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PERSONS NOT IN THE LABOUR FORCE, AUSTRALIA (including discouraged jobseekers) SEPTEMBER 1982

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EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

In association with the September 1982 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia, persons aged fifteen to sixty-four years who were not in the labour force were asked about their labour force aspirations and, if appropriate, their availability for work and reasons for not currently seeking employment.

- 2. During the two weeks beginning Monday 6 September, 1982, carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers asked questions of those of the 69,000 respondents in the September labour force survey who fell within the scope of this survey.
- 3. Results of similar surveys, the first conducted in November 1975, have been published in previous issues of this publication.

Scope

- 4. The survey includes all persons not in the labour force aged fifteen to sixty-four years except:
 - (a) certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
 - (b) overseas visitors holidaying in Australia;
 - (c) dependants of non-Australian defence forces personnel stationed in Australia;
 - (d) persons who had actively looked for work but were unable to start a job in survey week for reasons other than their own temporary illness or injury;
 - (e) persons who have a job but, up to the end of survey week, have been away from work without pay for four weeks or longer; and
 - (f) persons permanently unable to work, students boarding at school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria and inmates of reformatories, jails, etc.

Table 1 illustrates the group within the civilian population aged fifteen years and over who are covered by this survey.

Definitions

- 5. Definitions of the principal labour force and demographic categories appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).
- 6. Persons who want a job are those who:
 - (a) in the four weeks before the interview week had not looked for work but in the survey answer 'yes' or 'maybe' to the question

'Even though you have not been looking for work would you like a full-time or part-time job now?', or

- (b) although claiming to have looked for work in the four weeks before the interview week, had not taken *active steps* to find work.
- 7. Active steps to find work include writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work; answering a newspaper advertisement for a job; checking factory or Commonwealth Employment Service notice-boards; being registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service; checking or registering with any other employment agency, advertising or tendering for work; and contacting friends or relatives.
- 8. Highest ranked reason. Reasons for not actively looking for work have been ranked in the order of priority shown in Table 9; where more than one reason was given, only highest ranked has been included in the estimates in Tables 9 to 12. Table 13 includes estimates of the highest ranked reason and the second highest ranked reason (if any).
- 9. Among the reasons for not looking for work personal considerations include: own ill health, physical disability or pregnancy; studying or returning to studies; and no necessity to work; family considerations include such matters as ill health of another person; inability to find child care; children thought to be too young; a preference for looking after children and disapproval by the person's spouse.
- 10. Discouraged. Comprises persons who want a job but are not actively looking for work because they believe they would not be able to find a job for any of the following reasons: considered by employers to be too young or too old; language or racial difficulties; lack the necessary training, skills or experience; no jobs in their locality or line of work.
- 11. Main English-speaking countries comprise the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada, the United States of America, South Africa and New Zealand.

Discontinuities in the series

12. Estimates for March 1979 and earlier periods are not strictly comparable with those obtained from later surveys because, commencing with the September 1979 survey, the definition of *Persons who want a job* was widened to include those persons referred to in paragraph 6 (b), some of whom would be classified as *Discouraged*.

13. This survey excludes persons who have a job but, up to the end of survey week, have been away from work without pay for four weeks or longer (see paragraph 4 (e)). With the exception of the September 1980 survey when these persons were also excluded, surveys of Persons Not in the Labour Force prior to March 1982 included such persons and asked them appropriate questions.

Reliability of the estimates

- 14. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:
 - (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. More information on this topic is given in the Technical note.
 - (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.


SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

1. Persons Not in the Labour Force, September 1982-Summary

Of the civilian population 15 years of age and over 4,429,300 persons are not in the labour force, including 1,409,400 who are of retirement age (65 years and over). Of the remaining 3,019,900 persons not in the labour force between 15 and 64 years of age, 649,800 or 21.5 per cent indicate that they want a job despite not actively seeking work. The majority of these persons (494,900) are not looking for work because of personal or family considerations. In addition 390,100 persons, representing 60.0 per cent of all persons who want a job, would be available to start work if a job offer was received.

Discouraged job seekers (84,500) comprise 13.0 per cent of persons not in the labour force who want a job and 91.5 per cent of these persons (77,300) would be available to start work if a job offer was received. In comparison, only 312,800 persons (55.3 per cent of persons with other reasons for not seeking work) would be able to start a job. The difference in availability to start work between discouraged job seekers and others wanting a job reflects their reasons for not seeking work. Persons with personal or family commitments are more likely to need time to make arrangements to start work than are discouraged job seekers whose reasons for not looking for work generally relate to factors outside their control.


DIAGRAM 1. CIVILIAN POPULATION 15 YEARS AND OVER



2. Discouraged job seekers March 1981 to September 1982


The increase in the number of discouraged job seekers over the last two years parallels the recent rise in unemployment. Between March 1981 and September 1982 unemployment increased by 23.4 per cent from 409,900 to 505,900. Correspondingly during the same period, discouraged job seekers increased by 21.1 per cent from 69,800 to 84,500. The ratio of persons unemployed to persons discouraged has remained much the same over this time.

Females generally and married females in particular are disproportionately represented amongst persons not in the labour force but wanting work or discouraged from seeking work. 79.7 per cent of persons who want a job are female (57.6 per cent are married females) and 87.5 per cent of discouraged job seekers are female (66.3 per cent are married females). In contrast, females comprise less than half the number of unemployed persons (aged 15 to 64 years) and married females represent only 17.7 per cent.


DIAGRAM 3. PROPORTION OF VARIOUS POPULATIONS BY SEX, SEPTEMBER 1982



3. Reasons for not looking for work

The reasons for not actively looking for work are different for males and females. For males wanting a job, the vast majority (79.5 per cent) give personal considerations (particularly attendance at an educational institution) as their main reason for not looking for work. These males are predominantly in the 15 to 19 year age group and are potential labour force participants at some time in the future. For females, family considerations (particularly a preference for looking after children) are the most commonly reported reasons for not seeking work. Such persons, who tend to be older and with family commitments, are unlikely to enter the labour force in the near future.

4. Work preference

The majority of persons not in the labour force who want a job (69.8 per cent) indicated a preference for part-time work. This contrasts markedly with unemployed persons, where only 16.8 per cent are seeking part-time work and reflects the fact that persons outside the labour force tend to have either personal or family commitments which make their entry to the full-time work force more difficult. Not surprisingly, married females who are not in the labour force but who would like work indicate an overwhelming preference for part-time work (82.5 per cent). The high proportion of males who prefer part-time work (40.5 per cent) relative to unemployed males seeking part-time work (7.8 per cent) possibly reflects the desire of students to supplement their earnings while studying.




TECHNICAL NOTE

Estimation procedure

The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

Reliability of the estimates

- Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling variability: that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is otained by expressing the standard error as a percentage
- 3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.
- An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 19 on the previous page shows the estimated number of females in Australia who are not in the labour force and who would like a job but are responsible for children is 129,700. Since this estimate is between 100,000 and 200,000 the standard error for Australia will be between 3,900 and 5,100 in the standard error table and can be approximated as 4,300 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 125,400 to 134,000 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 121,100 to 138,300. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



- 5. As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the standard error table have not been published. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 6. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. The formula for the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE(x)]^2 - [RSE(y)]^2}$$

- 7. Considering the example from paragraph 4 above, of the 129,700 females who want a job only 13,200 or 10.2 per cent want full-time work. The standard error of 13,200 is approximately 1,600 so the relative standard error is 12.1 per cent. The relative standard error for 129,700 is 3.3 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is $\sqrt{(12.1)^2 (3.3)^2}$ or 11.6 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (10.2 per cent) of 1.2 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of females responsible for children but wanting a full-time job is between 9.0 per cent and 11.4 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion is within the range 7.8 per cent to 12.6 per cent.
- 8. Published figures may also be used to estimate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such a figure is itself an estimate and is therefore subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calculated by the following formula:

SE (x-y) =
$$\sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the non-sampling error, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample.
