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EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

In May 1977 a survey, based on the quarterly population survey, was conducted throughout Australia in order to obtain information about persons aged 15 to 64 years who were not in the labour force; in particular, their intentions regarding entering or re-entering the labour force, whether they had ever held a regular job and, if so, how long ago and for what reason they had left it, and their educational qualifications.

2. Preliminary results of the survey were published on 25 October 1977 in *Persons Not in the Labour Force, May 1977 (Preliminary)*, (6219.0). This bulletin contains final and more detailed information. The results of a similar survey in November 1975 were published in *Persons Not in the Labour Force* (6220.0).

The population survey

3. The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 30,000 houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.), and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers. Interviews for the survey of persons not in the labour force were carried out during a period of four weeks.

Scope

- 4. The estimates relate to all persons aged fifteen years and over except members of the permanent defence forces and certain diplomatic personnel customarily excluded from census and estimated populations.
- 5. Tables 2 to 19 relate to persons aged 15 to 64 who were not in the labour force, except persons in institutions, persons permanently unable to work, boarding school students and persons who, though they had looked for work in the four weeks before interview week, had taken no active steps to obtain employment and/or were unable to start a job in the week before interview week for reasons other than their own temporary illness or injury. Persons in institutions are those who were patients in hospitals and sanatoria, or inmates of gaols, reformatories, etc., and for whom, for the purpose of the survey, the institution was regarded as their dwelling.

Survey methodology

6. Respondents to the survey, as defined in paragraph 5, were asked "Even though you are not looking for work would you like a full-time or part-time job now?" Tables 3 to 5 and 9 to 16 make use of replies of this question. A further question was asked of persons who answered "yes" or "maybe" in order to ascertain their reasons for not looking for work at the time of the survey (See Tables 9 to 11 and 14). Persons who were responsible for children under 12 years of age and who answered "no" or "don't know" to the first question

were asked "If you had care arrangements for all your children under 12 would you like a full-time or part-time job now?" Tables 17 to 19 make use of replies to this question in conjunction with replies to the first question above, as defined in the footnotes to Table 17.

Definitions

- 7. Definitions of labour force categories used in this bulletin are the same as those used in the May 1977 labour force survey, which are set out in the bulletin *The Labour Force, May 1977* (6203.0). The definition of family status is given in the Appendix to that bulletin.
- 8. A regular job was defined as one which had lasted for two months or more and in which the person had worked at least an average of five hours a week.
- 9. Discouraged job-seekers were defined as persons who wanted a job but were not looking for work because they believed they would not be able to find a job for any of the following reasons: considered too young or too old by employers; language or racial difficulties; lacked necessary training, skills or experience; or no jobs in locality or line of work.
- 10. Persons included in the survey who wanted a job but were not looking for work were asked to give reasons why they were not doing so. Reasons were ranked in the order of priority shown in Table 11. Where more than one reason was given, only the higher or highest-ranked has been included in the estimates in Tables 9, 10 and 11. Table 14 includes estimates of the highest-ranked reason and the second highest ranked reason (if any).
- 11. For this survey the State capital cities were the 1971 Population Census State metropolitan Statistical Divisions. Explanatory notes on the delimitation of urban boundaries and maps showing the boundaries of the capital city Statistical Divisions were published in Census of Population and Housing, 30 June 1971 Census Bulletin No. 6.

Reliability of the estimates

12. Since the estimates in this bulletin are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from occupants of all dwellings. More information on this topic is given in the Technical Note, page 21.

TECHNICAL NOTE

Estimation procedure

The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a complex ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the survey estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population by age and sex, rather than to the age and sex disbribution with the sample itself.

Reliability of the estimates

- 2. Since the estimates in this bulletin are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from occupants of all dwellings. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included in the survey. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- 3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this bulletin. A table of standard errors for general application is given below. These figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of labour force surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics. However, they will provide an indication of the magnitude of the standard error of any particular estimate. An example of the use of the table is as follows: if an estimate for Australia obtained from the sample is

- 100,000, the standard error is 3 per cent of the estimate i.e. 3,000; there are then about two chances in three that the true figure is within the range 97,000 to 103,000 and about nineteen chances in twenty that this figure is between 94,000 and 106,000.
- 4. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the numerator and the size of the denominator. However, the per cent standard error of the estimated percentage will generally be lower than the per cent standard error of the estimate of the numerator. The per cent standard error of the numerator can be obtained from the table below.
- 5. As the standard errors in the table below show the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this bulletin, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the table below have not been included. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 6. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracties of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error* and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
