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MAIN FEATURES

NOTE. The survey estimates are subject to sampling variability, as explained in paragraphs 15 to 18. Standard errors are shown in Table 1 and on page 3.

- In January 1979 an estimated 5,939,900 persons were employed - a fall of 157,600 since December 1978. About three-quarters of the decrease was accounted for by part-time workers (-117,600, of whom 83,800 were married women).
- Of the estimated 222,200 teenagers who had left school between the beginning of 1978 and the survey date, 104,100 were employed in January 1979 (80,000 in full-time jobs), 69,800 were unemployed and 48,300 were not in the labour force. See Table 4 for details.
- . An estimated 171,600 teenagers left school in November or December 1978, of whom 73,000 were employed in January 1979 and 57,300 were unemployed.
- Analysis of January 1979 data indicates that the effect on the estimates of persons who because of the holiday period were living away from their usual residence was not significant.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This bulletin contains preliminary estimates of the civilian labour force derived from the monthly population survey. More detailed estimates will be published in The Labour Force (6203.0). Preliminary unemployment estimates have been issued in advance of publication in Unemployment, Preliminary Estimates (6201.0).

The population survey

The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 30,000 houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.), and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers, the interviews generally being conducted during the two weeks beginning on the Monday between the 6th and 12th of each month. The information obtained relates to the week prior to the interview (i.e. the survey week). Because of operational problems arising from the Christmas and New Year holidays, the December 1978 survey commenced a week earlier than usual (i.e. on 4 December), but most interviews were conducted during the following week. The January 1979 survey commenced a week later than usual (i.e. on 15 January).

Scope

The survey includes all persons aged fifteen years and over except: members of the permanent defence forces; certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations; non-Australians on tour or holidaying in Australia; and members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants) stationed in Australia.

Definitions

- The labour force category to which a person is assigned depends on his actual activity (i.e. whether working, looking for work, etc.) during the survey week. The definitions conform closely to the international standard definitions recommended by the ILO.
- Employed persons comprise all those aged 15 years and over who, during the survey week:
 - (a) worked for one hour or more for pay, profit, commission or payment in kind in a job or business, or on a farm (including employees, employers and self-employed persons); or
 - (b) worked for 15 hours or more without pay in a family business or on a farm (i.e. unpaid family helper); or
 - (c) were employees who had a job but were not at work and were: on paid leave; on leave without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week; stood down without pay because of bad weather or plant breakdown at their place of employment for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week; on strike or locked out; on workers' compensation and expected to be returning to their job; or receiving wages or salary while undertaking full-time study; or

- (d) were employers or self-employed persons who had a job, business or farm, but were not at work.
- 6. Unemployed persons are those aged 15 years and over who were not employed during the survey week, and
 - (a) had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week and:
 - (i) were available for work in the survey week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the survey week);
 - (ii) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the survey week and would have started in the survey week if the job had been available then;
- or (b) were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week (including the whole of the survey week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.
- 7. Unemployed persons looking for first job are those who had never worked for two weeks or more in a full-time job.
- 8. The *unemployment rate* for any group is the number unemployed expressed as a percentage of the labour force in the same group.
- 9. The *labour force* comprises all persons who, during the survey week, were employed or unemployed, as defined in paragraphs 5 and 6.
- 10. The labour force participation rate for any group is the labour force expressed as a percentage of the civilian population aged 15 years and over in the same group.
- 11. Full-time workers are those who usually work 35 hours a week or more and others who, although usually part-time workers, worked 35 hours or more during the survey week. Part-time workers are those who usually work less than 35 hours a week and who did so during the survey week. When recording hours of work, fractions of an hour are disregarded.
- 12. Persons not in the labour force are those who, during the survey week, were not in the categories 'employed' or 'unemployed'.

Revision of series

13. The survey estimates for February 1978 and subsequent months are based on population estimates derived from the 1976 Population Census, adjusted for under-enumeration, and were obtained by using a new sample and revised questionnaire. Estimates from August 1971 have been revised to the new basis and are not comparable with those in issues of this publication prior to February 1978.

Comparability of series

When comparing labour force estimates for

February 1978 and subsequent months with those for earlier periods it should be noted that with the introduction of monthly surveys the interviews are now conducted during a two-week period, whereas formerly the period was four weeks. The change of timing may affect the level of the figures for any month, but particularly for months during which the employment status of the population may be changing rapidly.

Reliability of the estimates

- 15. Since the survey estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they, and the movements derived from them, are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ by chance from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the surveys. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- 16. Standard errors of estimates for the latest month and of estimates of movements since the previous month are shown in Table 1. Standard errors of other estimates and other *monthly* movements should be determined by using Tables A and B on page 3.
- 17. The smaller the estimate the higher is the relative standard error. Very small estimates are subject to such high relative standard errors as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. Estimates below the levels shown in Table A have not been included. Although figures for these small components can in some cases be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.
- 18. Examples of the calculation and use of standard errors are given below:
 - (a) From Table A it will be seen that the estimate of 2,070,700 employed females in January 1979 has a standard error of about 11,400 and therefore there are about two chances in three that the value that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will fall within the range 2,059,300 to 2,082,100 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the value will fall within the range 2,047,900 to 2,093,500.
 - (b) The estimate of movement in the number of employed females from December 1978 to January 1979 is a decrease of 103,100. Table B relates the standard error of the monthly movement to the larger of the two estimates from which the movement is derived. In this case the December 1978 estimate (2,173,800) is the larger. From Table B it will be seen that the standard error of the monthly movement is about 8,400. Therefore there are about two chances in three that if all dwellings had been included in the surveys the movement would have been within the range -111,500 to -94,700 and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would have been within the range -119,900 to -86,300.

Seasonally adjusted estimates

19. Seasonally adjusted quarterly estimates of the labour force are shown in Table 1. Calculation of seasonally adjusted monthly figures will not be possible until results of monthly surveys for two or three years are available. The move to the higher level of unemployment since 1974 appears to have been accompanied by shifts in the pattern of seasonal variation. For this reason the publication of seasonally adjusted quarterly figures of unemployment was suspended as from November 1977. The matter will be kept under review.
