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MAIN FEATURES

Note: Survey estimates are subject to sampling variability, as explained in paragraphs 8 to 10 below. Standard errors of estimates and of movements are shown in the tables.

For the January 1983 and future surveys it is planned that preliminary estimates of employed persons and persons not in the labour force together with preliminary estimates of unemployment will be published in a single publication, The Labour Force, Australia, Preliminary Estimates (6202.0). The release date for this revised publication will be the same as that for the discontinued preliminary unemployment publication.

In December 1982 the estimated number of unemployed persons was 672,200 of whom 583,700 were looking for full-time work and 88,500 were looking for part-time work. The unemployment rate was 9.5 per cent.

A little over half of the increase in unemployed looking for full-time work were persons aged 15-19 looking for their first job.

In seasonally adjusted terms, the number unemployed increased 40,700 between November and December. The unemployment rate increased from 8.7 per cent to 9.2 per cent.

Between December 1981 and December 1982 the number of unemployed persons increased by 238,900 (or by 3.2 percentage points). In this period those looking for fulltime work increased by 225,000. Of these 37,700 were aged 15 to 19, and 187,300 were aged 20 and over.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This publication contains preliminary unemployment estimates derived from the monthly population survey. It is generally released in the third week following completion of the interviews. (See paragraph 2.) More detailed estimates are published in *The Labour Force, Australia (Preliminary)* (6202.0) and *The Labour Force, Australia* (6203.0).

The population survey

2. The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (about 30,000 houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.), and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. The information is obtained from the occupants of selected dwellings by carefully chosen and specially trained interviewers. The interviews are generally conducted during the two weeks beginning on the Monday between the 6th and 12th of each month. The information obtained relates to the week before the interview (i.e. the survey week).

Definitions

3. For the purposes of the survey, *unemployed persons* are those aged 15 years and over who were not employed during the survey week and:

- (a) had actively looked for full-time or part-time work at any time in the four weeks up to the end of the survey week and:
 - (i) were available for work in the survey week, or would have been available except for temporary illness (i.e. lasting for less than four weeks to the end of the survey week); or
 - (ii) were waiting to start a new job within four weeks from the end of the survey week and would have started in the survey week if the job had been available then;
- or (b) were waiting to be called back to a full-time or parttime job from which they had been stood down without pay for less than four weeks up to the end of the survey week (including the whole of the survey week) for reasons other than bad weather or plant breakdown.

This definition of unemployed persons conforms closely to that recommended by the International Labour Organisation (ILO).

4. Unemployed persons looking for first job are those who had never worked full-time for two weeks or more.

5. The *unemployment rate* for any group is the number unemployed expressed as a percentage of the labour force (i.e. employed plus unemployed) in the same group.

Earlier estimates

6. Estimates back to August 1966 on a basis comparable with those in this publication are published in *The Labour Force, Australia* (6204.0) beginning with the 1978 issue.

Comparability of series

7. Since the introduction of monthly surveys in February 1978 the interviews have been conducted during a two-week period, whereas formerly the period was four weeks. This change of timing may affect the level of the figures for any month, but particularly for months during which unemployment may be changing rapidly.

Reliability of the estimates

8. Since the survey estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings they, and the movements derived from them, are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ by chance from the figures that would have been produced if all dwellings had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.

Because of the introduction of the new sample of dwellings 9. in October, there was not the usually high proportion of dwellings common to each of two consecutive surveys and the standard errors of movements between September and October are therefore higher than normal. For details see the October 1982 issue of The Labour Force, Australia (Preliminary) (6202.0).

10. Standard errors of unemployment estimates for the latest month and of estimates of movements since the previous month are contained in the tables. Examples of the use of these two sets of standard errors are given below.

- (a) The estimate of 583,700 unemployed persons looking for full-time work in December 1982 has a standard error of about 7,600 and therefore there are about two chances in three that the number that would have been obtained if all dwellings had been included in the survey will be within the range 576,100 to 591,300 and about nineteen chances in twenty that the number will be within the range 568,500 to 598,900.
- (b) The estimate of movement in the number of unemployed persons looking for full-time work from November to December 1982 is an increase of 99,800. The standard error of this estimate of movement is about 5,900 and therefore there are about two chances in three that if all dwellings had been included in the survey the movement would have been within the range +93,900 to +105,700 and about nineteen chances in twenty that it would have been within the range +88,000 to +111,600.

Seasonal adjustment

This publication contains seasonally adjusted estimates of 11. the unemployment series for the latest months. Information about the method of seasonal adjustment used and seasonally adjusted figures for all months since February 1978 for the major labour force series which are published in seasonally adjusted form are contained in an appendix to The Labour Force, Australia, February 1982 (6203.0).

12. The seasonal adjustment factors have been calculated on the basis of four years of monthly data. This is a relatively short series of data on which to base the calculation of seasonal factors, particularly when the pattern of movement is varying from year to year. This effect is particularly marked in the unemployment figures. As happens with all seasonally adjusted series, the seasonal factors will be reviewed annually. Each additional year's figures will cause the factors to be revised; it follows that the seasonally adjusted figures in this publication are certain to be revised. When interpreting trends based on seasonally adjusted series, it should always be borne in mind that seasonally adjusted figures by their nature will be revised when later information is used in calculating the seasonal factors.
