#### ABOUT THIS PUBLICATION

This publication provides monthly estimates of stocks and use for wheat, and quarterly estimates for barley as well as selected other grains and pulses for selected manufacturing and agricultural businesses, licensed exporters and bulk grain handlers. These estimates are compiled from various surveys conducted by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), including the Grain Handlers Stocks Survey, Wheat Use Survey, Wheat Export Sales Survey, and from administrative data relating to wheat grain exports. Estimates from the surveys are combined with export trade data to provide monthly estimates of the volume of wheat grain stored, used, or committed for use.

The Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics (ABARE) uses these data to compile a monthly report on the Australian wheat industry.

The current scope and coverage of the collections is understood to account for the majority of Australia's grain stored, used and committed.

Stocks and use data for wheat users collected prior to the December 2009 reference period are not directly comparable with data collected from December 2009 onwards. Data is expected to be comparable over future collection cycles.

## SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

WHEAT GRAIN STORED

Total wheat grain stored by bulk grain handlers and users at the end of March 2010 was 16.7 million tonnes.

Wheat grain stored by bulk grain handlers at the end of March 2010 was 14.1 million tonnes, of which 12.1 million tonnes (86%) was graded for milling and 2.0 million tonnes (14%) graded for feed.

Wheat grain users stored 2.6 million tonnes of wheat grain in March 2010, with all states reporting decreases.

WHEAT GRAIN USED

The estimate of wheat grain used in March 2010 was 1.9 million tonnes. Wheat grain exports increased 21% to 1.4 million tonnes, while domestic usage totalled 493 thousand tonnes.

WHEAT GRAIN COMMITTED

In March 2010, wheat grain committed for domestic use or export increased 4% to 5.1 million tonnes. Of the total wheat grain committed, 3.7 million tonnes were contracted for export, with domestic use remaining steady at 1.4 million tonnes.

All states reported increased export commitments from February 2010, except Queensland, with commitments down by 5 thousand tonnes.

Compared to March 2009, wheat grain committed for export fell 9%, while wheat grain committed for domestic use increased 32% in March 2010.

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

INTRODUCTION

SCOPE AND COVERAGE

- **1** This publication presents estimates from various Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) wheat surveys and from administrative data relating to wheat exports. The Australian Bureau of Agricultural and Resource Economics (ABARE) uses the data in this publication to prepare a monthly report on the Australian wheat industry. This information will inform policy and decision making following the passage of the *Wheat Export Marketing Bill* on 1 July 2008.
- **2** Approximately 3,000 businesses were surveyed in the Wheat Use Coverage Survey (WUSC) conducted in late 2008. The sample comprised approximately 900 manufacturers and 2,100 animal feedlot operators. Responses from these businesses indicated that many of them were not direct users of wheat grain and they were consequently made out of scope of the collection.
- **3** Approximately 3,000 businesses were surveyed in a second Wheat Use Coverage Survey (WUSC) conducted in late 2009. The sample was largely comprised of dairy operators and wheat growers.
- **4** Commencing with the December 2009 reference period, monthly Wheat Use Surveys (WUS) are based on a sample of approximately 1,000 businesses using the combined coverage derived from the Wheat Use Coverage Surveys (WUSC).
- **5** Estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from the following ABS surveys:
  - Grain (Wheat) Handlers Stocks Survey (GHSS) Monthly
- Wheat Use Survey (WUSC) Annual Coverage
- Wheat Use Survey (WUS) Monthly
- Wheat Export Sales Survey (WESS) Monthly
- **6** The data on wheat grain exported were compiled by the ABS from information submitted by exporters or their agents to the Australian Customs Service. These data may be subject to revision.
- **7** The coverage of the Grain (Wheat) Handlers Stocks Survey (GHSS) was all major bulk grain handlers. The GHSS was previously conducted on a quarterly basis, but from March 2009 the GHSS has been conducted and data published on a monthly basis.
- **8** Commencing with the December 2009 reference period, the scope of the Wheat Use Survey (WUS) was agricultural businesses, manufacturing businesses, dairy operators and wheat growers either using or storing wheat grain, that were recorded on the ABS' Business Register (ABSBR). The ABSBR is sourced from the Australian Business Register (ABR) which is administered and maintained by the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).
- **9** For agricultural businesses, a minimum size cut-off of \$5,000 was applied to determine whether a business was in scope for the WUS. The measure of size was based on the ABS' Estimated Value of Agricultural Operations (EVAO) where available; or where it was not available, a Business Activity Statement (BAS) turnover size was derived.
- 10 The coverage of the WUS included animal feedlot operators, dairy operators, manufacturing businesses using or storing wheat grain, and wheat growing businesses. The Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification 2006 (ANZSIC06) was used to identify these businesses on the ABSBR, and the following ANZSIC06 codes were used:
  - Animal feedlot operators
    - 0143 beef cattle feedlots (specialised)
    - 0171 poultry farming (meat)
    - 0172 poultry farming (eggs)
    - 0192 pig farming
  - Dairy operators
    - 0160 dairy cattle farming

- **11** Additionally, businesses reporting beef cattle feedlot activity in the 2005-06 Agricultural Census or 2006-07 Agricultural Survey were included in the coverage for the WUS. From December 2009, the scope was expanded to include dairy operators and also agricultural businesses reporting wheat production in the 2008-09 Agricultural Survey.
- **12** The coverage of the Wheat Export Sales Survey (WESS) included businesses reporting wheat grain exports on documentation lodged with the Australian Customs Service and units on the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF) Wheat Export Charge (WEC) levy register.
- COMPARABILITY
- **13** Prior to the December 2009 reference period, data compiled from the WUS excluded on-farm storage and use, apart from animal feedlot operators and manufacturing businesses as previously defined. Commencing with the December 2009 reference period, the coverage of the WUS was expanded to include on-farm storage and use, and the scope expanded to include wheat growers and the dairy sector. As a result, wheat grain stocks and use data for wheat users for periods prior to December 2009 are not directly comparable with data collected from December 2009 onwards.

RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

- **14** Sample sizes for both the Grain (Wheat) Handlers Stocks Survey and Wheat Export Sales Survey were smaller than the sample size for the Wheat Use Survey, with the major grain handlers and approximately 50 major wheat exporters being surveyed.
- **15** A minimum response rate of at least 90% is generally achieved for the monthly wheat collections.
- samples drawn from the total business population in scope of these collections. As such, estimates are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all businesses had been included in the surveys. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error (SE) which indicates the extent to which an estimate might vary by chance because only a sample was taken. There are about two chances in three that a 'sample' estimate will differ by less than one SE from the figure that would have been obtained if all businesses had responded, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two SEs.
- **17** In this publication, 'sampling' variability of the estimates is measured by the relative standard error (RSE) which is obtained by expressing the SE as a percentage of the estimate to which it refers.
- **18** Most published national estimates have RSEs of less than 10%. However some state estimates have RSEs greater than 10%. Estimates that have an estimated RSE between 10% and 25% are annotated with the symbol '^'. These estimates should be used with caution as they are subject to sampling variability too high for some purposes. Estimates with an RSE between 25% and 50% are annotated with the symbol '\*', indicating that the estimate should be used with caution as it is subject to sampling variability too high for most practical purposes. Estimates with an RSE greater than 50% are annotated with the symbol '\*\*' indicating that the sampling variability causes the estimates to be considered too unreliable for general use. Separate indication of the RSEs of all estimates is available on request.

### GLOSSARY

Harvest

The collection of grain once it has reached optimal maturity. The wheat grain harvest in Australia typically occurs from October through to December each year.

Wheat grain committed

For the **export** sector 'committed' means there is a contract in place for the export of wheat grain.

For the **domestic** sector 'committed' means a contract is in place to procure wheat grain for domestic use and/or processing. It does not mean an intention to acquire wheat grain over the remainder of the year. It is acknowledged that this may fluctuate as contracts are cancelled, but is a 'point in time' estimate. It relates to contracts held by end users of wheat grain, not intermediaries.

Wheat grade

Wheat grain is graded by quality to determine if it is suitable for human or animal consumption. The wheat grain classifications in *Wheat Use and Stocks, Australia* (cat. no. 7307.0) are milling and feed.

Wheat grain used

For the **export** sector, 'used' means wheat exported from the country. It is assumed that wheat grain, once exported, cannot be re-imported without breaching quarantine rules and so is 'used' once it leaves the country.

For the **domestic** sector, 'used' means consumed by end users, whether they be flour millers, feedlotters, etc. In this context, 'used' means wheat grain no longer available in its harvested form for other users to buy or use, i.e. it has been transformed (e.g. to flour) or consumed (e.g. fed to animals).

Wheat grain users

Users include beef cattle feedlots, poultry, and pig producers, dairy operators, manufacturers using or storing wheat grain, and wheat growing businesses. (For more information refer to the Explanatory Notes).
