ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION	This publication presents information about the job search experience of unemployed persons, in terms of the steps they have taken to find work and the difficulties they have encountered in finding work. Demographic information is provided about these persons along with certain information about their previous employment.
CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE	During the reference period of this survey, the 12 months to July 1998, the Commonwealth government made significant changes to the manner in which it provided employment services to the community. Estimates relating to active steps taken to find work may not be directly comparable with those from previous surveys and should be used with caution. Further information about the changes to employment service arrangements and the effect on data presented in this publication can be found in the Summary of Findings.
JOB SEARCH EXPERIENCE OF UNEMPLOYED PERSONS SURVEY	The statistics in this publication are compiled from data collected in the Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons Survey that was conducted throughout Australia in July 1998 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS).
	Data from the survey relate to persons who were unemployed in July 1998, except for those unemployed persons who were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been stood down. All tables in this publication, with the exception of table 1, exclude this group of unemployed persons.

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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

UNEMPLOYED PERSONS In July 1998, there were 696,400 unemployed persons, with the majority (82%) searching for full-time work. The number of unemployed persons decreased three per cent from 717,500 in July 1997. This decline followed steady increases in the previous two years. Most males (90%) were seeking full-time work, as where the majority of females (69%). This publication presents information on the job search experience of these people, in terms of the steps they took to find work and the barriers they encountered in obtaining work.

CHANGES IN THEDuring the reference period of this survey, the 12 months to July 1998,PROVISION OF LABOURthe Government made significant changes to the manner in which itMARKET SERVICESprovided employment services to the community. As a result, the nature
of job search activity undertaken by jobseekers changed.

Prior to the change in employment service arrangements, the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES) provided jobseekers with access to labour market assistance and offices of the then Department of Social Security (DSS) provided jobseekers with access to income support.

Centrelink offices started opening from September 1997. Centrelink is a government shopfront that provides the first point of contact for people requiring a range of government assistance, including income support and job search assistance. Centrelink progressively replaced CES and DSS shopfronts.

A competitive employment services market, the Job Network, was launched on 1 May 1998. The Job Network consists of private, community and government organisations on contract to the government to provide employment services to the community. As from that date, jobseekers register with Centrelink for job search assistance and can choose to go to any of the Job Network employment agencies. The agency then attempts to match jobseekers with jobs that are registered with them by employers.

During the transition to the new employment services market, Centrelink performed a similar role to the CES. Jobseekers registered at either a CES or Centrelink office, depending on which was operating in their area, for income support and/or job search assistance.

In this publication, registration with either the CES or Centrelink for job search assistance have been combined. As CES operations were replaced by Centrelink and the Job Network during the reference period of the survey, estimates relating to active steps taken to find work may not be directly comparable with those from previous surveys and should be used with caution. JOB SEARCH EXPERIENCE In July 1998, 70% of unemployed persons were registered with Centrelink/CES and also contacted prospective employers. A further 26% contacted prospective employers but were not registered with Centrelink/CES.

Of those looking for full-time work, the majority (80%) were registered with Centrelink/CES and had contacted prospective employers. In contrast, the most common active step taken by those looking for part-time work was contacting prospective employers without registering with Centrelink/CES (64%).


The main difficulties in finding work most commonly reported were:

- considered too young or too old by employers (16%);
- too many applicants for available jobs (14%);
- lacked necessary skills/education (11%); and
- no vacancies at all (11%).

EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT In July 1998, 443,400 unemployed persons (64%) did not have post-school qualifications. The proportion of unemployed persons without post-school qualifications remained unchanged from July 1997.

The main difficulty in finding work reported by unemployed persons was that they were considered too young or too old by employers. This barrier was most commonly reported irrespective of educational attainment, being reported by 16% of unemployed persons with post-school qualifications and 17% of those without.

For unemployed persons without post-school qualifications, lacking necessary skills/education (14%) was a greater problem than insufficient work experience (11%). In contrast, unemployed persons with post-school qualifications reported insufficient work experience (11%) as a greater problem than lacking necessary skills/education (9%).



AVERAGE DURATION OF UNEMPLOYMENT AND EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

Unemployed persons who had not completed the highest level of secondary school were generally unemployed for longer than those who had. Those who had completed the highest level of secondary school had an average duration of unemployment of 46 weeks compared with 71 weeks for those who had not.

YOUNG UNEMPLOYED Over a third (36%) of unemployed persons were aged 15–24 years. The number of young unemployed persons decreased from 268,800 (or 37% of jobseekers) in July 1997 to 253,100 in July 1998. Three-quarters (74%) of young unemployed persons wanted full-time work. More males (80%) wanted full-time work than females (65%).


The main difficulties in gaining employment that young unemployed persons reported were insufficient work experience (16%) and too many applicants for available jobs (15%). The perception that there were no vacancies at all (14%) and lack of necessary skills/education sought by the employer (13%) were also common problems.

Young unemployed persons were more likely to have ceased their last job voluntarily then older unemployed persons. Of the 105,000 young unemployed persons who had previously held a full-time job, 40% were job leavers, whereas only 28% of those aged 25 years or more were job leavers. Half (50%) of the 42,500 young unemployed persons who had left their last job voluntarily reported they left because of unsatisfactory working arrangements.

FEMALE UNEMPLOYED In July 1998, 43% of labour force participants were female. The number of female unemployed persons was 277,600 (40% of unemployed) and approximately two-thirds (69%) were looking for full-time work.

Unsuitable hours and difficulties with child care or other family responsibilities were not major problems for female unemployed persons. Only 9% of female unemployed persons reported one of these as the main difficulty in finding work. The perception they were considered too young or too old by employers (16%) or there were too many applicants for available jobs (14%) were the most commonly reported difficulties.





Females were generally unemployed for shorter periods than males. They had an average duration of unemployment of 54 weeks compared with 64 weeks for males.

THE LONG-TERMIn July 1998, 242,600 of unemployed persons (or 35%) wereUNEMPLOYEDunemployed for twelve months or longer and as such, were consideredlong-term unemployed. The majority (89%) were seeking full-time work.Most (90%) long-term unemployed persons reported they had notreceived any offers of employment in the previous 12 months.

The most common main difficulty in finding work reported by long-term unemployed persons was they were considered too young or too old by employers (26%). Lack of the necessary skills or education sought by employers (14%) and the perception there were too many applicants for available jobs (12%) were other commonly reported difficulties.

Of the long-term unemployed, 166,600 persons (or 69%) were without post-school qualifications. Of these, 78% had not completed the highest level of secondary school.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION	1 The statistics in this publication are compiled from data collected in the Job Search Experience of Unemployed Persons Survey that was conducted throughout Australia in July 1998 as a supplement to the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who were in scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.
	2 The publication <i>Labour Force, Australia</i> (Cat. no. 6203.0) contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics, and information about telephone interviewing relevant to both the LFS and supplementary surveys.
SCOPE	3 In addition to persons excluded from the LFS, there were approximately 80,000 persons living in remote and sparsely settled parts of Australia who were out of scope of this survey. The exclusion of these persons has only a minor impact on any aggregate estimates produced for individual States and Territories, except the Northern Territory. Further details can be obtained by contacting the person listed on the front cover of this publication.
	4 Students at boarding schools, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for persons with handicaps), and inmates of prisons are excluded from all supplementary surveys.
	5 The number of unemployed persons in this publication differs from that published in <i>Labour Force, Australia, July 1998</i> (Cat. no. 6203.0) because persons who were stood down were excluded from this survey, as it was inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience.
COVERAGE	6 The estimates in this publication relate to persons covered by the survey in July 1998. In the LFS, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey.
RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES	7 Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors:
	 Sampling error is the difference between the published estimate and the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. For more information see the Technical Notes
	 Non-sampling errors are inaccuracies that occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers, and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient processing procedures.

SEASONAL FACTORS **8** The estimates are based on information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.

NOTES ON ESTIMATES **9** During the reference period of this survey, the 12 months to July 1998, the Government made significant changes to the manner in which it provided employment services to the community. As a result, the nature of job search activity undertaken by jobseekers changed.

10 Prior to the change in employment service arrangements, the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES) provided jobseekers with access to labour market assistance and offices of the then Department of Social Security (DSS) provided jobseekers with access to income support.

11 Centrelink offices started opening from September 1997. Centrelink is a government shopfront that provides the first point of contact for people requiring a range of government assistance, including income support and job search assistance. Centrelink progressively replaced CES and DSS shopfronts. A competitive employment services market, the Job Network, was launched on 1 May 1998. The Job Network consists of private, community and government organisations on contract to the government to provide employment services to the community. As from that date, jobseekers register with Centrelink for job search assistance and can choose to go to any of the Job Network employment agencies. The agency then attempts to match jobseekers with jobs that are registered with them by employers.

12 During the transition to the new employment services market, Centrelink performed a similar role to the CES. Jobseekers registered at either a CES or Centrelink office, depending on which was operating in their area, for income support and/or job search assistance.

13 In this publication, registration with either the CES or Centrelink for job search assistance have been combined. As CES operations were replaced by Centrelink and the Job Network during the reference period of the survey, estimates relating to active steps taken to find work may not be directly comparable with those from previous surveys and should be used with caution.

PREVIOUS SURVEYS14 Results of similar surveys on job search experience conducted in
July 1984, July 1985, June 1986, July 1988, July 1990, June 1991, and
annually from July 1992 were published in previous issues of Job Search
Experience of Unemployed Persons, Australia (Cat. no. 6222.0).


TECHNICAL NOTES

INTRODUCTION

1 Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 that the difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.

2 SEs for general application are given in table T1. Since they are based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics, these numbers will not give a precise measure of the SE of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.

3 An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 3 shows the estimated number of unemployed persons in Australia who were looking for full-time work was 570,300. Since this estimate is between 500,000 and 1,000,000, table T1 shows that the SE for Australia will lie between 9,900 and 13,000 and can be approximated by interpolation as 10,300 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 560,000 to 580,600 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 549,700 to 590,900. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.

4 As can be seen from the SE table, the smaller the estimate, the higher is the RSE. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high SEs (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs less than 25% are considered sufficiently reliable for most purposes. However, estimates with larger RSEs have been included and are preceded by an asterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution.

CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR

AVERAGES AND MEDIANS **5** The RSEs of estimates of average duration of unemployment and median duration of unemployment are obtained by first finding the RSE of the estimate of the total number of persons contributing to the average or median (see table T1) and then multiplying the relevant number so obtained by the following relevant factors:

average duration of unemployment: 1.3 median duration of unemployment: 2.0

The following is an example of the calculation of SEs where the use 6 of a factor is required. Table 3 shows that the estimated median duration of unemployment for unemployed males in Australia was 28 weeks and the number of males was estimated as 418,800. From table T1 it can be calculated that the estimate (418,800) has a SE of about 9,100 and therefore a RSE of about 2.2%. The RSE of the estimate of median duration of unemployment is calculated by multiplying this number (2.2%) by the appropriate factor shown in the previous paragraph (in this case 2.0): $2.2 \times 2.0 = 4.4\%$. The SE of this estimate of median duration of unemployment is therefore 4.4% of 28, i.e. about 1 week. Therefore, there are two chances in three that the median duration of unemployment for males that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 27-29 weeks, and about 19 chances in 20 that it would have been within the range 26-30 weeks.

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES

7 Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below:

RSE $(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE (x)]^2 - [RSE (y)]^2}$

8 Considering the example from the previous page, of the 570,300 unemployed persons who were looking for full-time work 216,200, or 37.9%, had been unemployed for 1 year or more. The SE of 216,200 is approximately 7,000 so the RSE is 3.2%. The RSE for 570,300 is 1.8%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is $\sqrt{(3.2)^2 - (1.8)^2}$ or 2.6%, giving a SE for the proportion (37.9%) of 1.0 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of unemployed persons is between 36.9% and 38.9% and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 35.9% to 39.9%.

DIFFERENCES

9 Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x–y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE $(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE (x)]^2 + [SE (y)]^2}$

10 While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

11 SEs contained in table T1 are applicable to all estimates from this survey. The levels at which averages have a RSE of 25% are shown in table T2.

Courses are designed to provide students with a systematic and coherent introduction to a broad body of knowledge. The emphasis is on the underlying principles and concepts of that body of knowledge. Centrelink Centrelink, officially launched in September 1997, is a statutory authority responsible for delivering a range of Commonwealth Government services, including the registration of persons for job search assistance and income support. CES The Commonwealth Employment Service (CES) provided job placement service for jobseekers and managed labour market programs. It also provided the contact point for eligible jobseekers to register for income support. The CES ceased operation at the end of April 1998. **Duration of current** The period from the time the person began looking for work to the end period of unemployment of the reference week. Thus, this item measures the current (and continuing) period of unemployment rather than a completed spell. For

persons who may have begun looking for work while still employed, the duration of current period of unemployment is defined as the period from the time the person last worked full-time for two weeks or more to the end of the reference period.

This level of qualification is designed to recognise significant contributions to original research or the application of knowledge within a given field of study.

- Interstate Between States and Territories.
- **Intrastate** Within the State or Territory.
- Job leavers Persons who have ceased their last job voluntarily, because:
 - of unsatisfactory work arrangements/pay/hours; or
 - the job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they left that job to return to studies; or
 - they retired, started a new business, got a better job, left for family or other reasons; or
 - they changed locality but not employer/business for employment, personal or other reasons.

Job losers	Persons who ceased their last job involuntarily, because:
	 they were retrenched or their business closed down because of financial difficulties; or
	 their job was seasonal, temporary or a holiday job and they did not leave that job to return to studies; or

Job Network	Job Network is a national network of private, community and government organisations on contract to the government to provide employment placement services to the community. Jobseekers, who are registered with Centrelink for job search assistance are able to contact any Job Network provider in their area to receive this service.
Looking for part-time work	Actively looking for part-time work (less than 35 hours per week) only.
Main difficulty in finding work	The main difficulty experienced during the current period of unemployment.
Main English-speaking countries	Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, the United States of America and New Zealand.
Median duration (of current period of unemployment)	The duration which divides unemployed persons into two equal size groups, one comprising persons whose duration of unemployment is above the median, and the other, persons whose duration is below it.
Number of offers of employment	The number of separate offers of employment received during the current period of unemployment.
Occupation	All occurrences of occupation in this publication relate to Major Group as defined by ASCO — Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition (Cat. no. 1220.0).
Persons with post-school qualifications	Persons who have obtained a vocational qualification, certificate, diploma, degree or any other qualification, since leaving school. Respondents indicated which of the following groups best described their highest qualification: Higher degree; Postgraduate diploma; Bachelor degree; Undergraduate or associate diploma; Skilled vocational or basic vocational qualification.
Persons who were stood down	Persons classed as unemployed who had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks, for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.
Postgraduate diploma	Includes Graduate Certificates. The entry requirement is usually the successful completion of a Bachelor degree or an Undergraduate diploma. associate diplomaThe entry requirement is usually the successful completion of Year 12 or
its equivalent, for an undergraduate diploma, or the completion of

Year 12 or Year 10 and a pre-requisite certificate course for an associate diploma. Certain other qualifications are classified to this level on the basis that their entry requirements, duration of study and theoretical orientation are regarded as being equivalent to those of undergraduate or associate diplomas.

Unemployed persons Those persons who were not employed during the reference week (i.e. the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the reference week, and:

- were available for work in the reference week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks up to the end of the reference week); or
- were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the reference week and would have started in the reference week if the job had been available then.

In this publication, unemployed persons excludes those people who were stood down without pay for less than four weeks, as it was inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience.

Usual gross weekly pay The amount of usual weekly pay before taxation and other deductions have been made.
