION

This article examines the composition and changes in Australia's international merchandise trade through its seaports and airports over the past four years, in both value and volume terms. The transport of domestically traded goods (e.g. between Sydney and Melbourne) is excluded from this analysis.

Commodities are classified to the Standard International Trade Classification Rev. 3 (SITC Rev. 3), consistent with other data in this publication. Data are on a merchandise trade basis. Gross weight has been used to provide a common unit of measurement for trade volumes across all commodities.

Confidentiality restrictions affect some of the analysis. Depending on the type of restriction applied, data for confidential commodities may have been:

- a) excluded from the figures for an individual port; or
- b) included in the total figures for the port, but classified to a special category 'Confidential commodities'.

In 2001-02, approximately \$0.5b of exports was not attributed to an individual port listed in Tables F1 and F2 for the reasons outlined in (a) above. The only ports affected were Kwinana and Bunbury.

In 2001-02, Australia's total merchandise trade (exports plus imports) amounted to 566m tonnes of goods valued at \$240.8b. This represented a 15% increase (by weight) and a 31% increase (by value) since 1998-99. By value, 76% of goods were transported by sea, accounting for \$99.2b (82%) of exports and \$84.6b (71%) of imports. Goods transported by air accounted for 24% (\$56.7b) of total trade.

Exports accounted for 90% of total trade by weight and 50% by value in 2001-02. The total value of Australia's merchandise exports grew from \$86.0b in 1998-99 to \$121.1b in 2001-02, an increase of 41%. The volume of exports increased by only 17%, the difference reflecting price increases for some commodities and the depreciation of the Australian dollar against many major currencies. Imports increased 3% by weight and 23% by value in the same period.

By value, the seaports of Melbourne (\$47.7b in 2001-02), Sydney (\$38.2b) and Brisbane (\$18.3b), and Mascot Airport (\$28.9b), were the largest ports, each handling substantial values of both exports and imports.

Ports that handled the largest tonnage of international goods were the seaports of Newcastle, Hay Point and Port Hedland, which were each responsible for around 70m tonnes of trade (or 12-13% of total trade by weight). For these three seaports, 99% of trade was exports, particularly in raw minerals (coal and iron ore).

Of the top 10 (sea)ports by weight, Port Walcott, Gladstone, Hay Point and Melbourne experienced the biggest increases in total trade by weight over the past three years, ranging between a 50% increase for Port Walcott to a 28% increase for Melbourne. In contrast, Kwinana fell 18%, driven down by a fall in both exports and imports.



MAJOR PORTS

PORT OF MELBOURNE


In 2001-02, the Port of Melbourne handled 20% of Australia's trade by value, with exports of \$18.8b and imports of \$28.9b. Melbourne was Australia's biggest exporting port by value in each of the past four years and ranked second for imports. By weight, it was less significant, ranked 11th in 1998-99 rising to 6th in 2001-02. This was driven by a 73% increase in exports, which was partially offset by a 9% fall in imports.

The major exports from the Port of Melbourne were agricultural commodities, particularly dairy products, wool, beef, lamb and wheat. Over 80% of Australia's exports of dairy products were shipped from Melbourne (\$2.8b in 2001-02), destined mainly for South-East Asia and Japan. Exports of passenger motor vehicles and parts were worth \$2.1b, double the value of four years ago. There were 72,000 cars (\$1.5b) shipped overseas in 2001-02, mostly to the Middle East and New Zealand.



In 2001-02, one fifth of imports to the Port of Melbourne were road vehicles and parts (\$5.1b), up from \$4.3b in 1998-99. Passenger motor vehicles (144,000 cars valued at \$2.8b) and motor vehicle parts (\$1.4b) were the largest components in 2001-02, sourced largely from Japan, Germany and USA.

By weight, crude petroleum was the largest import in 2001-02, amounting to 1.2m tonnes (or 1.4b litres) valued at \$401m. This was followed by paper and paperboard products at 457,000 tonnes, valued at \$742m. Both commodities had lower volumes of imports in 2001-02 than 1998-99, with paper and paperboard products down 11% and crude petroleum down 56%.




MAJOR PORTS continued

PORT OF SYDNEY

By value, the Port of Sydney was the second largest Australian port, accounting for \$38.2b (16%) of Australia's total trade in 2001-02. It ranked second by value of exports and first by value of imports. By weight, it ranked 8th, with over 14m tonnes shipped, of which 10m tonnes were imports and 4m tonnes were exports.

The most important exports by value were aluminium, wool, beef, and cotton. In 2001-02, they accounted for 29% (\$2.4b) of exports from this port. Aluminium, cotton and refined petroleum were the largest exports by weight.


Strong growth was recorded in exports of wine in the period studied. The value and volume of exports of alcoholic beverages, mainly wine, more than doubled from 1998-99 to reach \$357m and 58m litres in 2001-02.



The value of imports to the Port of Sydney increased by 21% over the past three years, reaching \$30.1b in 2001-02, or 25% of Australia's total merchandise imports.

Passenger motor vehicles were the largest import by value, worth \$3.1b in 2001-02, an increase of 37% since 1998-99. 150,000 vehicles were imported through the port in 2001-02, up from 133,600 in 1998-99. Computers and parts were the next largest import (\$1.7b in 2001-02), followed by crude petroleum (\$1.2b), which has risen by 150% in value since 1998-99.

Crude petroleum (3.6m tonnes or 4.3b litres) and refined petroleum (987,000 tonnes or 1.1b litres) were the largest imports by weight. Together these accounted for 45% of imports by weight in 2001-02. Paper and paperboard products were the next largest import at 520,000 tonnes in 2001-02.




MAJOR PORTS continued

PORT OF BRISBANE

By value, Brisbane has been the third largest seaport in Australia for each of the past four years for both exports and imports. Its total trade in 2001-02 was \$18.3b, comprising \$7.8b of exports and \$10.5b of imports. This represented a 42% increase since 1998-99. Over the same period total trade by weight increased 16% to 18.6m tonnes.


Food products contributed almost half the value of exports from the Port of Brisbane over this period. In 2001-02, these were valued at \$3.6b. Beef was the major export, accounting for \$2.2b (28%) of exports. The next largest were cotton, at \$752m (10%), and lamb, at \$309m (4%).

By weight, coal was the largest export by a substantial margin, accounting for 3.1m tonnes (30%) of exports in 2001-02. The volume of coal exports was 35% higher than the previous year, after being relatively stable over the three previous years. Refined petroleum, at 682,000 tonnes or 766m litres, and wheat, at 622,000 tonnes, were the next largest exports.



In 2001-02, imports to the Port of Brisbane accounted for \$10.5b (9%) of the value of Australia's imports, up from \$7.6b in 1998-99. The gross weight of imports peaked at 9.1m tonnes in 1999-00, dropping to 8.4m tonnes in 2001-02. This was 14% of Australia's total imports by weight.

Crude petroleum was one of the two largest imports by value in each of the past four years (\$1.7b in 2001-02) and the largest import by weight (5.2m tonnes or 6.4b litres in 2001-02). It accounted for 62% of the gross weight and 16% of the value of imports in 2001-02. Passenger and goods motor vehicles were the other large contributors, together valued at \$2.6b (25% of total) in 2001-02, up from \$2.0b in 1998-99. Three quarters of these imports were cars.




MAJOR PORTS continued

MASCOT AIRPORT

Mascot Airport was the largest airport, and the third largest port overall, by value, during each of the years included in this analysis. In 2001-02, \$8.1b (7%) of exports and \$20.8b (17%) of imports were transported through Mascot Airport. It accounted for 50% or more of all trade by air over the past four years.

The major exports by value were machinery and transport equipment, which accounted for \$3.0b (37%) of exports from Mascot Airport in 2001-02. The most important contributor to this category was computers and parts (\$1.2b). Almost 80% of these were re-exports i.e. goods imported and then exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor alterations. Medicinal and pharmaceutical products totalled \$1.3b, of which \$308m were re-exports.

The major imports by value in 2001-02 were computers and parts (\$4.3b), medicinal and pharmaceutical products (\$3.1b) and telecommunications equipment (\$2.7b).



OTHER PORTS

Major imports to the seaports of other Australian capital cities tend to be similar to those examined for the seaports in the previous section i.e. motor vehicles, for both passengers and goods; crude petroleum; and other manufactured goods. Most of the regional seaports have relatively minor imports in comparison to their exports, unless they have, for example, an oil refinery or major manufacturing plant nearby.

NEW SOUTH WALES

Newcastle, Port Botany and Port Kembla were the major NSW seaports apart from the Port of Sydney. In 2001-02, exports from Newcastle were valued at \$5.7b, of which 66% (\$3.8b) was coal. By weight of exports, Newcastle was Australia's largest port, accounting for 14% of Australia's total exports. Coal and wheat were the major exports from Port Kembla, while from Port Botany they were aluminium and wool.

VICTORIA

Apart from the Port of Melbourne, Geelong was Victoria's other major seaport, accounting for around 5% of Victorian exports by value in 2001-02. Major exports shipped were refined petroleum and wheat, valued at around \$400m each.

Melbourne Airport was Australia's second largest airport, and fifth largest port, by value, in each of the past four years. A wide range of goods were exported and imported. Non-monetary gold was the major export, peaking at \$2.3b in 1998-99 and worth \$1.5b in 2001-02. Over one-third related to gold that was imported for processing and then re-exported.

QUEENSLAND

With significant exports of minerals and agricultural goods, Queensland has several major exporting ports apart from the Port of Brisbane. In 2001-02, Hay Point (\$5.3b), Gladstone (\$4.2b) and Townsville (\$2.9b) together accounted for 52% of Queensland exports. By weight, Hay Point (69m tonnes) and Gladstone (40m tonnes) were Queensland's largest ports, the major commodity shipped from each was coal.

OTHER PORTS continued

WESTERN AUSTRALIA In 2001-02, Fremantle (\$4.5b), Kwinana (\$2.8b), Port Hedland (\$2.5b) and Bunbury (\$2.5b) were Western Australia's major seaports. A range of commodities including wheat, nickel, pigments and paints, and live sheep, were the major exports from Fremantle. Wheat and nickel were some of the major exports from Kwinana, whilst Port Hedland (\$2.1b) and Dampier (\$2.3b) had substantial exports of iron ore.

> Perth Airport was Australia's third largest airport by value, with exports exceeding \$5b in each of the past four years. Non-monetary gold accounted for \$4.0b (69%) of exports in 1998-99 and around half of exports in each of the three subsequent years.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA Port Adelaide was the major South Australian port with \$6.6b of trade in 2001-02. The value of exports increased markedly in the past three years (up 90% by value and 52% by weight), due partly to increased exports of motor vehicles and wine. Exports of passenger motor vehicles were worth \$1.4b in 2001-02, up from \$565m in 1998-99. Exports of alcoholic beverages, mainly wine, more than doubled in the same period from \$404m to \$873m. The most significant imports to Port Adelaide were passenger and goods motor vehicles, together valued at \$323m in 2001-02.

TASMANIA Launceston and Hobart are Tasmania's major ports, together accounting for \$1.5b of exports in 2001-02. The largest commodities exported by value were zinc from Hobart (\$347m) and aluminium (\$362m) from Launceston. Some of Tasmania's major exports are subject to confidentiality restrictions. It should be noted that some goods originating from Tasmania are exported from the Port of Melbourne.

INTRODUCTION

- **1** This publication contains quarterly statistics of Australia's merchandise trade with its major trading partners and selected country groups.
- **2** The merchandise export and import statistics in this publication are compiled in broad agreement with the United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of international trade statistics. The paragraphs below briefly describe the concepts and methods used in their compilation. More detailed information on methods used in compiling data can be found in *International Merchandise Trade*, *Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (cat. no. 5489.0). This publication can be accessed on the ABS website <URL:http//www.abs.gov.au> see Statistics; Statistical Concepts Library; ABS concepts, sources, methods and statistical framework; 5489.0 International Merchandise Trade, Australia, CSM.

RELATIONSHIP TO BALANCE OF PAYMENTS STATISTICS

3 The basic source of balance of payments data on goods exports and imports is 'international merchandise trade statistics'. However, because of conceptual differences, various coverage, timing and (imports only) valuation adjustments are necessary before international trade statistics can be put on a balance of payments basis. For more information on the relationship between international merchandise trade statistics and balance of payments statistics on merchandise trade see Chapter 6 of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods* (cat. no. 5331.0).

SOURCE OF DATA

4 International merchandise trade statistics are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service (Customs).

SCOPE

5 Merchandise trade covers all movable goods which add to (imports) or subtract from (exports) the stock of material resources in Australia.

Excluded are:

- direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- ships and aircraft moving through Australia while engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries; and
- non-merchandise goods, consisting primarily of goods moving on a temporary basis (e.g. mobile equipment; goods under repair; goods for exhibition; and passengers' effects).

COVERAGE

- **6** The United Nations' recommendations for the compilation of merchandise trade statistics recognise that the basic source used by most compiling countries—the customs record—will not be able to capture certain transactions. In Australia the following types of goods which fall within the scope of merchandise trade, are excluded because customs entries are not required:
 - migrants' and passengers' effects exported or imported; and
- parcel post exports for values not exceeding \$2,000 and parcel post imports for values not exceeding \$1,000.

For exports only:

- fish and other sea products landed abroad directly from the high seas by Australian ships; and
- export consignments where the value of the goods is less than \$2,000.

For imports only:

- bunkers, aviation fuel and stores supplied abroad to Australian ships and aircraft; and
- From July 1998 individual transaction lines (within a formally entered import consignment) where the value of goods is less than \$250 are not processed by ABS and are excluded from import statistics.

In addition, although merchandise trade statistics should include illegal transactions, such as smuggled goods, these transactions are omitted as there is no practical way to collect this information.

BASIS OF COMPILATION

- **7** The merchandise trade statistics in this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. exports include both Australian produce and re-exports, and imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into bonded warehouses.
- **8** Australian produce is defined as goods, materials or articles which have been produced or manufactured in Australia. Processing and assembly operations that leave imported components and products essentially unchanged are not considered as production or manufacture.
- **9** Re-exports are defined as goods, materials or articles originally imported into Australia which are exported in the same condition or after undergoing minor operations (e.g. blending, packaging, bottling, cleaning, husking and shelling) which leave them essentially unchanged. Information on re-exports is shown in table 25.
- **10** Exports are recorded in the calendar month in which the goods departed from Australia.
- 11 Imports are generally recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are finalised by the Customs. Import entries may be lodged early and finalised prior to arrival, or their finalisation may be delayed because of the various validation checks carried out by Customs. Currently, approximately 85% of total import trade by value shown for a particular month reflects shipments which arrived in that month, while approximately 10% reflects shipments which arrived during the previous month with the remaining 5% by value arriving in earlier or later months. For individual commodities these percentages may vary considerably.
- **12** Occasionally significant delays occur in the lodgement, rather than processing, of import entries. In rare circumstances, and only when the affected entries are for significant values, they are recorded statistically in the month that they should have been lodged and finalised.

STATISTICAL PERIOD

VALUATION

COUNTRY

- **13** The value of exports is the free on board (f.o.b.) transactions value of the goods expressed in Australian dollars. Goods shipped on consignment are initially valued at the f.o.b. Australian port of shipment equivalent of the current price offering for similar goods of Australian origin in the principal markets of the country to which the goods are despatched for sale. Exporters who do not know the value of the goods at shipment, and enter an approximate value, must subsequently submit an entry either confirming or revising the estimated return.
- **14** The value of imports is the Australian Customs Value. Goods are valued at the point of containerisation (in most cases) or the port of shipment, or at the customs frontier of the exporting country, whichever comes first.
- **15** For the purposes of international merchandise trade statistics, a country is defined as a geographical entity which trades, or has the potential to trade, with Australia in accordance with Customs provisions.
- **16** For exports, 'country' refers to the country to which the goods were consigned at the time of export. Where the country of consignment is not known at the time of export, and where it is impossible to determine the destination, goods are recorded as 'Destination Unknown'. Tables 7 and 33 which show exports by country also include the item "Ship and aircraft stores". "Ship and aircraft stores" comprise fuel, food and other goods loaded onto foreign owned vessels and aircraft to be consumed during international journeys.
- **17** For imports, 'country' refers to the country of origin of the goods, which is defined as the country of production for Customs purposes. Where the country of origin is not known at the time of import and where it is impossible to determine the origin, goods are recorded as 'Origin Unknown'. Goods reported with country of origin 'Australia' (i.e. goods of Australian origin exported and subsequently re-imported) are shown as country 'Australia (Re-imports)' and are included in the Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation country group.
- **18** Wherever possible, statistics for countries and country groups for all time periods included in this publication reflect the composition of those countries and country groups on the last day of the reference period of this publication. Thus, after the German Democratic Republic and the German Federal Republic were reunited, statistics for all periods both before and after re-unification refer to the combined entity (called Germany in country classified statistics).
- **19** However, in the case of a country that breaks into a number of component entities, it is not possible to provide data for earlier periods for the new entities. For example, from October 1991, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania are each separately identified in the statistics, but for earlier periods trade data for these three republics are included indistinguishably in data for the USSR.

20 The country groups shown in this publication are selected economic groups with which Australia trades, namely:

Asia Pacific Economic Co-operation (APEC);

Association of South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN);

Developing Countries (DCs);

European Union (EU).

- **21** A list of the countries included in each of the above groups is shown in the Appendix. Country groups may not be mutually exclusive e.g. Indonesia is included in APEC, ASEAN and as a Developing Country. The countries that belong to more than one group are identified with a footnote in the Appendix.
- **22** More details on the composition of countries identified in these statistics are available from the *Classification Manager* on Canberra 02 6252 5409.

COMMODITY CLASSIFICATION

23 Commodity export and import statistics in tables 9 to 24 of this publication are presented according to the codes and descriptions of the third revision of the United Nations' *Standard International Trade Classification* (SITC Rev3) which came into effect in January 1988. The ABS has added dummy codes to take account of Australia's treatment of gold coin, whether or not legal tender, and other legal tender coin and confidential items.

STATE

- **24** State information for exports presented in table 25 refers to the State in which the final stage of production or manufacture occurs.
- **25** State information for imports presented in table 26 refers to the State where imported goods were released from Customs control, also called the State of final destination. The State of final destination is not necessarily the State in which the port of discharge of the goods is located. Goods can be forwarded interstate after discharge either under Customs control or not, but are recorded as being imported into the State where they are released by Customs.

INDUSTRY OF ORIGIN

26 Export and import statistics classified by subdivisions of the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) are shown in tables 27 and 28. The statistics are compiled by allocating statistical items of the Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification (AHECC) and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the ANZSIC industry of origin based upon the primary activities of those industries with which the commodities are primarily associated. A full description of ANZSIC classes is contained in the publication *Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC)*, *1993 Edition* (cat. no. 1292.0).

BROAD ECONOMIC CATEGORIES

27 Merchandise trade in tables 29 and 30 are classified according to the categories of the United Nations' *Classification By Broad Economic Categories* (BEC). The BEC classifies international merchandise trade statistics for the purposes of general economic analysis according to the main end use of the commodities traded. The statistics are compiled by allocating the statistical items of the AHECC and the Harmonized Customs Tariff to the appropriate BEC.

CONFIDENTIALITY

28 Restrictions are placed on the release of statistics for certain commodities for reasons of confidentiality. These restrictions do not affect total export and import figures, but they can affect statistics at all levels in country and commodity tables. For information on the confidentiality restrictions and their impact upon the statistics in this publication, analysts should refer to the feature article on *Data Confidentiality* in the December 1999 issue.

RELIABILITY

30 Statistics for recent periods should be considered preliminary. Revisions to previously published data frequently occur due to continuing data quality checks.
