MAIN FEATURES

At 30 June 1987 there were 316 trade unions with a total membership of 3,240,100 persons (or 55 per cent of all employees). At 30 June 1986 there were 326 trade unions with a total membership of 3,186,200 (or 55 per cent of all employees).

Of the 316 unions, 206 had less than 3,000 members, 4.4 per cent of total membership.

There were nine unions, which each had a membership of 80,000 or more. These accounted for 34 per cent of the total union membership.

The decrease in the number of unions from 326 in 1986 to 316 in 1987 was due to eight unions being amalgamated with other unions, one union ceasing to operate and one union being deregistered.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

The figures in this publication have been compiled from questionnaires completed by individual trade unions

respect of their membership and State of operation as 30 June 1987. The collection was changed to an end of June basis in 1985 to correspond with other statistics which are on a financial year basis.

Scope and coverage

Current lists of reporting trade unions are maintained by reference to lists used in previous years and to trade unions registered under the provisions of the various Federal and State industrial arbitration Acts, trade union Acts, etc.; from names of unions reported to be engaged in conciliation and arbitration proceedings, etc.; and from reports in trade journals, trade union and employer periodicals, newspapers and other publications. It should be noted that not all reporting trade unions are registered under the relevant Federal or State industrial arbitration legislation or State trade union Acts (see paragraph 11 below).

For trade unions that are branches of larger trade 3. unions, only the larger organisation is counted to reduce the possibility of duplication in the figures of the number of unions and members. An interstate or federated trade union (i.e. a union with members in more than one State

or Territory) is treated as a separate union in each State or Territory in which it has members, but is counted only once in the Australian total (see Table 1). Unions with interstate associations which are not strictly branches of a common organisation are counted as separate unions in the totals for Australia.

The published number of reporting trade unions 4 varies from year to year as a result of amalgamations of unions, unions ceasing to operate, new unions being formed, existing organisations changing their status such that it brings them within the scope of the definition of a trade union (see paragraph 5), and existing unions reporting for the first time.

Definitions

For the purpose of these statistics a trade union is 5. defined as an organisation, consisting predominantly of employees, the principal activities of which include the negotiation of rates of pay and conditions of employment for its members. Non-operating unions or branches, i.e. those with no members at the date of collection, are not included in the statistics.

Membership of trade unions. Financial members are dues paying members who are no more than 6 months in arrears in payment of dues. The total number of members includes all persons (financial, unfinancial, honorary, etc.) regarded by unions as members.

Persons who are members of more than one union 7. cannot be separately identified and are therefore counted more than once in the totals. The extent of this duplication is not known. Members of unions who work overseas are excluded from the reported membership data. Membership figures may be affected by differences in the concept of membership adopted by different unions or by the same union at different times (See paragraph 9 below).

Proportion of total employees. The approximate 8. percentages of wage and salary earners in employment (i.e. employees) who were members of trade unions are shown in Table 3. From 30 June 1985, the proportions of employees have been calculated from estimates of employees from the Survey of Employment and Earnings published in *Employed Wage and Salary Earners, Australia* (6248.0). These estimates of employees have been adjusted by adding estimates of employees in private sector agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting and in private households employing staff, from the Labour Force Survey. Prior to 30 June 1985, estimates of employees from the Labour Force, Australia (6203.0),

Comparability of series

Comparability of figures for different years may be 9 affected by a number of factors. As stated in paragraph 7, there may be duplication in the count of members. This duplication may vary over time. Union rules on membership may follow different concepts and practices and this may be reflected in the level and fluctuations of the figures reported. Unions reported financial and total membership separately for the first time as at 30 June 1985, in previous years some unions confined their reported membership to 'financial' members whilst others included various other members. Individual unions may or may not include in their reported membership unemployed members, members who have retired from the labour force, disabled members, members with dues in arrears (who may be kept on union books for varying lengths of time), etc.

10. Membership of trade unions is shown separately for males and females for each State and Territory. The subdivision of total membership into males and females is not precise because some trade unions are unable to state the exact number of males and females among their members. The subdivision of total membership by States and Territories is also not precise because some unions in the Territories are affiliated with State organisations and their membership is reported under the heading of that State.

Organisations registered under industrial arbitration legislation

11. Details of employee organisations registered under the *Federal Conciliation and Arbitration Act 1904* as at 30 June 1987 (with comparable figures for 30 June 1986 shown in brackets) are: 144 (146) employee unions with membership of 2,650,600 (2,571,500) representing 82 (81) per cent of total membership of all reporting trade unions in Australia.

12. Industrial legislation in most States also provides for the registration of employee associations. Some employee associations are registered under more than one Act.
