

#### KEY POINTS

#### BALANCE ON GOODS AND SERVICES

FIGURES

- In trend terms, the *balance on goods and services* was a deficit of \$1,547m in October 2014, a decrease of \$82m (5%) on the deficit in September 2014.
- In seasonally adjusted terms, the *balance on goods and services* was a deficit of \$1,323m in October 2014, a decrease of \$912m (41%) on the deficit in September 2014.

#### CREDITS (EXPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES)

 In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services credits rose \$409m (2%) to \$26,904m. Non-rural goods rose \$700m (4%). Non-monetary gold fell \$204m (13%), rural goods fell \$115m (4%) and net exports of goods under merchanting fell \$7m (70%). Services credits rose \$35m (1%).

#### DEBITS (IMPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES)

 In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services debits fell \$503m (2%) to \$28,227m. Intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$371m (4%), consumption goods fell \$95m (1%), capital goods fell \$43m (1%) and non-monetary gold fell \$34m (9%). Services debits rose \$39m (1%).

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## REVISIONS

REVISIONS

The following goods and services debits components have been revised since the release of the September 2014 issue of *International Trade in Goods and Services, Australia* (cat. no. 5368.0):

- capital goods n.e.s. component of goods debits series, revised back to July 2014
- legal, accounting, management consulting, public relations and other professional services component of services debits, revised back to July 2014
- architectural, engineering and other technical services component of services debits, revised back to July 2014.

Data in this issue aligns with the data in the September quarter 2014 issues of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0) released on 2 December 2014 and *Australian National Accounts: National Income, Expenditure and Product* (cat. no. 5206.0) released on 3 December 2014.

Table 17 summarises revisions to goods and services on a balance of payments basis, in original current price terms, since the last issue of this publication. In original terms the revisions have decreased the deficit on goods and services for the three months to September 2014 by \$111m.

## CHANGES IN THIS AND FORTHCOMING ISSUES

CHANGES IN THIS ISSUE Amendment to time series spreadsheet tables 12b and 13b

Australia's major trading partners

From this issue, the component 'Commodities and transactions not included in Merchandise Trade' (SITC 999) has been removed from time series spreadsheet tables 12b and 13b of this publication. This change has been made to minimise the potential for confusion with nil merchandise trade for this component for all time periods.

Information on Australia's major trading partners (top 10 countries) for the financial year 2013–14 has been included in this issue. This coincides with the release of data cubes in the *International Trade in Services by Country, by State and by Detailed Services Category, Financial Year, 2013–14* (cat. no. 5368.0.55.003).

### CHANGES IN FORTHCOMING ISSUES Changes to the AHECC

Statistical codes in the *Australian Harmonized Export Commodity Classification* (*AHECC*) – *Electronic Publication, Jan 2012* (cat. no. 1233.0) have been revised with new codes coming into effect on 1 January 2015. The changes result from the introduction of new statistical codes in Chapter 28 regarding radioactive elements and isotopes and how they relate to the Customs (Prohibited Exports) Regulations 1958. The changes will not impact directly on the presentation of statistics in ABS publications but will impact on detailed export statistics available on request.

## VALUE ADJUSTMENTS

#### VALUE ADJUSTMENTS

International merchandise trade exports data presented in tables 12–15 of this publication are based on information provided by exporters to the *Australian Customs and Border Protection Service* (Customs and Border Protection). At the time of initial reporting to Customs and Border Protection, quantity and unit price information may be estimated for commodities such as iron ore and coal. Final quantity and/or unit price information is updated progressively in merchandise trade data as exporters revise the information provided to Customs and Border Protection. When additional information on quantity and/or unit price for these commodities is available, the ABS may adjust the balance of payments series in current price, original terms to reflect actual transaction values.

In most instances, transfer of ownership occurs when goods cross the customs frontier. In certain circumstances the ownership of large value capital expenditure items can occur prior to the items crossing the customs frontier. The ABS may adjust the relevant balance of payments series to record the timing when transfer of ownership was effected.

#### Goods credits

#### Iron ore and coal (in original terms)

- a negative adjustment of \$1,200m has been applied to the metal ores and minerals component in the balance of payments series for October 2014. This adjustment takes into account additional information on the unit value of iron ore exports. To maintain consistency with the September quarter 2014 issue of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0) released on 2 December 2014, previous negative adjustments of \$110m and \$1,400m have remained for August and September 2014, respectively.
  - In the international merchandise trade series, the unit value of metal ores and minerals fell 5% between August and September 2014 and rose 15% between September and October 2014.
  - In the balance of payments series, the unit price of metal ores and minerals fell
     5% between August and September 2014 and fell 1% between September and
     October 2014.
- a negative adjustment of \$150m has been applied to the coal, coke and briquettes component in the balance of payments series for October 2014. This adjustment takes into account additional information on the unit value of hard coking and semi–soft coal exports. To maintain consistency with the September quarter 2014 issue of *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0) released on 2 December 2014, previous negative adjustments of \$170m and \$180m have remained for August and September 2014, respectively.
  - In the international merchandise trade series, the unit value of coal, coke and briquettes rose 5% between August and September 2014 and rose 3% between September and October 2014.
  - In the balance of payments series, the unit value of coal, coke and briquettes rose 1% between August and September 2014 and rose 4% between September and October 2014.

 capital goods n.e.s. includes an estimate of expenditure on capital goods that have changed ownership but have not yet crossed the customs frontier.



	In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services credits rose \$409m (2%) to \$26,904m. Non–rural goods rose \$700m (4%). Non–monetary gold fell \$204m (13%), rural goods fell \$115m (4%) and net exports of goods under merchanting fell \$7m (70%). Services credits rose \$35m (1%).

#### RURAL GOODS

In trend terms, exports of rural goods fell \$5m to \$3,226m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of rural goods fell \$115m (4%) to \$3,156m.

The main components contributing to the fall in seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- cereal grains and cereal preparations, down \$97m (15%)
- other rural, down \$47m (4%).

Partly offsetting these falls was meat and meat preparations, up \$56m (5%).

Exports of goods continued

#### NON-RURAL GOODS

In trend terms, exports of non-rural goods rose \$30m to \$16,957m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, exports of non-rural goods rose \$700m (4%) to \$17,390m.

The main components contributing to the rise in seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- metal ores and minerals, up \$294m (4%)
- metals (excl. non-monetary gold), up \$184m (20%)
- coal, coke and briquettes, up \$97m (3%).

#### NET EXPORTS OF GOODS UNDER MERCHANTING

In trend terms, net exports of goods under merchanting remained steady at \$7m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, net exports of goods under merchanting fell \$7m (70%) to \$3m.


#### NON-MONETARY GOLD

In trend terms, exports of non-monetary gold rose \$71 (6%) to \$1,357m.

In original and seasonally adjusted terms, exports of non-monetary gold fell \$204m (13%) to \$1,351m.

Exports of services

#### SERVICES CREDITS



In trend terms, services credits rose \$22m to \$4,976m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, services credits rose \$35m (1%) to \$5,004m. The main component contributing to the rise in services credits was travel, up \$23m (1%).

In seasonally adjusted terms, tourism related services credits rose \$23m (1%) to \$3,237m.



### IMPORTS OF GOODS AND SERVICES

Between September and October 2014, the trend estimate of goods and services debits rose \$37m to \$28,071m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, goods and services debits fell \$503m (2%) to \$28,227m. Intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$371m (4%), consumption goods fell \$95m (1%), capital goods fell \$43m (1%) and non–monetary gold fell \$34m (9%). Services debits rose \$39m (1%).

#### CONSUMPTION GOODS

In trend terms, imports of consumption goods rose \$16m to \$6,918m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of consumption goods fell \$95m (1%) to \$6,913m.

The main component contributing to the fall in seasonally adjusted estimates was non–industrial transport equipment, down \$112m (7%).

Partly offsetting this fall was textiles, clothing and footwear, up \$21m (2%).

#### CAPITAL GOODS

In trend terms, imports of capital goods rose \$40m (1%) to \$5,323m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of capital goods fell \$43m (1%) to \$5,410m.

The main components contributing to the fall in seasonally adjusted estimates were:

- civil aircraft and confidentialised items, down \$391m (53%)
- machinery and industrial equipment, down \$178m (9%).

Partly offsetting these falls was capital goods n.e.s., up \$492m (72%).

#### INTERMEDIATE AND OTHER MERCHANDISE GOODS

In trend terms, imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$24m to \$9,728m.

In seasonally adjusted terms, imports of intermediate and other merchandise goods fell \$371m (4%) to \$9,728m.

The main component contributing to the fall in seasonally adjusted estimates was fuels and lubricants, down \$407m (11%).

Partly offsetting this fall was parts for transport equipment, up \$46m (5%).



On an international merchandise trade basis, in original terms (noting the footnote in the above table), between September and October 2014 the largest movements recorded for the following selected commodities were:

Iron ore lump rose \$19m (2%), with quantities down 7% and unit values up 10%. Exports to:

- China (excluding SARs and Taiwan) rose \$61m (8%), with quantities down 6% and unit values up 15%
- the Republic of Korea rose \$13m (21%), with quantities up 12% and unit values up 8%
- Taiwan rose \$12m (20%), with quantities up 19% and unit values up 1%.

Partly offsetting these rises was exports to Japan, down \$63m (22%), with quantities down 21% and unit values down 1%.

Iron ore fines rose \$1,180m (32%), with quantities up 9% and unit values up 20%. Exports to China (excluding SARs and Taiwan) rose \$1,287m (44%), with quantities up 15% and unit values up 26%.

Partly offsetting this rise was exports to Japan, down \$76m (18%), with quantities down 18%.

Hard coking coal rose \$74m (6%), with quantities down 1% and unit values up 7%. Exports to:

- China (excluding SARs and Taiwan) rose \$64m (17%), with quantities up 9% and unit values up 7%
- the Netherlands rose \$45m (68%), with quantities up 63% and unit values up 4%.

Partly offsetting these rises was exports to India, down \$34m (11%), with quantities down 18% and unit values up 9%.

Semi–soft coal rose \$1m, with quantities down 3% and unit values up 3%. Exports to:

- Japan rose \$39m (31%), with quantities up 26% and unit values up 4%
- China (excluding SARs and Taiwan) rose \$18m (15%), with quantities up 12% and unit values up 3%.

Partly offsetting these rises was exports to the Republic of Korea, down \$56m (39%), with quantities down 40% and unit values up 1%.


Thermal coal fell \$9m (1%), with quantities up 1% and unit values down 1%. Exports to Japan fell \$106m (19%), with quantities down 18%.






#### COUNTRY BREAKDOWN

The following charts show Australia's major trading partners for the financial year 2013–14. The charts include both trade in goods (on an international merchandise trade basis) and trade in services (on a balance of payments basis). The first chart shows the countries with the largest two–way trade, i.e., combined trade in both exports and imports of goods and services. The second chart shows total exports and total imports for each of these countries.









Combining trade in goods (on an international merchandise trade basis) and trade in services (on a balance of payments basis) provides a good approximation of total trade. Some components will be excluded (e.g. merchanting credits and goods procured in ports by carriers debits) while the manufacturing services on physical inputs owned by others component, will be double counted. These components are unlikely to impact on the broader analysis.

Exports data with the confidentiality restrictions 'no commodity details' or 'no value details' are now being excluded from the individual country and included in 'no country details' in the detailed breakdown in the time series spreadsheet table 14a. In 2013–14, these restrictions represented 2.08% of the total exports value. However, this figure does

vary across individual countries. In table 14 of this publication, the 'no country details' data is included in 'other countries'.

Imports data with the confidentiality restrictions 'no commodity details' or 'no value details' are excluded from the individual country and included in 'no country details' in the detailed breakdown presented in the time series spreadsheet table 14b. In 2013–14, these restrictions represented 2.30% of the total imports value. However, this figure does vary across individual countries. In table 14 of this publication, the 'no country details' data is included in 'other countries'.

#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### INTRODUCTION

**1** This publication presents preliminary estimates of Australia's international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis (tables 1–11 and 17) and merchandise import and export statistics on an international merchandise trade basis (tables 12–15). In addition, table 16 Exchange rates and trade–weighted indexes (TWI) are derived by using exchange rates and indexes provided by the Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA). As of December 2011 the RBA has changed the methodology for compiling the TWI to include both merchandise and services trade, rather than merchandise trade only. This takes advantage of country–level services trade data that have been published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS).

**2** Merchandise trade statistics on an international merchandise trade basis are compiled from information submitted by exporters and importers or their agents to the *Australian Customs and Border Protection Service* (Customs and Border Protection). Adjustments for coverage, timing and valuation are made to international merchandise trade data to convert them to a balance of payments basis. The services data are sourced from the quarterly Survey of International Trade in Services and a range of administrative data and indicator series.

**3** More comprehensive quarterly estimates of Australia's trade in goods and services, together with comprehensive details of Australia's balance of payments are included in the quarterly publication, *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia* (cat. no. 5302.0). Detailed monthly statistics on merchandise trade are available in time series spreadsheets on the ABS website or by subscription to tailored services. More information on the *International Trade in Services by Country, by State and by Detailed Services Category* are available on a financial year basis (cat. no. 5368.0.55.003) following the September issue of this publication and calendar year basis (cat. no. 5368.0.55.004) following the March issue of this publication.

CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND4 The conceptual framework used in compiling Australia's merchandise trade statisticsMETHODScan be found in International Merchandise Trade, Australia: Concepts, Sources and<br/>Methods, 2001 (cat. no. 5489.0).

**5** The conceptual framework used in compiling Australia's balance of payments statistics is based on the International Monetary Fund's *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position Manual, Sixth Edition* (BPM6). Descriptions of the underlying concepts and structure of the balance of payments and the sources, methods and terms used in compiling estimates are presented in the publication *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998* (cat. no. 5331.0). This version reflects the international standards prior to BPM6 and is currently being revised. The first part of the revised document was released on 8 March 2011, featuring only the Goods Account. Other components will be released as they become available. Further information on the key changes introduced with BPM6 can be found in the *Information paper: Implementation of new international statistical standards in the ABS National and International Accounts, September 2009* (cat. no. 5310.0.55.002).

**6** To bring merchandise trade statistics on an international merchandise trade basis to a balance of payments basis, timing adjustments are made to ensure that the transaction is recorded in the period in which ownership changed, rather than in the period in which the transaction was recorded by Customs and Border Protection or the period in which the goods arrived in/departed from an Australian port. Adjustments are also made to account for the change of ownership of goods not included in merchandise trade statistics. Chapter 6 of the *Balance of Payments and International Investment Position, Australia: Concepts, Sources and Methods, 1998* (cat. no. 5331.0) provides more detail on the relationship between statistics on an international merchandise trade basis and on a balance of payments basis.

CONCEPTS, SOURCES AND METHODS <i>continued</i>	<b>7</b> International merchandise trade exports data presented for recent months in tables 12–15 of this publication are based on information initially reported by exporters to Customs and Border Protection. At the time of initial reporting to Customs and Border Protection the final prices may not be known for some commodities. Therefore, the information recorded for recent months for commodities like iron ore and coal can include a variety of prices including previous or current contract prices and the prevailing spot prices. Newly negotiated contract prices may not be fully reflected in the data first reported to Customs and Border Protection, and to compensate for this, the balance of payments series may reflect adjusted price levels.

SEASONALLY ADJUSTED AND	<b>16</b> The estimates of international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments

TREND ESTIMATES

**16** The estimates of international trade in goods and services on a balance of payments basis are seasonally adjusted, however the merchandise exports and imports statistics on an international merchandise trade basis are not. Monthly original estimates are volatile, being subject to calendar–related and large irregular influences. Seasonally adjusted estimates are derived by estimating and removing from the original series systematic calendar related effects, such as seasonal (e.g. Christmas), trading day and moving holiday (e.g. Easter) influences. Seasonal adjustment does not aim to remove the irregular or non–seasonal influences which may be present in any particular month. These irregular influences may reflect both random economic events and difficulties of statistical recording.

**17** The seasonally adjusted statistics in this publication use the concurrent seasonal adjustment technique and Autoregressive Integrated Moving Average (ARIMA) modelling to estimate factors for the current and previous months. Under concurrent seasonal adjustment, the estimates of seasonal factors are fine tuned as new or revised original estimates become available each period. The seasonally adjusted estimates are subject to revisions at each reference month as the estimates of seasonal factors are improved.

**18** ARIMA modelling relies on the characteristics of the series being analysed to project future period data. ARIMA modelling is used on a case–by–case basis where it results in reduced revisions to seasonally adjusted series when subsequent data becomes available. The projected values are temporary, intermediate values, that are only used internally to improve the estimation of the seasonal factors. The projected data do not affect the original estimates and are discarded at the end of the seasonal adjustment process. The ARIMA model is assessed as part of the annual review of each August issue of this publication with the majority of directly seasonally adjusted trade in goods and services time series using an ARIMA model.

**19** The month–to–month movements of the seasonally adjusted estimates may not be reliable indicators of underlying behaviour because they include irregular or non–seasonal movements. Trend estimates reduce the effect of these movements as they are derived by applying a 13–term Henderson moving average to the seasonally adjusted series. The 13–term Henderson moving average (like all Henderson averages) is symmetric, but as the end of a time series is approached, asymmetric forms of the average are applied. While the asymmetric weights enable trend estimates for recent months to be produced, it does result in revisions to the estimates for the most recent six months as additional observations become available. Revisions to trend estimates can also occur because of revisions to the original data and as a result of the re–estimation of the seasonal factors. Trend estimates should be used with caution, especially around the time of unusual influences, until these have been appropriately taken into account.

CONFIDENTIALITY OF MERCHANDISE TRADE STATISTICS are derived by extrapolating the last quarter's data by an average of movements for the same quarter over the previous four years, and then dividing the estimate by three. Noting estimates can be adjusted if additional information are available.

**26** The release of statistics for certain merchandise trade commodities is restricted in order to prevent the identification of the activities of an individual business, where this is requested by the business concerned. These restrictions do not affect the total value of exports and imports, but they can affect statistics at the country, state and commodity levels, and other details only available on request such as Australian ports. For information on the confidentiality restrictions applied to the merchandise trade statistics in this publication, refer to the current issue of *International Merchandise Trade: Confidential Commodities List (CCL)* (cat. no. 5372.0.55.001).

**27** Exports data that have the confidentiality restrictions 'No commodity details' or 'No value details' are now aggregated into a single confidential commodity code. For data prior to June 2013, these data are added back into the appropriate state total and country total (i.e. these totals show the correct level of trade). From June 2013 these confidential data are not added back. Instead the confidential data are published as 'No country details' in the country totals and 'State of origin not available' or 'State not available for publication' in the state totals. Therefore, country and state totals from June 2013 may not represent the actual amount of trade in each country/state but only the trade in commodities without a 'No commodity details' or 'No value details' restriction.

**28** Imports data that have the confidentiality restrictions 'No commodity details' or 'No value details' are aggregated into a single confidential commodity code. For data prior to September 2008, these data are added back into the appropriate state total and country total (i.e. these totals show the correct level of trade). From September 2008 these confidential data are not added back. Instead the confidential data are published as 'No country details' in the country totals and 'State of destination not available' or 'State not available for publication' in the state totals. Therefore, country and state totals from September 2008 may not represent the actual amount of trade in each country/state but only the trade in commodities without a 'No commodity details' or 'No value details' restriction.

**29** The tourism related services memorandum items provide timely indicators of the movements in tourism related activities, not an absolute measure of the level of these activities. The tourism related indicator has been derived by combining total travel services (business, education–related and other personal travel) and passenger transportation services (which includes agency fees and commissions for air transport).

SERVICES BY STATE AND BY**30** Annual services data by state, by country and detailed services are released twice<br/>yearly. Calendar year data are usually released following the March issue of this<br/>publication and financial year data are usually released following the September issue.<br/>Refer to Trade in Services data cubes under time series data for details.

**31** Services credits are classified by the state of provision, while services debits are classified by the state of consumption. The state allocations for transportation, travel, postal and courier, and telecommunication services are based on a number of indicators including merchandise trade statistics by state, overseas passenger arrivals and departures by state of clearance and data provided by the *Department of Immigration and Border Protection*. The allocation for other services (about 25% of all trade in services) is primarily based on the location of the business reporting the information, which serves as a proxy for the state of provision/consumption of that service. The data should be used with care but are considered suitable for analysis over time.
