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Background



The Census of Population and Housing provides a snapshot of Australia. It is one of the many ways that the ABS produces statistics.

The Census provides data for small areas and small populations.

Every Census, the ABS makes a recommendation to the Australian Government on the topics that could be included in the Census.

The next Census will take place in 2026.



930 data requests across topic themes:



Assessment criteria



Topics were assessed for public value:

1	The topic is of current national importance.
2	There is a need for data at the national level, and either the local level or for small population groups.
3	There is likely to be a continuing need for data on the topic following the Census.

Topics that rated the highest against the public value criteria were rated against criterion 4:

4 There are no other suitable alternative data sources or solutions that could meet the topic need.






Phase two consultation

- Potential Changes:
 - Ancestry and Ethnic identity
 - Language
 - Religious affiliation



Existing topics being considered for removal



Topic	Rationale
Number of children ever born	Propose moving to decennial collection.
Number of employees (employed by owner managers)	Alternative data sources may be able to meet data needs.
Number of motor vehicles	Alternative data sources may be able to meet data needs.
Unpaid work (domestic activities)	Alternative data sources may be able to meet data needs.

Phase two assessment



Information provided in phase two of the consultation will support us to finalise our assessment of public value.

We will assess shortlisted topics further on the feasibility of collecting the data in the Census. The criteria are:

5	Data on the topic can be collected efficiently.
6	A representative of the household would be willing and able to answer questions on the topic for each member of the household.

Not all topics considered during phase two consultation and review will proceed to testing.

Administrative data - Income



- Administrative data on income has been identified as a potential candidate to replace the existing income question on the 2026 Census form.
- On 15 August 2023, the ABS will release the Administrative Data Snapshot of Population and Housing (ADS) and open a four-month public consultation on the value of this type of data.
- Feedback on the use of administrative income data can be provided through the ADS consultation process.
- Feedback provided through the ADS consultation will be considered prior to making a recommendation to Government on the 2026 Census topics.
