EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

The monthly Population Survey (which is described in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the July 1984 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

- 2. Of the respondents to the labour force survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. Respondents in this subset were asked about their job search experience, including their difficulties in finding work, steps taken to find work and whether they had had offers of employment, as well as about their educational attainment and the particulars of their last job, if any.
- 3. The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the labour force survey (described in full in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0)) except that it was restricted to persons who were unemployed and excluded:
 - (a) students boarding at school;
 - (b) persons permanently unable to work;
 - (c) some patients in hospitals and sanatoria and inmates of reformatories, jails, etc.; and
 - (d) persons who were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been *stood down* without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week (including the whole of the survey week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.
- 4. Persons who were stood down (as defined in paragraph 3 above) were excluded from the scope of this supplementary survey as it is inappropriate to ask them about their job search experience.

Definitions

- 5. Active steps taken to find work comprise: writing, telephoning or applying in person to an employer for work; answering a newspaper advertisement for a job; checking factory or Commonwealth Employment Service noticeboards; being registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service; checking or registering with any other employment agency; advertising or tendering for work; and contacting friends or relatives.
- 6. For this survey unemployed persons are those aged 15 and over within the scope of the survey who were not employed during the survey week (i.e. the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week, and:
 - (a) were available for work in the survey week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the survey week); or

- (b) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the survey week and would have started in the survey week if the job had been available then.
- 7. The number of unemployed persons in this supplementary survey differs from that published in *The Labour Force, Australia, July 1984* (6203.0) in that the latter includes persons who were *stood down*. However, persons who were *stood down* comprised less than 1.4 per cent of all unemployed persons.
- 8. Persons with a post-school qualification were those who had left school and answered 'Yes' to the question: 'Since leaving school have you obtained a certificate, diploma, degree of any other qualification?'
- 9. Classification of post-school qualifications. Respondents indicated which one of the following groups best described their highest qualification:
 - (a) Degree: a bachelor degree (including honours), a graduate or post-graduate diploma, a masters degree or a doctorate.
 - (b) Trade; technical or other certificate: completion of an approved trade/technician apprenticeship or training course, other certificate or diploma in secretarial or business studies, administration, teaching, nursing, etc.
 - (c) Other: completion of other post-secondary education e.g. adult education, preparatory/bridging course or hobby course.
- 10. State capital cities refers to the 1981 Population Census Capital City Statistical Divisions in the six States.
- 11. It is impracticable to obtain information relating to the whole of the previous twelve months which is strictly comparable with that obtained in the monthly labour force survey for which the reference period is one week. The definitions used in determining duration of current period of unemployment (see paragraph 12 following) depend on a detailed set of questions. The items time spent looking for work and number of spells of looking for work during the previous twelve months (see paragraphs 13 and 14 following) are based on a more limited set of questions. It is for this reason that the term looking for work is used for these items rather than the more rigidly defined term unemployment.
- 12. Duration of current period of unemployment is the period from the time the person began looking for work or was laid off to the end of the survey week. Thus the survey measures current (and continuing) periods of unemployment rather than completed spells. For persons who may have begun looking for work while still employed, the duration of current period of unemployment is defined as the period from the time the person last worked full-time for two weeks or more to the end of the survey week. Periods of unemployment are recorded in complete weeks and this results in a slight understatement of duration. Average (mean) duration is the duration obtained by dividing the aggregate number of weeks a group has been unemployed by the number of persons in that group. Median duration is the duration which

divides unemployed persons into two equal groups, one comprising persons whose duration of unemployment is above the median and the other, persons whose duration is below it.

- 13. Time spent looking for work in the previous twelve months is the total number of weeks the person reported having been out of work and looking for a job, including the weeks in the current period.
- 14. The number of spells of looking for work in the previous twelve months is the number of different periods, including the current period, during which the person reported having been out of work and looking for a job.
- 15. A job is any paid employment, full-time or parttime, lasting two weeks or more.
- 16. Persons are classified as married if they are reported as being married (including de facto) and their spouse was a usual resident of the household at the time of the survey. The not-married category includes persons who have never married, or are separated, widowed or divorced; as well as those who, although reported as being married, did not have a spouse who usually lived in the household. For effects on estimates of marital status, see paragraph 25.
- 17. Estimates of family status in this publication use the classifications 'with' or 'without dependent children present' which are used in the publication Labour Force Status and Other Characteristics of Families (6224.0), which contains data compiled from the same survey. Dependent children comprise all family members aged 0 to 14 and all family members aged 15 to 20 who are full-time students. The family status estimates published monthly in The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0) use the classifications 'with' or 'without children aged 0 to 14 present' rather than by 'with' or 'without dependent children present'. Further information about family status is given in both the above publications. Other supplementary publications also use the same classifications as The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0).
- 18. It should be noted that *family status* characteristics were not obtained for all persons included in the survey. Family information was not collected for the following persons identified in tables as 'not family coded':
 - (a) all persons enumerated in non-private dwellings (including hotels, motels, hospitals and other institutions);
 - (b) persons enumerated as visitors to, rather than usual residents of, private dwellings; and
 - (c) where it was not possible to obtain family information relating to all the usual residents of a household, e.g. where one member of the family was a member of the permanent defence forces and therefore outside the scope of the survey.

- 19. Further definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).
- 20. Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication are as at the survey week.

Population benchmarks

- 21. Following the change in official population estimates to a place of usual residence basis after the 1981 Census, the population benchmarks used in this survey have been compiled according to place of usual residence. For an explanation of the new conceptual basis of population estimates see *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).
- 22. The change from 1976 Population Census based benchmarks to 1981 Population Census based benchmarks has had little effect on the movement in the estimates between the July 1983 and July 1984 surveys.

Results of the Survey

- 23. A preliminary publication containing a summary of the results was issued on 29 November 1984.
- 24. Results of similar surveys, the first conducted in May 1976, have been published in *Characteristics of Persons Looking for Work, Australia* (6222.0). The title of the publication has been changed in this edition to more clearly indicate the group of persons to which the statistics refer. A further survey was conducted in July 1982, (see *Methods of Obtaining Jobs, Australia* (6245.0)) which collected data on persons who had started a job in the six months to July 1982.

Discontinuities in the series

25. Paragraph 16 outlines the definition of marital status now used in this survey. Consequently, estimates of marital status contained in this publication are not comparable with estimates published for this survey in previous years, which classified as married all respondents who reported that they were married or separated.

Reliability of the estimates

- 26. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:
 - (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. More information on this topic is given in the Technical note.
 - (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

In July 1984 there were 587,400 unemployed persons (excluding those who were stood down), a decrease since July 1983 (671,200). Of the unemployed persons in July 1984, 513,400 (87.4 per cent) were looking for full-time work.


Similar surveys have been conducted annually since May 1976, and in July 1982 a further survey was conducted to collect data on persons who had started a job during the six months to July 1982. Results of that survey were published in *Methods of Obtaining Jobs, Australia* (6245.0).

Diagram 1 shows the broad characteristics of those who had been successful in their job-seeking compared with persons who were still unemployed in July 1982. A further comparison is drawn between unemployed persons in July 1982 and July 1984.


While persons who had started a job in the six months to July 1982 were almost equally divided between males and females, there was a greater tendency for unemployed persons to be males, rather than females. In July 1982, 56.5 per cent of unemployed persons were males and this figure has grown to 60.5 per cent in July 1984.

Persons who started a job in the six months to July 1982 were better educated than those who were still unemployed —35.5 per cent of the former, but only 20.6 per cent of the latter group had post-school qualifications. There is also evidence that unemployed persons in July 1984 had attained a higher level of education than their counterparts in July 1982: 20.6 per cent of unemployed persons in July 1982 reported having a post-school qualification, and a further 60.6 per cent stated that they had not attended the highest level of secondary school. In July 1984 these figures were 26.4 per cent and 55.1 per cent respectively.




In recent years there has been a change in the job search methods of unemployed persons. Between July 1978 and July 1982 the proportion of unemployed persons who registered with the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES) dropped from 75.9 per cent to 72.7 per cent. Between July 1982 and July 1984 however, this figure increased significantly to 81.8 per cent. Moreover, more unemployed persons are now taking other active steps to find work. Of unemployed persons in July 1984, 73.8 per cent contacted prospective employers as well as registering with the CES. This compares with 65.1 per cent in July 1978. The proportion of unemployed persons who were registered with the CES but took no other active steps to obtain work has fallen from 7.1 per cent in July 1978 to 1.3 per cent in July 1984.



The majority of unemployed persons (81.8 per cent) were registered with the CES. A comparison with those who were not registered with the CES shows differences in the main difficulty in finding work. The most striking difference is that only 2.1 per cent registered persons reported experiencing no difficulties, compared with 14.8 per cent of persons who were not registered with the CES. Persons who were registered were more likely to report that they were considered too young or too old or the lack of education as their main difficulty in finding work. There were no significant differences between the two groups for the remaining catagories.

A comparison over time of main difficulty shows that in each of the years July 1980 to July 1984 the most frequently reported main difficulty in finding work was that there were no vacancies at all. The proportion of unemployed persons reporting this as their main difficulty rose from 23.6 per cent in June 1981 to a peak of 33.1 per cent in July 1983 before falling back to 23.8 per cent in July 1984.



(a) Includes own ill health or handicap, unsuitable hours, too far to travel/transport problems, language difficulties and other difficulties.


The majority of persons looking for full-time work were males (66.0 per cent), while males comprised a much smaller proportion (22.7 per cent) of the persons looking for part-time work.

The proportions of males and females registered with the CES depended upon whether they were looking for full-time or part-time work. Only 7.0 per cent of males looking for full-time work were not registered with the CES, whereas 19.7 per cent of females looking for full-time work were not registered.

In contrast, the proportion of persons looking for part-time work who were not registered with the CES was similar for both males and females (64.3 per cent and 67.1 per cent respectively).

The average duration of current period of unemployment was 50.8 weeks for persons looking for full-time work and 27.2 weeks for persons looking for part-time work.

In July 1984 the average duration of current period of unemployment was 51.2 weeks for males and 42.6 weeks for females. A breakdown by age shows separate patterns for males and females. For males, the average duration increases with age from 32.2 weeks for those aged 15 to 19 to 77.5 weeks for those aged 55 or more. For females however, the age group 20 to 24 has an average duration of 51.1 weeks. This falls to 37.5 weeks for females aged 25 to 34 and then increases again to 81.3 weeks for females aged 55 or more.




TECHNICAL NOTE

Estimation procedure

The estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a ratio estimation procedure which ensures that the estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population for each capital city and remainder of State by age and sex, rather than to the corresponding distribution within the sample itself.

Reliability of the estimates

- Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they are subject to sampling variability, that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the likely difference is the relative standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.
- 3. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. A table of standard errors for general application is given on the following page. Since they are averages based on calculations for a limited number of past surveys over a wide range of labour force characteristics these figures will not give a precise measure of the standard error of a particular estimate but they will provide an indication of its magnitude.
- 4. An example of the calculation and the use of standard errors in relation to estimates of persons is as follows. Table 12 shows the estimated number of unemployed persons in Australia who had a duration of current period of unemployment of one year or longer was 197,100. Since this estimate is between 100,000 and 200,000, the standard error for Australia will be between 3,900 and 5,100 in the standard error table and can be approximated as 5,100 (rounded to the nearest 100). Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall in the range 192,000 to 202,200 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 186,900 to 207,300. This example is illustrated in the following diagram.



- 5. As can be seen from the standard error table, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are thus subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, estimates less than the lowest levels shown in the standard error table have not been published. Although figures for these small components can in same cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 6. Proportions and percentages formed from the ratio of two estimates are also subject to sampling errors. The size of the error depends on the accuracy of both the numerator and the denominator. The formula for the relative standard error (RSE) of a proportion is given below:

RSE
$$(x/y) = \sqrt{[RSE (x)]^2 - [RSE (y)]^2}$$

- 7. Considering the example from paragraph 4 above, the 197,100 persons represent 33.6 per cent of the 587,400 unemployed persons. The standard error on 587,400 is approximately 7,500 so the relative standard error is 1.3 per cent. The relative standard error for 197,100 is 2.6 per cent. Applying the above formula, the relative standard error of the proportion is $\sqrt{(2.6)^2 (1.3)^2}$ or 2.3 per cent, giving a standard error for the proportion (33.6 per cent) of 0.8 percentage points. Therefore, there are about two chances in three that the proportion of unemployed persons who had a duration of current period of unemployment of one year or longer is between 32.8 per cent and 34.4 per cent and nineteen chances in twenty the proportion is within the range 32.0 per cent to 35.2 per cent.
- 8. Published figures may also be used to estimate the difference between two survey estimates (of numbers or percentages). Such a figure is itself an estimate and is therefore subject to sampling error. The sampling error of the difference between two estimates depends on their standard errors and the relationship (correlation) between them. An approximate standard error (SE) of the difference between two estimates (x-y) may be calulated by the following formula:

SE (x-y) =
$$\sqrt{[SE(x)]^2 + [SE(y)]^2}$$

While this formula will only be exact for differences between separate and uncorrelated characteristics or subpopulations it is expected to provide a good approximation for all differences likely to be of interest in this publication.

9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents and errors made in the coding and processing of data. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the non-sampling error, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample.
