The 2021 Census

Scale of the Census





Approximately **35,000 staff** staff to run the Census



Information available in
44 languages including Auslan



Census information collected from **25 million** people and **11 million** dwellings



Field staff travelled

10 million km



Our chatbot guided **375,000 conversations**



60 million pages of paper Census forms scanned



18 million visitors to the website



Mailed out 13.6 million items



Our call centre answered 645,000 calls



1,430 tonnes of fully recyclable paper



7 years from planning to final data release



9 months to print paper forms

Our journey to the 2021 Census



- Improving participation a high data quality priority for Census
- 2016 Census Independent Assurance Panel approaches need to be explored in consultation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.
- Centre of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Statistics (CoATSIS) role in Census
- Developments shaped with assistance of
 - ABS Round Table on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Statistics
 - Remote Expert Advisory Group & Remote Dress Rehearsal
 - Communications partners, user centered design workshops
- Collaborative development of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander brand




Urban

- Fill-in-the form sessions and Hubs
- Partnerships with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations
- Homeless/rough sleeper enumeration

Remote

- Travelling teams
- Interviewing using a tailored large factor paper form
- Recruitment of local Community Field officers
- Extended census period rather than census night








Percentage change in counts






Age distribution







Couple families






- Only husband/male partner is of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander origin





Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander ancestries



- The 2021 Census included new mark boxes for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander ancestries in the Ancestry question on the Census form (selfenumeration and online form), affecting how people responded compared to previous Censuses.
- Ancestry measures a place or cultural group often related to where a person's parents or grandparents were born and should not be used in place of Indigenous status in analysis of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander population.




Proportion of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people selecting an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander ancestry





Proportion of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders using an Indigenous language at home







Tenure type for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, 2011 and 2021








Tenure type for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, 2021 Census











Weekly rent




