CONSUMER PRICE INDEX - SEPTEMBER QUARTER 1971

Reference No. 9 1

Variations in retail prices as measured by the Consumer Price Index for the six State capital cities and Canberra are shown herein. The "Supplement to the Consumer Price Index - Particulars for Sub-groups and Special Groupings", previously published under Reference Number 9.7, has been incorporated in this bulletin from this quarter onwards - see Table 3.

- 2. Compared with the previous quarter, the All Groups Consumer Price Index for September Quarter 1971 increased by 1.7% for the weighted average of the six State capital cities. Changes in individual cities were: Sydney +2.6%, Melbourne +1.1%, Brisbane +1.5%, Adelaide +1.0%, Perth +0.7%, Hobart +1.1%, Canberra +1.0%
- Recent quarterly changes in the All Groups index have been as follows:

4. The All Groups index number for the weighted average of the six State capital cities increased by 6.5% between September Quarter 1970 and September Quarter 1971. Recent quarterly changes in each of the groups of this index have been as follows:

- 5. A detailed description of the Consumer Price Index is contained in Labour Report No. 54, 1968 and 1969.
- 6. The Consumer Price Index measures quarterly variations in prices of commodities and services as affecting a high proportion of the expenditure of wage-earner households in the aggregate. Changes in the pattern of this expenditure since 1950 have been such as to render it necessary to construct the index with additional items and changes in weighting patterns at intervals (rather than on the basis of a list of items and set of weights which remained unchanged throughout the period). Six series for short periods, viz., September Quarter 1948 to June Quarter 1952; June Quarter 1952 to June Quarter 1956; June Quarter 1956 to March Quarter 1960; March Quarter 1960 to December Quarter 1963; December Quarter 1963 to December Quarter 1968; and from December Quarter 1968 have therefore been constructed and linked to form a continuous retail price index series published herein as the Consumer Price Index. At times of linking the weighting pattern was altered and, in addition, new items (mainly ones that had become significant in household expenditure) were introduced. In each period between links the items and weighting have remained unchanged.
- 7. The quarterly prices for food items used in the index are the averages of prices normally collected as at the middle of each of the three months of the quarter. However, for potatoes and for onions from December quarter 1968, weekly prices are averaged to arrive at monthly prices. Prices of all non-food items are collected at regular quarterly intervals (or at annual intervals with items such as local government rates and seasonal clothing) normally as at the middle of the mid-month of each quarter. However, for furniture, major household appliances and motoring items (other than motor car) the collection is made during the first month of each quarter to facilitate field collection arrangements.
- 8. The indexes measure price movements in each city individually. They do not provide a comparison of the retail price level in any city with the retail price level of any other city.
- 9. Table 1 on page 5 of this Bulletin shows Consumer Price Index numbers for each fiscal year from 1961-62 to 1970-71 and for each quarter from June Quarter 1967. Table 2 on pages 6 and 7 shows Group Index numbers quarterly from June Quarter 1969 to September Quarter 1971.
- 10. Table 3 on page 8 shows index numbers for June quarter 1971 and September quarter 1971 for groups and sub-groups of the index and for some special groupings. It also contains information of contributions by index sub-groups to the total index in terms of All Groups Index Points for these two quarters. Corresponding particulars for previous quarters were contained in previous statistical bulletins "Consumer Price Index Particulars for Sub-groups and Special Groupings" (Reference No. 9.7).
- 11. Users of figures in Table 3 should bear in mind that the Consumer Price Index is designed to measure the proportionate change in retail prices as combined in the five major groups and more particularly the total of the groups. For sub-groups or particular items, the index does not necessarily provide comprehensive and valid measures of price changes in those particular fields. Nor does it necessarily measure the relative influences of those classes of items in aggregate variations in prices. The Consumer Price Index is essentially a combination of selected items under various headings and not a dissection of total household expenditure into its component parts.

- 12. Major changes in the composition of the sub-group indexes published in Table 3 resulting from the latest link in the Consumer Price Index (December quarter 1968), have been indicated in the footnotes on page 9. The old and new combinations have been linked to provide continuous series of index numbers across this point of time (December quarter 1968), but it should be remembered that all sub-groupings were affected by changes at the link and some significantly so. Each series of index numbers links the average price movement shown by one combination of items up to December quarter 1968 to that shown by a different combination from December quarter 1968.
- Movements of the indexes from one date to another are usually expressed as percentage changes rather than changes in the "index points" because "index point" changes are affected by the level of the index in relation to its base period while percentage changes are not. In this bulletin details are given in terms of percentage changes in paragraphs 2, 3 and 4. However, the analysis in paragraph 14 shows movements in terms of All Groups "index points". This analysis shows the contribution of selected items and of the five groups to movements in the total indexes. Table 3 on page 8 shows movements expressed as both percentage changes and changes in "index points". The following example illustrates the computation of "index point" and percentage changes:

15. A summary of the movements of the various group indexes, together with the main quarterly price changes which affected the index between June Quarter 1971 and September Quarter 1971 is shown below:

Food Group. Changes in meat and potato prices are frequently the major cause of movements in the total index and disparate movements between cities. The effects of changes in the prices of these items in each city for this quarter are shown in the table on page 3.

The price of butter increased in all capital cities, the price of bread in three capital cities and the price of fresh milk in two capital cities. The price of eggs decreased in five capital cities.

The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities showed an overall quarterly increase of 1.1%.

Clothing and Drapery Group. The index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities showed a quarterly increase of 0.5%.

Housing Group. Local government rates and charges increased in Brisbane. There were increases in all State capital cities in all other sections of the group. In Canberra, for privately owned houses, the effect of increases in local government rates and charges in this quarter was more than offset by discontinuation of collection of land rent as from 1 January 1971.

The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities showed a quarterly increase of 1.6%.

Household Supplies and Equipment Group. The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities showed a quarterly increase of 0.2%.

Miscellaneous Group. Prices of hospital services increased in four cities and those of medical services increased in all cities. Fares increased in Sydney and Brisbane. There were increases in the prices of motor cars and motor repairs in all capital cities and a decrease in the price of petrol in Melbourne. Motor registration fees increased in Adelaide. There were increases in the price of newspapers in Perth, and of beer in Perth and Hobart.

The group index for the weighted average of the six State capital cities showed a quarterly increase of 3.6%.
