### **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

### Introduction

This publication contains the results of a sample survey of weekly earnings and hours which was conducted in respect of the pay-period which included 20 October 1980. Some comparative figures are also shown for October 1975 to 1980. (See Table 10.) Preliminary estimates were published in *Earnings and Hours of Employees, October 1980 (Preliminary)*(6303.0) issued on 23 January 1981.

2. In general, where an establishment was closed down for part or the whole of the specified pay-period, or operations were seriously curtailed by an industrial dispute, breakdown, fire, etc., the employer was asked to supply particulars of earnings and hours for the previous normal pay-period. A copy of the form used in the 1980 survey is shown on page 4.

# Scope

- 3. All wage and salary earners were represented except—
  - (a) members of the permanent defence forces,
  - (b) employees in agriculture,
  - (c) employees in private households employing staff,
  - (d) waterside workers employed on a casual basis,
  - (e) employees on workers compensation,
  - (f) persons employed by private employers (other than hospitals) not subject to payroll tax.

All hospitals and government departments and authorities, whether subject to payroll tax or not, were represented in the survey, but other exempt non-government bodies, such as religious and benevolent institutions, were excluded. At the time of the selection of the sample, payroll tax was payable by employers paying in wages and salaries more than \$150,000 a year in Queensland and the Northern Territory, more than \$84,000 a year in Victoria, more than \$72,000 a year in New South Wales, South Australia, Western Australian

and the Australian Capital Territory and more than \$60,000 a year in Tasmania. It should be noted that changes in payroll tax exemption levels may affect the comparability of survey results for different years. (See paragraph 8.)

### Coverage

4. The survey covered stratified random samples of government departments and authorities, non-government hospitals not subject to payroll tax and other private employers subject to payroll tax.

# Survey design

5. Although the sample was not designed to provide estimates of the numbers of employees represented, it has been calculated that the survey was representative of approximately 2,708,000 male and 1,480,000 female wage and salary earners, of whom 1,754,000 males and 940,000 females were in private employment. The approximate percentages of employees by category are shown in the table below.

# Reliability of the estimates

6. Since the estimates are based on information obtained from a sample of employers they are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all employers had been included in the survey. The extent of the detail published has been determined after considering estimated measures of sampling variability. For more details on the reliability of the estimates see the Technical note.

# Industry classification

7. Industry is classified according to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC) described in Australian Standard Industrial Classification (Preliminary Edition) 1969, Vol. 1. The table on page 2 shows details of the ASIC sub-divisions used in the survey and abbreviated descriptions used in some tables.

# Comparability of results

8. For a number of reasons the estimates of earnings and hours in this publication may not be strictly comparable with those from earlier surveys. Surveys in years before 1972 covered only private employees, and from 1974 the industry estimates have been based on the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC). In addition, the private sector sample is selected from payroll taxpayers, and increases in payroll tax exemption levels, particularly since 1976, have resulted in the exclusion of more of the smaller businesses, whose employees generally have slightly lower average earnings.

### **Definitions**

- 9. Employees refers to male and female wage and salary earners who received pay for the pay-period which included 20 October 1980. (See paragraph 3, page 1.)
- 10. Private employees are employees of private employers subject to payroll tax and employees of nongovernment hospitals not subject to payroll tax.
- 11. Adult employees comprise all employees 21 years of age and over, and employees under 21 years of age who are paid at the adult rate for their occupation. Junior employees are all other employees under 21 years of age.
- 12. Full-time employees are those employees who ordinarily worked 30 hours or more a week. Included are full-time employees on short-time, full-time employees who began or ceased work during the pay-period, and full-time employees on paid annual leave, paid sick leave,

- long-service leave and paid holidays taken during the specified pay-period. Some employees (e.g. air crews, teachers, university lecturers), although paid for a weekly attendance of less than 30 hours, were classified as full-time if they worked the normal scheduled hours for a full-week.
- 13. Part-time employees are those employees who ordinarily worked less than 30 hours a week. Employees on short-time who normally worked 30 hours or more a week were classified as full-time employees.
- 14. Non-managerial employees were defined to include minor supervisory employees, leading hands, clerical and office staff as well as ordinary wages employees. They exclude managerial, executive, professional and higher supervisory staff, generally defined as those employees (a) who were ineligible to receive payment for overtime, or (b) who, although subject to payment for overtime, were in charge of a significant number of employees in a separate establishment (or establishments). The basis of allocation of employees to these two categories may have varied between individual private employers and between employers in the private and government sectors, with consequent effects on survey results. For some occupations in government employment, such as school teachers and doctors, there is no general payment for overtime. In these cases, managerial, etc. staff were determined according to the degree of supervision exercised or in relation to the pay structure of associated administrative employees.

- 15. Weekly earnings refers to gross earnings before taxation and other deductions have been made. It comprises overtime earnings (see paragraph 16) and ordinary time earnings (see paragraph 17). Where payments are made other than on a weekly basis, e.g. salary paid fortnightly or monthly; paid annual or other leave taken during the specified pay period; periodical payments under incentive, piece-work, profit-sharing, etc. schemes; commissions; annual or periodical bonuses; etc., one week's proportion of such payments are included. Retrospective payments are excluded.
- 16. Overtime earnings refers to that part of gross weekly earnings (as defined above) attributable to hours paid for in excess of award, standard or agreed hours of work. Overtime earnings were not reported for managerial, etc. staff.
- 17. Ordinary time earnings refers to that part of gross weekly earnings (as defined above) attributable to award, standard or agreed hours of work. Included in relation to these hours are shift allowances, penalty rates, commissions, bonuses and incentive payments, and one week's proportion of payments for annual and other leave taken during the specified pay-period.
- 18. Weekly hours paid for refers to the hours for which payment was made. It comprises overtime hours (see paragraph 19) and ordinary time hours (see paragraph 20). For employees paid other than weekly, hours were converted to a weekly basis. For employees who began or ceased work, or were absent without pay for any reason during the specified pay-period, only the hours actually paid for were included. Where agreed hours of work were less than award hours, hours were based on agreed hours. Hours of work were not reported for managerial, etc. staff.
- 19. Overtime hours refers to hours in excess of award, standard or agreed hours of work.
- 20. Ordinary time hours refers to award, standard or agreed hours of work. It includes stand-by or reporting time which are part of standard hours of work, and that part of paid annual leave, paid sick leave and long service leave taken during the specified pay-period.

### TECHNICAL NOTE

### Introduction

Since the estimates in this publication are based on information obtained from a sample of employers they are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all employers had been included in the survey. The extent of the detail published has been determined after considering estimated measures of sampling variability.

# Reliability of the estimates

- 2. One measure of the sampling variability is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of employers was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained, had all employers been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- 3. Another measure of the sampling error is the *relative* standard error, which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate. The table below sets out approximate relative standard errors for a selection of average weekly earnings estimates.
- 4. An example of the use of this table is as follows: the estimate of average weekly earnings for adult male full-time non-managerial employees (all industries) in Australia is shown in table 5 as \$274.10. The approximate relative standard error of this estimate is 0.3 per cent (or approximately \$0.80 rounded to the nearest ten cents). There are two chances in three that a complete collection would give a figure within the range \$273.30 to \$274.90 and nineteen chances in twenty that the figure would be within the range \$272.50 to \$275.70.

- 5. Estimates with a relative standard error greater than 15 per cent have not been included in this publication, except for estimates of overtime earnings and hours. Estimates of overtime earnings and hours are included where the standard error is less than \$1 or 0.5 hours and the relative standard error is not more than 20%.
- 6. The relative standard errors of the estimates of average weekly overtime earnings and hours, and of average weekly earnings and hours for part-time employees, are generally less than 10 per cent. Those relating to the private sector only are generally slightly higher than those for the private and government sectors combined.
- 7. The relative standard errors of average weekly ordinary time hours and average weekly total hours are generally much lower than the corresponding figures shown in the table for average weekly ordinary time earnings and average weekly total earnings. In the case of average weekly overtime hours, the standard error percentages approximate those shown for average weekly overtime earnings.
- 8. Relative standard errors for differences in estimates of average weekly earnings and hours from the 1980 survey to the previous year's survey are approximately one and a half times the relative standard errors of the 1980 estimates.
- 9. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the *non-sampling error*, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Efforts are made to reduce the non-sampling error by careful design of questionnaire and detailed checking of completed returns.
