### EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. The estimates in this bulletin are derived from the labour force survey part of the monthly population survey. In addition to State tables, information about smaller areas termed 'regions' are also presented. The bulletin is issued quarterly for the quarters ending in February, May, August and November.

2. Tables in this bulletin show data for the period June 1987 to August 1988. Equivalent data back to October 1982 can be made available on request.

### The population survey

3. The population survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 31,000 houses, flats etc) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.), and covers about three-fifths of one per cent of the population of Australia. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers. The interviews are generally conducted during the two weeks beginning on the Monday between the 6th and the 12th of each month. The information obtained relates to the week before the interview (i.e. the survey week).

#### Scope

4. The labour force survey includes all persons aged 15 and over except:

- (a) members of the permanent defence forces;
- (b) certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;
- (c) overseas resident in Australia;
- (d) members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependents) stationed in Australia.

### Coverage

5. In the labour force survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one

dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. The coverage rules are, necessarily, a balance between theoretical and operational considerations. Nevertheless, the chance of a person being enumerated at two separate dwellings in the one survey is considered to be negligible.

Persons who are away overseas from their usual residence for less than six weeks at the time of interview are generally enumerated at their usual residence when relevant information can be obtained from other usual residents present at the time of the survey. Persons who, at the time of interview, are overseas for six weeks or more but for less than twelve months are included in the estimates on the assumption that their labour force characteristics are similar to those of the persons responding in the survey.

#### Definitions

6. The labour force category to which a person is assigned depends on the actual activity undertaken during the survey week (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.). The following definitions, which conform closely to the international standard definitions specified by the International Labour Organisation (ILO), relate only to those persons within the scope of the survey.

7. *Employed persons* comprise all those aged 15 and over who, during the survey week:

- (a) worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind in a job or business, or on a farm (including employees, employers and self-employed persons); or
- (b) worked for one hour or more without pay in a family business or on a farm (i.e. unpaid family helpers); or
- (c) were employees who had a job but were not at work and were: on paid leave; on leave without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week; stood down without pay because of bad weather or plant breakdown at their place of employment for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week; on strike or locked out; on workers' compensation and expected to be returning to their job; or receiving wages or salary while undertaking full-time study; or
- (d) were employers, self-employed persons or unpaid family helpers who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.

8. Unemployed persons are those aged 15 and over who were not employed during the survey week, and

 had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week and:

> (i) were available for work in the survey week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the survey week); or

> (ii) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the survey week and would have started in the survey week if the job had been available then; or

(b) were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part- time

job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week (including the whole of the survey week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

9. The *unemployment rate* for any group is the number of unemployed expressed as a percentage of the labour force (i.e. employed plus unemployed) in the same group.

10. The *labour force* comprises all persons who, during the survey week, were employed or unemployed, as defined above.

11. The *labour force participation rate* for any group is the labour force expressed as a percentage of the civilian population aged 15 and over in the same group. Because it is not practicable to ascertain the information about school attendance or birthplace of persons in institutions (who are classified as not in the labour force), labour force participation rates for persons classified by school attendance or birthplace are calculated using population estimates which exclude those in institutions.

12. Full-time workers are those who usually work 35 hours or more a week and others who, although usually part-time workers, worked 35 hours or more during the survey week. Part-time workers are those who usually work less than 35 hours a week and who did so during the survey week. When recording hours of work, fractions of an hour are disregarded.

13. *Persons not in the labour force* are those who, during the survey week, were not in the categories employed or unemployed, as defined above.

14. Industry is classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC) 1983 (1201.0 and 1202.0) and occupation according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations, (ASCO) 1986 (1221.0 and 1222.0).

#### **Revision of series**

15. Survey estimates are not revised for the usually small amendments of population benchmarks arising from new data on deaths and overseas and internal migration. Revisions are made, however, after each census of population and housing, and when population estimation bases are reviewed.

16. Following the change in official population estimates to a place of usual residence basis after the 1981 Census, the population benchmarks used in the estimation of labour force survey data are compiled according to place of usual residence. For an explanation of the new conceptual basis of population estimates see *Population Estimates: An outline of the New Conceptual Basis of ABS Population Estimates* (3216.0). The estimates shown in this publication are wholly according to place of usual residence.

17. A revised questionnaire was introduced for the April 1986 Labour Force survey. Following the introduction of this questionnaire, the definition of employed persons has been extended to include persons who worked without pay between 1 and 14 hours per week in a family business or on a farm (i.e. unpaid family helpers).

Further information is contained in *Information Paper: Questionnaires used in the Labour Force Survey* (6232.0), and paragraphs 37 and 38 of the Explanatory Notes to the February 1987 issue of the *Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0) issued by the Australian Statistician. 18. Occupational data classified to ASCO was introduced for the August 1986 survey, replacing the Classification and Classified List of Occupations (CCLO), Revised November 1980 used in previous surveys. The new classification relies on the level and specialisation of skill required to satisfactorily perform primary tasks as its classificatory variable and is therefore significantly different from the previous classification. For a more detailed explanation of the Appendix contained in the September 1985 – November 1986 issue of this publication.

### Survey sample redesign

19. The Labour Force Survey (LFS) sample has been redesigned and reselected using information collected in the 1986 Population Census. The new sample was phased in over the period September to December 1987. For details, see *Information Paper : Labour Force Survey – Sample Design (6269.0)* 

20. The sampling fraction differs for States and Territories. This enables estimates of reasonable accuracy to be produced for all States and Territories as well as for Australia. Sampling fractions for each State and Territory are: New South Wales and Victoria 1 in 230; Queensland 1 in 160; Western Australia, South Australia, Northern Territory and Australian Capital Territory 1 in 115; Tasmania 1 in 70.

### Potential effects on labour force survey estimate

21. The implementation of new sample may affect estimates derived from the Labour Force Survey. Implications for estimates produced from the LFS due to the sample redesign are as follows:

(a) There will be higher standard errors for the estimates of month-to-month movements produced over the period September 1987 to December 1987 compared with those for the corresponding series produced prior to this period and from January 1988 onwards. These are estimated to be up to 22 per cent higher than the normal standard errors on monthly movements.

Tables of standard errors from January 1988 onwards are on page 24. Standard errors for the months September to December 1987 are contained in the September 1986 to November 1987 issue of this publication. Standard errors for months prior to September 1987 can be found in previous issues of this publication.

- (b) Analysis at the Australian Level has shown that the unemployment rate is marginally higher (about 4 per cent) for those persons in sample for the first time. Normally, this will not affect the overall estimates of month-to-month movements because the number of persons in sample for the first time does not change significantly. However, during the transition period, there will be twice as many people as usual in sample for the first time. This may cause a small upward movement in the number of unemployed persons from August to September (about 3,500 persons at the Australian level) and a compensating decrease from December to January.
- 22. For further information, see Information Paper Labour Force Survey Sample Design (6269.0).

### Change in collection methodology

23. For the April 1988 to October 1988 surveys information is being collected by telephone interview where practicable, from approximately ten per cent of survey respondents. At the end of this

period, consideration will be given to changing to telephone interviewing as the principal method of obtaining data.

#### **Reliability of the estimates**

24. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:

- (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they, and the movements derived from them, may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. More information on this topic is given in the Technical note.
- (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents and interviewers and errors made in the coding and processing of data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

### Estimation procedure

2. The labour force estimates are derived from the population survey by use of a complex ratio estimation procedure, which ensures that the survey estimates conform to an independently estimated distribution of the population by age and sex, rather than to the age and sex distribution within the sample itself.

### Reliability of the estimates

Two types of error are possible in an estimate based 3. on a sample survey: sampling error and non-sampling error. The sampling error is a measure of the variability that occurs by chance because a sample, rather than the entire population, is surveyed. Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they, and the movement derived from them, are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the surveys. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of dwellings was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. The standard error can also be expressed as a percentage of the estimate, and this is known as the relative standard error.

4. Space does not allow for the separate indication of the standard errors of all estimates in this publication. Tables A and B on page 24 show standard errors of estimates and monthly movements January 1988 onwards. Standard errors for the months September to December 1987 are contained in the September 1986 to November 1987 issue of this publication. Standard errors for months prior to September 1987 are available from previous issues of this publication.

5. The size of the standard error increases with the level of the estimate, so that the larger the estimate the larger the standard error. However, it should be noted that the larger the sample estimate the smaller will be the standard error in percentage terms. Thus, larger sample estimates will be relatively more reliable than small estimates.

6. As the standard errors in the tables on page 24 show, the smaller the estimate the higher is the relative

standard error. Very small estimates are subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. In the tables in this publication, estimates and percentages based on such estimates have not been included but are indicated with an '\*'. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

The movement in the level of an estimate is also 7. subject to sampling variability. The standard error of the movement depends on the levels of the estimates from which the movement is obtained rather than the size of the movement. An indication of the magnitude of standard errors of monthly movements is shown in Table B on page 24. The estimates of standard error of monthly movement apply only to estimates of movements between two consecutive months. Movements between corresponding months of consecutive quarters (quarterly movements), corresponding months of consecutive years (annual movements) and other non-consecutive months, will generally be subject to somewhat greater sampling variability than is indicated in the table. Standard errors of quarterly movements can be obtained by multiplying the figures in Table B on page 24 by 1.5. Standard errors of all annual movements can be obtained by multiplying the figures in Table A on page 24 by 1.3. When using the table to calculate standard errors of movements, refer to the larger of the two estimates from which the movement is derived.

## Examples of the calculation and use of standard errors.

8. From Table A it will be seen that in the Central Metropolitan Sub-division an estimate of 4,000 unemployed males looking for full-time work has a standard error of about 750. Therefore there are about two chances in three that the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey would have been within the range 3,250 to 4,750 and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would have been within the range 2,500 to 5,500.

9. Suppose that there is an increase of 800 in the number of unemployed males in the Central Metropolitan Sub-division looking for full-time work from one month to the next.

Table B relates the standard error of the monthly movement to the larger of the two estimates from which the movement is derived. In this case, if the larger of the two estimates from which the movements is derived was 4,000, from Table B it will be seen that the standard error of the monthly movement is about 530. Therefore there are about two chances in three that if all dwellings had been included in the surveys the movement would have been within the range 270 to 1,330 and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would have been within the range -260 to +1,860.
