- combining data from the 2006 Census with data from future censuses; and
- combining data from the 2001 Census with data from the 2006 Census.

Data would be brought together without using name and address, using statistical techniques. Name and address would be destroyed after census processing. The SLCD would be for statistical use only and no identifiable data would be released from the ABS.

Q9. What are your reasons?

(b) For quality studies and other particular statistical studies, the ABS proposes to consider the use of name and address information available at the time of census processing to bring together 2006 Population Census data with other selected datasets, namely ABS household surveys, birth and death register data, long-term immigration data and national disease register data.

EDUCATION:

As discussed with Paul Williams in his visit to MDA, greater emphasis on CALD community education in Queensland is needed to (1) promote the importance (and benefits to these communities) of answering the "ancestry" and "language other than English spoken at home" questions as an effective way of identifying communities previously invisible (statistically) due to

the Country of Birth not reflecting their identity correctly.

(2) In Queensland ensure that an education campaign of CALD communities takes place addressing issues around the integrity of the ABS in terms of - confidential information supplied -

the value of this data in terms of provision of services, planning and policy input etc -

CALD communities would particiapte more effectively in providing data if they understood what the ABS is, its prupose and the benefits to society and in particular for CALD communities. Case studies could be given to highlight the benefits.

Multicultural Affairs Queensland (Dept Premier and Cabinet) fund programs that may be able to advise the ABS on strategies to reach these communities i.e their "LAMP" program which works through local government and the "CAMS" program which works through NGO - not for profit community organisations.

DATA AVAILABILITY:

A possible explanation for the lack of research or use of data on small emerging CALD groups is (1) The common assumptions of accessing data on CALD communities through the "Country of Birth" instead of through other portal such as "Ancestry" or "Language other than English Spoken at home". (2) These smaller communities are not included in data that is available at no cost and this has been of a great disadvantage to these communities.
