NOTES

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION	This publication presents information about people aged 15 years and over who are not in the labour force: that is, neither employed nor unemployed. The data measure the potential supply of labour not reflected in employment and unemployment statistics.
	Statistics in this publication were obtained from the Persons Not in the Labour Force survey, conducted throughout Australia in September 2005 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS).
	This survey provides information about people aged 15 years and over who were not in the labour force. The survey collected details about whether they wanted to work, reasons why they were not actively looking for work, their availability for work, and their main activity while not in the labour force.
	Many people not in the labour force could be considered to have some attachment to the labour force. For example they may want a job, but for a variety of reasons are not actively looking for work or are not currently available to start a job. There is an expectation that many of these people will move into the labour force in the short term, or could do so if labour market conditions changed.
NOTES ABOUT THE ESTIMATES	The scope of the Persons Not in the Labour Force survey was expanded in September 2005 to include all people aged 15 years and over. Previously the scope was restricted to people aged 15–69 years. This change has resulted in an extra 1.6 million people coming within the scope of this survey. Users need to exercise care when comparing the estimates in this publication with previous publications. Direct comparisons should only be made where the populations are the same.

CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK

PERSONS NOT IN THE LABOUR FORCE AGED 15 YEARS AND OVER


Persons not in the labour force can be divided into those who are marginally attached to the labour force, and those who are not. Persons who are marginally attached to the labour force may satisfy some, but not all, of the criteria required to be classified as unemployed.

Persons not in the labour force are considered to be marginally attached to the labour force if they:

- want to work and are actively looking for work but are not available to start work in the reference week, or
- want to work and are not actively looking for work but are available to start work within four weeks.

Persons not in the labour force are not marginally attached to the labour force if they:

- do not want to work, or
- want to work but are not actively looking for work and are not available to start work within four weeks.


SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

OVERVIEW

In September 2005, there were 5,453,500 people aged 15 years and over who were not in the labour force. This represented 34% of the civilian population aged 15 years and over. Just under one-quarter (21%) of persons not in the labour force wanted to work and 61% of persons not in the labour force were women.

The proportion of people who were not in the labour force varied according to age. In the 15–19 years age group, where there are high levels of participation in education, the proportion was 41% for men and 38% for women. In all other age groups, there were more women than men not in the labour force. The proportion of women not in the labour force decreased from 27% for those aged 25–34 years to 23% for those aged 45–54 years, before increasing sharply to 43% for those aged 55–59 years, and 98% for those aged 70 years and over. For men in the same age groups, the proportion not in the labour force increased from 7% for those aged 25–34 and 35–44 years, to 11% for those aged 45–54 years, 24% for those aged 55–59 years, and 93% for those aged 70 years and over .

MARGINAL ATTACHMENT

Of the 840,300 people with marginal attachment to the labour force in September 2005, 771,100 or 92% were not actively looking for work but were available to start work within four weeks. The remainder were actively looking for work but were not available to start work in the reference week.

Some 17% of women and 13% of men not in the labour force were marginally attached to the labour force. Seventy two per cent of women with marginal attachment to the labour force would have preferred part-time work, while 16% preferred full-time work. For men, 49% preferred part-time work and 34% preferred full-time work. The remainder had no preference, or were undecided.

Approximately 59% of people with marginal attachment to the labour force 'intended to enter' the labour force within 12 months, 18% 'might enter' the labour force within 12 months, and 19% 'did not intend to enter' the labour force within 12 months

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS continued

MARGINAL ATTACHMENT continued	Of those with marginal attachment to the labour force, 80% previously had a job. Thirty two per cent of those who had a job stated that their last job was less than 12 months ago, and 21% reported their last job was between 1 and 3 years ago.
Main reason for not actively looking for work	The main reasons for not actively looking for work most commonly reported by men were 'attending an educational institution' (34%) and 'own ill health or physical disability' (20%). The most commonly reported main reasons for not actively looking for work for women were 'caring for children' (31%) and 'attending an educational institution' (18%).
Discouraged job seekers	At September 2005 there were 63,100 discouraged job seekers aged 15 years and over. There was a 23% decline in the number of discouraged job seekers aged 15–69, from 82,000 in September 2004 to 59,300 in September 2005. Women accounted for most of this decrease, with 53,600 women who were discouraged job seekers in September 2004 and 37,500 in September 2005.
	 The characteristics of discouraged job seekers aged 15 years and over in September 2005 included: 61% were women 29% of men and 21% of women had looked for work in the previous 12 weeks. 64% of men and 57% of women intended to enter the labour force in the next 12 months 85% had worked before.
	The main reasons reported by discouraged job seekers for not actively looking for work were 'considered too old by employers' (39%), 'no jobs in locality or line of work' (27%) and 'lacked necessary schooling, training, skills or experience' (14%). Fifty per cent of men gave the reason 'considered too old by employers' compared with 32% of women. For women, 29% gave the reason 'no jobs in locality or line of work' and 17% gave the reason 'lacked necessary schooling, training, skills or experience'.
PEOPLE WITHOUT MARGINAL ATTACHMENT	Of the 4,613,200 people aged 15 years and over who were without marginal attachment to the labour force in September 2005, the majority (88%) were people who did not want to work, while a further 5% were permanently unable to work. Of those people who did not want to work, 38% (31% of women, 50% of men) reported their main activity as 'retired or voluntarily inactive', 28% (41% of women, 7% of men) as 'home duties or caring for children', and 12% (9% of women, 16% of men) as 'attending an educational institution'.
	There were 325,000 people who wanted to work but were neither actively looking for work nor available to start work within four weeks. Of these, 69% were women, forty-four per cent reported their main activity as 'home duties or caring for children' and 28% as 'attending an educational institution'. Twenty-eight per cent reported that they had a job less than 12 months ago.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION	1 The statistics in this publication were compiled from data collected in the Persons Not in the Labour Force Survey that was conducted throughout Australia in September 2005 as a supplement to the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who were in scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.
	2 The publication <i>Labour Force, Australia</i> (cat. no. 6202.0) contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the monthly LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics, and information about telephone interviewing relevant to both the monthly LFS and supplementary surveys.
	3 From April 2001 the LFS has been conducted using a redesigned questionnaire containing additional questions and some minor definitional changes. These changes also affect the supplementary surveys. For further details, see <i>Information Paper</i> : <i>Implementing the Redesigned Labour Force Survey Questionnaire</i> (cat. no. 6295.0) and <i>Information Paper: Questionnaires Used in the Labour Force Survey</i> (cat. no. 6232.0).
	4 Information for this survey was collected using computer-assisted interviewing (CAI), whereby responses are recorded directly onto an electronic questionnaire via a notebook computer. The CAI method was implemented in the LFS progressively between October 2003 and August 2004.
	5 The change of interviewing method is not expected to have affected the estimates in any meaningful way.
CONCEPTS SOURCES AND METHODS	6 The conceptual framework used in Australia's LFS aligns closely with the standards and guidelines set out in Resolutions of the International Conference of Labour Statisticians. Descriptions of the underlying concepts and structure of Australia's labour force statistics, and the sources and methods used in compiling these estimates, are presented in <i>Labour Statistics: Concepts, Sources and Methods</i> (cat. no. 6102.0.55.001) which is available on the ABS web site <http: www.abs.gov.au=""> (Methods, Classifications, Concepts and Standards).</http:>
SCOPE	 7 The scope of the LFS is restricted to people aged 15 years and over and excludes the following people: members of the permanent defence forces certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations overseas residents in Australia members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants).
	8 Students at boarding schools, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for people with disabilities), and inmates of prisons are excluded from all supplementary surveys.
	9 This supplementary survey was conducted in both urban and rural areas in all states and territories, but excluded approximately 120,000 people living in very remote parts of Australia who would otherwise have been within the scope of the survey. The exclusion of these people will have only a minor impact on any aggregate estimates that are produced for individual states and territories, except the Northern Territory where such people account for around 23% of the population.
COVERAGE	10 The estimates in this publication relate to people covered by the survey in September 2005. In the LFS, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey. See <i>Labour Force, Australia</i> (cat. no. 6202.0) for more details.

EXPLANATORY NOTES *continued*

SAMPLE SIZE	 11 Supplementary surveys are not always conducted on the full LFS sample. Since August 1994 the sample for supplementary surveys has been restricted to no more than seven-eighths of the LFS sample. Since it was introduced, this survey has been conducted on various proportional samples and therefore sampling errors associated with previous supplementary surveys may vary from the sampling error for this survey. 12 The initial sample for the September 2005 LFS consisted of 41,671 private dwelling households and special dwelling units. Of the 33,632 private dwelling households and special dwelling units that remained in the survey after sample loss (e.g. households selected in the survey which had no residents in scope for the LFS, vacant or derelict dwellings and dwellings under construction), approximately 30,790 or 91.5% were fully responding to the Persons Not in the Labour Force survey. The number of completed interviews obtained from these private dwelling households and special dwelling units (after taking into account scope, coverage and subsampling exclusions) was 17,512.
RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES	 13 Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors: sampling error is the difference between the published estimate and the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. For more information see the Technical Note. Non-sampling errors are inaccuracies that occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers, and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers, and efficient processing procedures.
SEASONAL FACTORS	14 The estimates are based on information collected in the survey month, and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.
CLASSIFICATIONS USED	15 Occupation data are classified according to the <i>ASCO — Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition, 1997</i> (cat. no. 1220.0).
	16 Country of birth data are classified according to the <i>Standard Australian Classification of Countries (SACC), 1998</i> (cat. no. 1269.0).
REVISION TO HISTORICAL DATA	17 Historical estimates of the civilian population for reference periods 1996 to 1999 were revised in the 2000 publication to exclude institutionalised people, and sparsely settled and remote parts of Australia.
COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES	18 Revisions are made to population benchmarks for the LFS after each five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The last such revision was made in February 2004 to take account of the results of the 2001 Census of Population and Housing. Estimates from supplementary surveys conducted from and including February 2004 are therefore based on revised population benchmarks.
	19 Persons Not in the Labour Force Surveys conducted up to and including September 1987 included all people aged 15 years and over. From September 1988 to September 2004, the survey excluded all people aged 70 years and over.
	20 The scope of the Persons Not in the Labour Force survey was expanded in September 2005 to include all people aged 15 years and over. This change has resulted in an extra 1.6 million people coming within the scope of this survey. Users need to exercise care when comparing the estimates in this publication with previous publications. Direct comparisons should only be made where the populations are the same.

COMPARABILITY OF TIME **21** Comparability of 2001 to 2005 estimates with previous years, for people who SERIES continued wanted to work, including 'discouraged job seekers', may have been affected by the following: As part of the LFS redesigned questionnaire, implemented in April 2001, people aged 65 and over were allowed to specify that they are 'permanently not intending to work'. Those people who answered that they were 'permanently not intending to work' have not been asked for details about 'wanting to work' and 'looking for work'. It is likely that, if they had answered these questions, some of these people may have been classified as people who 'wanted work', and also as 'discouraged job seekers'. A further change in the redesigned LFS questionnaire is that it more accurately identifies 'future starters'; that is, people waiting to start, within four weeks of the end of the reference week, a new job that they have already obtained (and could have started in the reference week if the job had been available then). Under International Labour Organisation (ILO) guidelines these people do not have to be actively looking for work to be classified as unemployed, and therefore are not asked questions related to job search activities. If they had been asked why they were not looking for work, it is possible that some may have given reasons other than 'had a job to go to', and as a result could have been classified as 'wanted to work', and also as 'discouraged job seekers'. People who are 'permanently unable to work' have been classified as a separate group within Persons Not in the Labour Force Surveys for many years. In the 2005 survey, there were 250,700 people in this group. COMPARABILITY WITH **22** Due to differences in the scope and sample size of this supplementary survey and MONTHLY LFS STATISTICS that of the LFS, the estimation procedure may lead to some small variations between labour force estimates from this survey and those from the LFS. 23 For the years 1988 to 2004, the difference between the estimates appearing in this publication and Labour Force, Australia (cat. no. 6202.0) is chiefly the result of excluding people aged 70 years and over from the sample of this supplementary survey. In these years, over one-quarter (29%) of the civilian population aged 15 years and over who were not in the labour force were excluded from answering questions because they were aged 70 years and over. **24** Core LFS series from April 1986 to March 2001 have been revised on the basis of the redesigned LFS questionnaire. Supplementary survey data have not been revised. 25 Further information on persons not in the labour force is available in Labour Force, Australia (cat. no. 6202.0). PREVIOUS SURVEYS **26** The Persons Not in the Labour Force Survey was first conducted in May 1975 and again in May 1977. From 1979 to 1987 the survey was collected twice a year (March and September). Since then it has been conducted annually. NEXT SURVEY **27** The ABS will conduct this survey again in September 2006. TECHNICAL NOTE DATA QUALITY

INTRODUCTION	1 Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three (67%) that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 (95%) that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.					
	2 Due to space limitations, it is impractical to print the SE of each estimate in the publication. Instead, a table of SEs is provided to enable readers to determine the SE for an estimate from the size of that estimate (see table T1). The SE table is derived from a mathematical model, referred to as the 'SE model', which is created using data from a number of past Labour Force Surveys. It should be noted that the SE model only gives an approximate value for the SE for any particular estimate, since there is some minor variation between SEs for different estimates of the same size.					
CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERRORS	3 An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of people is as follows. Table 4 shows that the estimated number of people in Australia who were discouraged job seekers was 63,100. 	5 In general, the size of the SE increases as the size of the estimate increases. Conversely, the RSE decreases as the size of the estimate increases. Very small estimates					

are thus subject to such high RSEs that their value for most practical purposes is unreliable. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs of 25% or less are considered reliable for most purposes. Estimates with RSEs greater than 25% but less than or equal to 50% are preceded by an asterisk (e.g.*3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution. Estimates with RSEs of greater than 50%, preceded by a double asterisk (e.g.**0.3), are considered too unreliable for general use

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CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERRORS continued

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES and should only be used to aggregate with other estimates to provide derived estimates with RSEs of 25% or less.

6 Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below. This formula is only valid when x is a subset of y.

 $RSE\left(\frac{x}{y}\right) = \sqrt{\left[RSE(x)\right]^2 - \left[RSE(y)\right]^2}$

7 Considering the example above, of the 63,100 people who were discouraged job seekers, 25,000 or 39.6% were males. The SE of 25,000 may be calculated by interpolation as 2,800. To convert this to an RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, or 2,800/25,000 = 11.2%. The SE for 63,000 was calculated previously as 4,000, which converted to an RSE is 4,000/63,100 = 6.3%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is

 $RSE = \sqrt{(11.2)^2 - (6.3)^2} = 9.3\%$

8 Therefore, the SE for the proportion of males who were discouraged job seekers is 3.7 percentage points (=(39.6/100)x9.3). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of males who were discouraged job seekers is between 35.9% and 43.3% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 32.2% to 47.0%.

DIFFERENCES

9 Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula: $SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$

10 While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

11 SEs contained in table T1 are applicable to all estimates from this survey.

Actively looking for work	 People who were taking active steps to find work. Active steps comprise: registering with a Job Network employment agency contacting an employment agency contacting prospective employers answering a newspaper advertisement for a job checking Centrelink touch screens checking factory noticeboards advertising or tendering for work contacting friends or relatives.
Available to start work within four weeks	People who were available to start work within four weeks or, for people with children aged 12 years and under, could start work within four weeks if suitable child care was available.
Did not want to work	 People who were not classified as employed or unemployed who: answered 'no' when asked if they would like a job; or were aged 65 years and over and said that they were 'permanently not intending to work'.
Discouraged job seekers	 People with marginal attachment to the labour force who wanted to work and were available to start work within the next four weeks but whose main reason for not actively looking for work was that they believed they would not find a job for any of the following reasons: considered to be too young by employers/too old by employers considered to be too old by employers lacked necessary schooling, training, skills or experience difficulties because of language or ethnic background no jobs in their locality or line of work no jobs available at all.
Employed	 People who, during the reference week: worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind in a job or business, or on a farm (comprising employees, employers and own account workers); or worked for one hour or more without pay in a family business or on a farm (i.e. contributing family workers); or were employees who had a job but were not at work and were: away from work for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week; or away from work for more than four weeks up to the end of the reference week and received pay for some or all of the four week period to the end of the reference week; or away from work as a standard work or shift arrangement; or on strike or locked out; or on workers' compensation and expected to return to their job; or were employers or own account workers who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.

Job leavers	People who voluntarily ceased their last job.
Job losers	People who involuntarily ceased their last job.
Labour Force	The civilian population can be split into two mutually exclusive groups: the labour force (employed and unemployed people) and persons not in the labour force.
Main English-speaking countries	Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, the United States of America and New Zealand.
Marginal attachment to the labour force	 People who were not in the labour force in the reference week, wanted to work and: were actively looking for work but did not meet the availability criteria to be classified as unemployed; or were not actively looking for work but were available to start work within four weeks¹.
	The criteria for determining those in the labour force are based on activity (i.e. working or looking for work) and availability to start work during the reference week. The criteria associated with marginal attachment to the labour force, in particular the concepts of wanting to work and reasons for not actively looking for work, are more subjective. Hence, the measurement against these criteria is affected by the respondent's own interpretation of the concepts used. An individual respondent's interpretation may be affected by their work aspirations, as well as family, economic and other commitments.
