NOTES

ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION	This publication presents information about the weekly earnings and employment benefits received by employees, and their trade union membership.
	Statistics in this publication were obtained from the Employee Earnings, Benefits and Trade Union Membership Survey, conducted throughout Australia in August 2000 as a supplement to the Australian Bureau of Statistics monthly Labour Force Survey.
	Data from the survey relate to employed persons aged 15 years and over who worked in their main job for an employer for wages or salary or in their own incorporated enterprise.
	The survey collected details about the distribution of employee weekly earnings, which is cross-classified by a range of personal characteristics such as age, sex and family type, and by characteristics of employment such as full-time and part-time status, industry, occupation, and leave entitlements.
	Other information includes details of standard benefits provided by employers, including superannuation coverage and paid leave. The survey also contains detailed information about trade union membership, including the personal characteristics of employees with and without trade union membership, and trade union coverage by industry.
CHANGES TO TERMINOLOGY	In the August 2000 survey, the terms 'Permanent' and 'Casual' were replaced to more accurately reflect what is collected in the survey. The term 'Permanent' has been replaced with 'With leave entitlements', and 'Casual' has been replaced with the term 'Without leave entitlements'. A definition of 'Leave entitlements' is included in the Glossary.


SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

MEAN WEEKLY EARNINGS OF EMPLOYEES IN ALL JOBS In August 2000, there were 7,695,600 employees aged 15 years and over. These employees earned an average of \$659 per week in all jobs, with 50% of employees earning under \$591 per week. Mean earnings in main job were \$651.

Mean weekly earnings of employees has steadily increased from \$444 in all jobs in August 1990 to \$659 in August 2000¹. Between August 1999 and 2000, mean weekly earnings increased for males by 6% to \$784 and for females by 5% to \$516. In August 2000, there were relatively more females in lower earnings ranges and more males in higher earnings ranges. Some 16% of females and 7% of males earned less than \$200 per week in August 2000, whereas 2% of females and 8% of males earned \$1,400 or more per week.

Nearly three-quarters (73%) of employees were full-time workers, a similar proportion to 1999. Mean weekly earnings in all jobs increased by 6% to \$800 for full-time workers and by 6% to \$282 for part-time workers between August 1999 and August 2000. This translated to a \$45 increase for full-time workers and a \$15 increase for part-time workers.

LEAVE ENTITLEMENTS OF EMPLOYEES IN MAIN JOB

Some 27% of employees were not entitled to either paid holiday leave or paid sick leave in their main job in August 2000. This is similar to the proportion recorded in 1996–1999 and slightly higher than the level recorded in 1995 (24%).

Other findings on employment without such leave entitlements in August 2000 include:

- a higher proportion of part-time employees were without leave entitlements (65%) than full-time employees (12%);
- a higher proportion of females than males were employees without leave entitlements (32% and 23% respectively); and
- employees without leave entitlements had lower mean weekly earnings in their main job than employees with leave entitlements in both full-time work (\$726 compared to \$810) and part-time work (\$247 compared to \$394).

1 It should be noted that these comparisons could be affected by compositional changes in the wage and salary segments of the labour market, such as changes in the mix of occupations and industries of jobs and in the average number of hours paid for, for both full-time and part-time workers.



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EMPLOYEE BENEFITSIn August 2000, the most commonly reported employee benefits were superannuation
(89% of employees), sick leave (71%), holiday leave (71%) and long service leave (62%).
Superannuation coverage has increased from 64% of employees in August 1990 to its
current level. In contrast, the proportion of employees entitled to holiday leave or sick
leave has declined since August 1990, when the figure was 79% for both types of leave.

TRADE UNIONIn August 2000, 25% of Australia's 7,695,600 employees aged 15 years and over wereMEMBERSHIPtrade union members in their main job. This continues the steady decline in trade union
membership from 46% in 1986.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

INTRODUCTION	1 The statistics in this publication were compiled from data collected in the Employee Earnings, Benefits and Trade Union Membership Survey conducted throughout Australia in August 2000 as a supplement to the monthly Labour Force Survey (LFS). Respondents to the LFS who were in scope of the supplementary survey were asked further questions.
	2 The publication <i>Labour Force, Australia</i> (Cat. no. 6203.0) contains information about survey design, sample redesign, scope, coverage and population benchmarks relevant to the monthly LFS, which also apply to supplementary surveys. It also contains definitions of demographic and labour force characteristics, and information about telephone interviewing which are relevant to both the monthly LFS and supplementary surveys.
SCOPE	3 In addition to those already excluded from the monthly LFS, there were approximately 80,000 persons living in remote and sparsely settled parts of Australia who were out of scope of this survey. The exclusion of these persons has only a minor impact on any aggregate estimates produced for individual States and Territories, except for the Northern Territory. Please contact the person listed on the front cover of this publication if you require more information.
	4 Students at boarding schools, patients in hospitals, residents of homes (e.g. retirement homes, homes for persons with handicaps), and inmates of prisons are further excluded from all supplementary surveys. Also excluded from this survey are employees who worked solely for payment in kind in their main job, and persons who reported at interview that they worked in their own unincorporated enterprise, but were later classified as employees as a result of an office check.
COVERAGE	5 The estimates in this publication relate to persons within scope of the survey in August 2000. In the LFS, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection in the survey. See <i>Labour Force Australia</i> (Cat. no. 6203.0).
RELIABILITY OF THE ESTIMATES	 6 Estimates in this publication are subject to sampling and non-sampling errors. a Sampling error is the difference between the published estimate and the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. For further information on sampling error, refer to the Technical Note. b Non-sampling errors are inaccuracies that occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers, and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error through careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient processing procedures.
SEASONAL FACTORS	7 The estimates are based on information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.
CHANGES IN CLASSIFICATION	8 From August 1996, occupation data are classified according to the second edition of the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO). For more detailed information, see <i>ASCO—Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition</i> (Cat. no. 1220.0) and <i>Information Paper—Census of Population and Housing: Link Between First and Second Editions of Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO)</i> (Cat. no. 1232.0).

CHANGES IN CLASSIFICATION continued	9 From August 1994, industry data are classified according to the Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), a detailed description of which appears in <i>Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), 1993</i> (Cat. no. 1292.0). Like the previous Australian Standard Industrial Classification, ANZSIC classifies businesses according to their economic activities, in a structure consisting of four levels (Division, Subdivision, Group and Class). Supplementary survey data are coded at the Group level, as was the practice under the previous Australian Standard Industrial Classification.
NOTES ON ESTIMATES	10 In August 2000 there were 41,100 persons for whom sector of main job could not be determined. These persons were included in the private sector for the purpose of this publication.
	11 In August 2000, persons refusing to answer questions about their weekly earnings and persons working in their own limited liability company who did not draw a wage or salary represented 660,600 in the population. These persons have been classified to the 'Could not be determined' category in this publication.
	12 Care should be taken when using estimates of mean weekly earnings. Employees refusing to answer questions about their earnings are excluded from estimates of mean weekly earnings. Where these employees have demographic and employment characteristics which differ on average from the rest of the employee population, it is likely that the exclusion of these persons has resulted in a slight downward bias on mean weekly estimates.
CHANGES TO TERMINOLOGY	13 In the August 2000 survey, the terms 'Permanent' and 'Casual' were replaced, to more accurately reflect what is collected in the survey. The term 'Permanent' has been replaced with 'With leave entitlements', and 'Casual' has been replaced with the term 'Without leave entitlements'. Definitions of 'With leave entitlements' and 'Without leave entitlements' are included in the Glossary.
COMPARABILITY OF TIME SERIES	14 Revisions are made to population benchmarks for the LFS after each five-yearly Census of Population and Housing. The last such revision was made in February 1999 to take account of the results of the 1996 Census of Population and Housing. Estimates from supplementary surveys conducted from and including February 1999 are therefore based on revised population benchmarks.
	15 Supplementary surveys are not always conducted on the full LFS sample. Apart from scope exclusions, such as those listed in paragraphs 3 and 4, since August 1994, the sample available for supplementary surveys has been restricted to no more than seven-eighths of the LFS sample. Since it was introduced, this survey has been conducted on various proportional samples. Therefore, sampling errors associated with previous surveys may vary from the sampling errors for this survey.
	16 In August 1990, persons aged 70 years and over were excluded from this survey, restricting the age of respondents to 15–69 years. The scope of surveys since 1991 and surveys run prior to August 1990, included all persons aged 70 and over.
	17 Care should be taken when comparing the movements in mean weekly earnings and employment benefits estimates that include the July 1991 and August 1997 surveys. The usual period between surveys is 12 months, however in 1991 the elapsed time was 11 months (August 1990 to July 1991) and in 1992 it was 13 months (July 1991 to August 1992). In 1997, the elapsed time was 2 years (August 1995 to August 1997).

COMPARABILITY WITH LABOUR FORCE SURVEY STATISTICS

18 Due to differences in the scope and sample size of this supplementary survey and that of the monthly LFS, the estimation procedure may lead to variations between labour force estimates from this survey and those from the LFS.

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COMPARABILITY WITH 19 Caution should be exercised when comparing estimates of mean weekly AVERAGE WEEKLY EARNINGS earnings in this publication with estimates of average weekly earnings included in the quarterly publication Average Weekly Earnings, Australia (Cat. no. 6302.0), which are compiled from a survey of employers. There are important differences in the scope and methodology of the two surveys. 20 The quarterly Survey of Average Weekly Earnings excludes employees in the industries of Agriculture, forestry and fishing (Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC) Division A) and Private households employing staff (ANZSIC Subdivision 97), both of which are included in this household survey. Data from the quarterly Survey of Average Weekly Earnings are collected from employers who complete a mailed questionnaire with details of their employees' weekly earnings. For this household survey, respondents are either interviewed personally at their dwelling, or another adult member of their household responds on their behalf. **21** The methodology used in this household survey may result in non-sampling error not evident in surveys of employers (and vice versa). This may account for some of the differences between the results of the two surveys. TECHNICAL NOTE DATA QUALITY

INTRODUCTION

1 Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability. That is, they may differ from those estimates that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE), which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three (67%) that a sample estimate will differ by less than one SE from the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about 19 chances in 20 (95%) that the difference will be less than two SEs. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error (RSE), which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate.

2 Due to space limitations, it is impractical to print the SE of each estimate in the publication. Instead, a table of SEs is provided to enable readers to determine the SE for an estimate from the size of that estimate (see Table T1). The SE table is derived from a mathematical model, referred to as the "SE model", which is created using data from a number of past Labour Force Surveys. It should be noted that the SE model only gives an approximate value for the SE for any particular estimate, since there is some minor variation between SEs for different estimates of the same size.


CALCULATION OF STANDARD**3** An example of the calculation and the use of SEs in relation to estimates of
persons is as follows. Table 5 shows the estimated number of female part-time
employees in main job was 1,627,000. Since this estimate is between 1,000,000
and 2,000,000, Table T1 shows that the SE for Australia will lie between 11,550
and 15,250 and can be approximated by interpolation using the following general
formula:

SE of estimate

$$= 11,550 + \left(\left(\frac{1,627,000 - 1,000,000}{2,000,000 - 1,000,000} \right) \times (15,250 - 11,550) \right)$$

= 13,900 (rounded to the nearest 100)

4 Therefore, there are about 2 chances in 3 that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 1,613,100 to 1,640,900 and about 19 chances in 20 that the value will fall within the range 1,599,200 to 1,654,800. This example is illustrated in the diagram below.

CALCULATION OF STANDARD ERROR continued

5 In general, the size of the SE increases as the size of the estimate increases. Conversely, the RSE decreases as the size of the estimate increases. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high RSEs so that their value for most practical purposes is unreliable. In the tables in this publication, only estimates with RSEs of 25% or less are considered reliable for most purposes. Estimates with RSEs greater than 25% but less than or equal to 50% are preceded by an aterisk (e.g. *3.4) to indicate they are subject to high SEs and should be used with caution. Estimates with RSEs of greater than 50%, preceded by a double asterisk (e.g. **0.3), are considered too unreliable for general use and should only be used to aggregate with other estimates to provide derived estimates with RSEs of less than 25%.

MEANS AND MEDIANS 6 The RSEs of estimates of mean and median weekly earnings are obtained by first finding the RSE of the estimate of the total number of persons contributing to the estimate (see Table T1) and then multiplying the resulting number by the following factors:

- mean weekly earnings: 0.9
- median weekly earnings: 1.0

7 The following is an example of the calculation of SEs where the use of a factor is required. Table 7 shows an estimate of 1,627,000 female part-time employees with mean weekly earnings of \$298. The SE of 1,627,000 can be calculated from table T1 (by interpolation) as 13,900. To convert this to an RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, or 13,900/1,627,000 = 0.9%. The RSE of the estimate of mean weekly earnings is calculated by multiplying this number (0.9%) by the appropriate factor shown in the previous paragraph (in this case 0.9): $0.9 \times 0.9 = 0.8\%$. The SE of this estimate of mean weekly earnings of female part-time employees in main job is therefore 0.8% of \$298, i.e. about \$2.40. Therefore, there are two chances in three that the mean weekly earnings for female part-time employees that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range \$295.60 to \$300.40, and about 19 chances in 20 that it would have been within the range \$293.20 to \$302.80.

8 Estimates of means and medians produced from population estimates smaller than the values provided in Table T2 have RSEs larger than 25% and should be used with caution. Table T2 also indicates the size of population estimates that would produce means and medians with RSEs greater than 50%, which are considered too unreliable for general use.

9 An example of an estimate with a RSE between 25% and 50% is in Table 4. The mean weekly earnings in main job for males working part-time in the Mining industry is \$1,006, and the number of persons contributing to this estimate is 1,900. Table T2 shows the level at which estimates of mean weekly earnings have a RSE of 25% is 4,117. Therefore, this estimate of mean weekly earnings has a high RSE and is shown in Table 4 preceded with an asterisk (ie *\$1,006).

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES **10** Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. A formula to approximate the RSE of a proportion is given below. This formula is only valid when x is a subset of y.

 $RSE(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$

PROPORTIONS AND PERCENTAGES continued **11** Considering the example from paragraph 3 above, the 1,627,000 female part-time employees in main job represent 46% of the 3,539,100 female employees. The SE of 1,627,000 was calculated previously as 13,900. To convert this to a RSE we express the SE as a percentage of the estimate, or 13,900/1,627,000 = 0.9%. The SE for 3,539,100 may be calculated by interpolation as 19,400, which converted to a RSE is 19,400/3,539,100 = 0.5%. Applying the above formula, the RSE of the proportion is

 $RSE = \sqrt{(0.9)^2 - (0.5)^2} = 0.7\%$

12 Therefore, the SE for the proportion of female employees who worked part-time is 0.3 percentage points (=(46/100)×0.7). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of female part-time employees is between 45.7% and 46.3%, and 19 chances in 20 that the proportion is within the range 45.4% to 46.6%.

13 Published estimates may also be used to calculate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such an estimate is subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their SEs and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate SE of the difference between two estimates (x–y) may be calculated by the following formula:

$$SE(x-y) = \sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

14 While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations, it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

GLOSSARY

Employees	Employed persons aged 15 years and over who worked in their main job for an employer for wages or salary or in their own incorporated enterprise with or without hiring employees.
Full-time employees in main job	All employees for whom 'full-time' was the response to the question 'Is your main job full-time or part-time?'
Full-time workers	Employees who usually worked a total of 35 hours or more a week in all jobs and others who usually work less than 35 hours a week but worked 35 hours or more during the reference week.
Holiday leave	Provision by an employer of paid holiday, vacation or recreation leave in main job.
Hours paid for in main job	The number of hours for which employees were paid, not necessarily the number of hours actually worked during the reference week (e.g. an employee on paid leave for the week was asked to report the number of hours for which they were paid).
Hours worked	The number of hours actually worked during the reference week.
Industry	Classified using the <i>Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), 1993</i> (Cat. no. 1292.0). In this publication, industry relates to the main job and is shown at the ANZSIC Division level.
Leave entitlements	The entitlement of employees to either paid holiday leave or paid sick leave in their main job.
Long service leave	Provision by employers or industry body of paid long service leave to an employee.
Main English-speaking countries	Comprises the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, South Africa, the United States of America and New Zealand.
Main job	The job in which most hours were usually worked.
Mean weekly earnings	The amount obtained by dividing the total earnings of a group by the number of employees in that group.
Median weekly earnings	The amount which divides the distribution of employees into two equal groups, one having earnings above and the other below that amount.
Multiple jobholder	Employees who, during the reference week, worked in a second job or held a second job from which they were absent because of holidays, sickness or any other reason.
Occupation	Classified according to ASCO — Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, Second Edition (Cat. no. 1220.0). In this publication, occupation relates to the main job and is shown at the Major Group level.
Part-time employees in main job	All employees for whom 'part-time' was the response to the question 'Is your main job full-time or part-time?'
Part-time workers	Employees who usually worked a total of less than 35 hours a week in all jobs and who did so during the reference week.
Second job	A job, other than the main job, in which some hours were worked during the reference week.
Sector of main job	Is used to classify a respondent's employer as a public or private enterprise. Public sector includes local government authorities, government departments, agencies and authorities created by, or reporting to, the Commonwealth Parliament and State Parliaments.
Sick leave	Provision by employers of paid sick leave in the main job.

GLOSSARY continued

Size of location	The number of persons employed at the location of the respondent's main job.
Standard benefit	Provision by employer of holiday leave, sick leave, long service leave or superannuation benefit.
Superannuation benefit	Membership of a superannuation or retirement benefits scheme, arranged or provided by the person's current employer even if the employer did not contribute to the fund.
Superannuation coverage	Membership of a superannuation or retirement benefits scheme regardless of whether the scheme was arranged or provided by the person's current employer.
Trade union	An organisation consisting predominantly of employees, the principal activities of which include the negotiation of rates of pay and conditions of employment for its members.
Trade union member	Employees with membership in a trade union in conjunction with their main job.
Weekly earnings	Amount of 'last total pay' from wage and salary jobs prior to the interview (i.e. before taxation and other deductions had been made). For persons paid other than weekly, earnings were converted to a weekly equivalent. No adjustment was made for any back payment of wage increases or prepayment of leave, etc.
With leave entitlements in main job	Employees who were entitled to either paid holiday leave or paid sick leave in their main job.
Without leave entitlements in main job	Employees who were entitled to neither paid holiday leave nor paid sick leave in their main job.

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
