Scale of the Census





Approximately **35,000 staff** staff to run the Census



Information available in

44 languages including Auslan



Census information collected from **25 million** people and **11 million** dwellings



Field staff travelled

10 million km



Our chatbot guided **375,000 conversations**



60 million pages of paper Census forms scanned



18 million visitors to the website



Mailed out 13.6 million items



Our call centre answered 645,000 calls



1,430 tonnes of fully recyclable paper



7 years from planning to final data release



9 months to print paper forms






Population growth 2016 - 2021














Age distribution - 2001



















Australia's religious affiliation over time











Long-term health conditions by age










