


State growth rate








Where do migrants live?





Overseas-born population – Australia 1966-2016






























Median personal income






Housing costs – mortgage repayment

Mortgage repayments and household income






Rent and household income

Although the increase spreads across most non-Christian religions, it was mainly driven by Hinduism (0.7%




