## MAIN FEATURES

Note: Survey estimates are subject to sampling variability, as explained in paragraphs 8 to 10 below. Standard errors of estimates and of movements are shown in the tables.

In September 1981 the estimated number of unemployed persons looking for full-time work was 329,800, representing 5.8 per cent of the full-time labour force.

The number aged 15-19 years looking for their first full-time job was 36,700.

An estimated 63,300 persons were looking for parttime work, representing 5.7 per cent of the parttime labour force.

## **EXPLANATORY NOTES**

#### Introduction

This publication contains preliminary unemployment estimates derived from the monthly population survey. It is generally released in the third week following completion of the interviews. (See paragraph 2.) More detailed estimates are published in The Labour Force, Australia (Preliminary) (6202.0) and The Labour Force, Australia (6203.0).

## The population survey

The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 30,000 houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.), and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers. The interviews are generally conducted during the two weeks beginning on the Monday between the 6th and 12th of each month. Because of operational problems arising from the Christmas and New Year holidays the December 1978 and 1979 surveys commenced a week earlier than usual (with most interviews being conducted during the second week) and the January 1979 and 1980 surveys commenced a week later than usual. The information obtained relates to the week before the interview (i.e. the survey week).

## **Definitions**

- For purposes of the survey, unemployed persons are those aged 15 years and over who were not employed during the survey week and:
  - (a) had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week and:
    - (i) were available for work in the survey week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the survey week);
    - (ii) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the survey week and would have started in the survey week if the job had been available then;
  - or (b) were waiting to be called back to a full-time or part-time job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week (including the whole of the survey week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

This definition of unemployed persons conforms closely to that recommended by the Eighth International Conference of Labour Statisticians (1954).

- Unemployed persons looking for first job are those who had never worked for two weeks or more in a fulltime job.
- The unemployment rate for any group is the number unemployed expressed as a percentage of the labour force (i.e. employed plus unemployed) in the same group.

#### Revision of series

Estimates back to August 1966 on a basis comparable with those in this publication were published in the 1978 issue of The Labour Force, Australia (6204.0).

# Comparability of series

Since the introduction of monthly surveys in February 1978 the interviews have been conducted during a two-week period, whereas formerly the period was four weeks. This change of timing may affect the level of the figures for any month, but particularly for months during which unemployment may be changing rapidly.

## Reliability of the estimates

- 8. Since the survey estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they, and the movements derived from them, are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ by chance from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.
- 9. Detailed information on standard errors of the estimates and of movements in the estimates is published in current issues of *The Labour Force*, Australia (6203.0).
- 10. Standard errors of unemployment estimates for the latest month and of estimates of movements since the previous month are contained in the tables. Examples of the use of these two sets of standard errors are given below.
  - (a) The estimate of 329,800 unemployed persons looking for fuil-time work in September 1981 has a standard error of about 6,200 and therefore there are about two chances in three that the number that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey will be within the range 323,600 to 336,000 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the number will be within the range 317,400 to 342,200.
  - (b) The estimate of movement in the number of unemployed persons looking for full-time work from August to September 1981 is an increase of 8,900. The standard error of this estimate of movement is about 5,000 and therefore there are about two chances in three that if all dwellings had been included in the survey the movement would have been within the range +3,900 to +13,900 and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would have been within the range -1,100 to +18,900.

#### Seasonal adjustment

11. The move to the higher level of unemployment since 1974 appears to have been accompanied by shifts in the pattern of seasonal variation. For this reason the publication of seasonally adjusted quarterly figures of unemployment has been suspended. The matter will be kept under review. Calculation of seasonally adjusted monthly figures is not yet possible.
