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## LABOUR FORCE STATUS AND OTHER CHARACTERISTICS OF MIGRANTS, **AUSTRALIA, MARCH 1987 SUMMARY**

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# MAIN FEATURES

In March 1987 there were an estimated 1,431,000 migrants in Australia who arrived after 1960 aged 18 and over. They entered Australia under various migration categories— 57.9 per cent (829,000) were classed as principal applicants while a further 24.1 per cent (344,800) arrived as the partner of a principal applicant. Of the principal applicants, 285,100 were sponsored by their family, 135,400 were sponsored by others, 349,400 arrived unsponsored, and 52,300 were refugees.

The labour force participation rate of these migrants in March 1987 was 69.6 per cent. Of the 995,600 in the labour force, 75.2 per cent were employed full-time and 11.0 per cent were unemployed. Refugees had the highest unemployment rate at 31.8 per cent. Principal applicants who were sponsored had an unemployment rate of 9.7 per cent and those who were unsponsored had a relatively low rate of 7.6 per cent.

The proportion of migrants who last resided in Europe has been steadily decreasing as the numbers arriving from Asia and Oceania have increased. In the period 1961 to 1970, 82.0 per cent of migrants covered by this survey arrived from Europe compared with 8.7 per cent from Asia and 4.0 per cent from Oceania. In the latest period (1981 to 1987) the proportion arriving from Europe had fallen to 36.0 per cent, while those from Asia accounted for 34.1 per cent with a further 18.6 per cent from Oceania. În the period 1981 to 1987, 139,300 migrants aged 18 and over arrived from Europe while the corresponding figure for Asia was 131,900 and there were 72,200 from Oceania.

64.9 per cent of migrants (928,300) had a job just before migration. 80.1 per cent of males were in this category while for females the figure was only 49.7 per cent.

Of the 644,500 migrants who had a post-school qualification on arrival, 39.6 per cent (255,000) had a certificate or diploma, 38.8 per cent (249,800) had a trade qualification or apprenticeship and 19.8 per cent (127,600) had a

#### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

The monthly Population Survey (which is described in The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0)) comprises the monthly labour force survey and supplementary topics. This publication contains some results of a supplementary survey run in association with the March 1987 labour force survey conducted throughout Australia.

Of the respondents to the labour force survey, those who fell within the scope of the supplementary survey were asked additional questions. They were asked about their place of last residence, members of their family who travelled to Australia with them, family already in Australia, whether they had a job just before migrating, their highest educational qualification before and after migrating to Australia, and their sponsorship classification.

#### Scope

The scope of this supplementary survey was the same as that used for the labour force survey (described in full in The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0)) except that it was restricted to persons who were not born in Australia and who arrived in Australia after 1960 aged 18 or more and were allowed to stay permanently. The survey excluded persons who were boarding at school, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria and inmates of reformatories, gaols, etc.

#### Coverage

In the Population Survey, coverage rules are applied which aim to ensure that each person is associated with only one dwelling, and hence has only one chance of selection. See The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0) for more details.

### **Definitions**

A migrant is a person who was not born in Australia and who was a permanent resident of Australia at the time of the survey. A migrant could be sponsored to come to Australia or arrive unsponsored.

- 6. Migrants who were sponsored include those who had family already in Australia who sponsored that person to come to Australia. These people are considered to have come to Australia under the Family Reunion criteria. Others who were sponsored had an employer or some other person or organisation, other than the Australian Government, sponsor that person to come to Australia.
- 7. Migrants who were unsponsored include those who came to Australia under special eligibility criteria. This category includes persons who came to Australia as migrants who did not require a visa, or who had some entitlement to come to Australia. Other persons who were unsponsored include: persons who applied in their own country to come to Australia; Australians born overseas; persons who came to Australia on a temporary visa, on a working holiday, as a student, etc., and had since gained permanent residence. New Zealanders were not asked sponsorship questions due to their entitlement to come to Australia. Similarly, refugees (any person who came to Australia under a refugee program) were not asked sponsorship questions.
- 8. Place of last residence was the country in which the respondent last lived.
- 9. For Birthplace and Place of last residence-
  - Africa includes: Egypt, Kenya, Mauritius, South Africa, Uganda, Zimbabwe, etc.;
  - America includes: Argentina, Canada, Chile, Mexico, United States of America, Uruguay, etc.;
  - Asia includes: China, Cyprus, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Iran, Israel, Japan, Jordan, Kampuchea, Korea, Kuwait, Lebanon, Malaysia, Philippines, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Syria, Taiwan, Thailand, Turkey, Vietnam, etc.;
  - Europe includes: Czechoslovakia, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Malta, Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Spain, Sweden, United Kingdom and Ireland, USSR, Yugoslavia, etc.; and
  - Oceania includes: Fiji, New Caledonia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, etc.
- 10. Unless otherwise stated, all characteristics referenced in this publication relate to the week before the interview.
- 11. Further definitions of labour force and demographic classifications appearing in this publication are given in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

#### Results of the survey

- 12. Due to differences in the method of estimation used in this supplementary survey and that used in the labour force survey, there are some small variations between estimates in this publication and those in the corresponding issue of *The Labour Force*, Australia (6203.0).
- 13. The estimates in this publication refer to information collected in the survey month and, due to seasonal factors, may not be representative of other months of the year.

- 14. This publication contains only a summary of the results of the survey. A more detailed publication *Labour Force Status and Other Characteristics of Migrants* (6250.0) will be released as soon as possible, and further information is available on request.
- 15. A similar survey was conducted in March 1984 and the results were published in *Characteristics of Migrants Aged 18 Years and Over at Time of Arrival and Who Arrived After 1960, Australia, March 1984* (6250.0).

#### Discontinuities in the series

- 16. Estimates contained in this publication are based on a revised labour force questionnaire introduced in April 1986. Further information is contained in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0) and in an information paper Questionnaires Used in the Labour Force Survey (6232.0).
- 17. Occupations are classified according to the Australian Standard Classification of Occupations (ASCO) 1986 which was introduced in the August 1986 labour force survey.

#### Reliability of the estimates

- 18. Estimates in this publication are subject to two sources of error:
  - (a) sampling error: since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they may differ from those which would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error. More information about this topic is contained in The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0). A table of estimated standard errors for this survey follows these notes. Estimates with a standard error of more than about 25 per cent have not been shown in this publication, as the degree of sampling error would seriously detract from their value for most reasonable uses. Although, in some cases, estimates for these small components can be derived by subtraction they should not be regarded as reliable.
  - (b) non-sampling error: inaccuracies may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents, and errors made in coding and processing data. These inaccuracies may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.
